ANNUAL MEETING.

THE TENTH ANNUAL MEETING of the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons was held at the Home, First month 8th, 1874, the President in the chair.

The Annual Report of the Board of Managers and that of the Treasurer were read, and on motion referred to the new Board for publication.

TENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

In presenting the Tenth Annual Report of the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, the Managers thankfully acknowledge the blessings which, in the good providence of God, have been bestowed upon us during the past year.

The number of inmates recorded upon our books at the date of the last report was fifty-five. Since that time seventeen have been received. During the year, the very unusual number of thirteen have been removed by death, as follows:

It will be seen that all of the above had passed the three score and ten years usually allotted to man. Several of them had attained to a truly patriarchal age, and one of them could, no doubt

go back in her recollections of childhood to a period when the British Crown still maintained its sovereignty over what is now the United States. We fear that many of them, as they recalled the experiences of a chequered life, must, like Jacob of old, have seen more of evil than of good. And yet they had been the witnesses of a peculiar and crowning mercy to their own race. From the servitude, of which several of them had a personal knowledge, God had led this people through the fearful waters of a civil war into a land of freedom. From out the quiet retreat which had been furnished to these aged pensioners, they could look upon the disenthrallment of their own kindred and nation; and their last days were, no doubt, gladdened by the thought that the bitter wrongs they had suffered were forever past. In the hospitality and comfort afforded to their declining years, they could forget all but the tender mercy and goodness of Our Father in Heaven.

The total number of inmates received by us to the beginning of the year 1874 has been ninety-four; from which number thirty-five have been taken away, in the more than nine years of the history of the Home, leaving our present number fifty-nine. We ascribe the increased mortality of the past two years to natural causes, growing out of the increased age of those under our care. Almost all of our inmates come to us at such an advanced period of life, and with such wornout frames, that we cannot wonder at their speedy release.

Frequent allusions have been made in our reports to the ability and efficiency of our Matron. The trying circumstances attendant upon a year of sickness have made us renewedly sensible of her kind and watchful care over those under her charge. The infirmities of age and the great variety of dispositions demand unusual tact and patience. In adapting herself to the varied duties and responsibilities incident to the position of Matron, we believe she is aware of her own insufficiency of these things, and that she has found the help always granted to those who commit their burthens to the care of a loving and faithful God.

We are glad to be able to say that many of our inmates are not only uniformly cheerful, but industrious and helpful. They seem to enjoy the pleasant outlook from the windows and porch

of the Home, and, when the season and their own health admit of it, find great comfort in their little walks in the garden attached to our building. The birds and flowers cheer them much, and in a position from which care and anxiety are very much excluded, they pass their last days in quiet serenity.

In the monthly reports of our valued Matron, mention is made of the interesting and yet painful scenes connected with the last illness and death of some of those who have passed away. We append a few extracts.

Eighth mo. 13th, 1873. "The past month has been one of severe trial to our feeble and infirm family. Three of our number have gone from us; others are lying quite sick. Esther Becket, one of those recently deceased, was an inmate of the Home about eight years, was eighty-three years old when she came to us. She was then a strong, able-bodied woman—strong also in character. She knew no rule but her own will, which she said she brought with her. For the past four months she was confined to her own room, most of the time a great sufferer from oppression, not being able to lie down. The close of her life was peaceful and happy. She expressed regret at having said many unkind things to those about her; she now loved every one, and was glad to hear that I have nothing in my heart against her. Nancy Horace fell in a paralytic stroke on First-day morning, and was speechless until the following Seventh-day, when she closed a peaceful life at the advanced age of one hundred and two years."

Ninth mo. 10th. "The home has again lost three of its inmates. We miss them much, and are sorry to part with them. Rachel Richardson, a tender mother and sweet-spirited woman, one who had love to God and all mankind, was one of them. She suffered much, but endured all with great patience, and was released on the 18th ult., aged about ninety-three years. Fanny Blunt passed quietly away on the 31st ult., aged about seventy-five. She had been a great sufferer for many years. The latter part of the time she bore her afflictions with Christian fortitude. Sarah Boggs died Ninth mo. 5th, aged eighty-one. She was one of the early inmates at the Front Street Home, and often declared that she was on the watch tower and ready for the summons."

Eleventh mo. 12th, 1873. "We are thankful to be able to report that now, on the approach of winter, our family is in comfortable health. No one is entirely confined to bed, although we have the lame and the blind, who are much debilitated. During the past month we have lost a dear old woman, the first one admitted after our removal to the new building. Mary Ann Brown died at the advanced age of one hundred and seven years. She went down to her grave, a pattern of piety, fully prepared, as we believe, for the kingdom."

From these brief extracts some faint idea may be gathered of the sadder incidents in the daily life of our home. There are not

wanting others of a more cheerful character. Weekly religious services are held, at which most of our inmates are able to attend. The visits of the Committee of Lady Managers are always looked forward to with interest. On Thanksgiving day and on Christmas, dinners were provided for them through the kind liberality of friends. For a list of the many benefactions conferred upon the Home, independently of many subscriptions, we gratefully refer to the end of the report.

The most eventful circumstance in connection with the Home during the past year was the death of our friend and co-laborer, STEPHEN SMITH, the first Vice-President of the institution. He has from its origin given it his warm sympathy and support. It is to his wise liberality that we owe the present noble building occupied by the Home, and we cannot but rejoice in the thought that he was able while yet alive to see the fruits of his beneficence. Since it was erected a week has rarely passed, while his health permitted, that he did not visit it. He manifested a constant and unfailing interest in all its affairs, and spared no pains to make it worthy of its object. Not satisfied with the gifts so liberally bestowed, he has by will devised to us a handsome sum. It will, however, be nearly two years before we shall begin to reap the results of this legacy. His death occurred on the 14th of Eleventh month, 1873, after an illness of some months' duration. His name and that of his wife, who yet survives, will go down to future generations, associated with an humble yet most praiseworthy charity.

As in the past, so in the future, we shall have to rely upon the contributions of the benevolent for the maintenance of the Home; as we have already said above, we shall receive no benefit from the bequest for a long time. When we have it, there will still be need for a large yearly subscription.

To Dr. Rosell, Dr. Balfour, and many other friends whom we cannot name separately, the Home is under obligations for disinterested kindness and attention.

We have received from the executors of Jesse George a legacy of eight hundred dollars during the past year.

"Resolved, That as a wise steward of the gifts committed to him, our late friend was able to see the results of a noble benefaction, bestowed while he was yet alive, in the building up of a most useful charity.

"Resolved, That in the munificent provision made by his will for the maintenance and support of the Home, we recognize the same solicitude and beneficence in its behalf which characterised our friend during life.

CHARTER OF INCORPORATION.

Whereas, The undersigned citizens of this Commonwealth have, together with other citizens, associated for the purpose of establishing in the City of Philadelphia a Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, and are desirous of being incorporated agreeably to the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act to confer on certain Associations of the Citizens of this Commonwealth the powers and immunities of Corporations of bodies politic in the law;" They therefore declare the following to be the objects, articles and conditions of their said association, agreeably to which they desire to be incorporated, viz.:

TITLE.

1st. This Association shall be called "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons."

OBJECT.

2d. The object of this Association shall be the relief of that worthy class of colored persons who have endeavored through life to maintain themselves, but from various causes are finally dependent upon the charity of others.

ARTICLES AND CONDITIONS.

3d. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall perform the duties usual to those positions, and a Board of Managers, twenty-four in number, who shall make all needful rules and regulations, subject to the approval of the Association at its annual meeting, to which they shall submit a report of their proceedings. The officers shall be ex officio members of the Board.

4th. A quorum of the Association shall be fifteen, and of the Managers, ten. The Managers shall meet at least once in each month.

5th. At each annual meeting two auditors shall be appointed to examine the Treasurer's account previous to its presentation at the next annual meeting, and report as to its correctness.

6th. Respectable colored persons may be admitted into the Home or board therein, with the consent of the Visiting Committee, in accordance with the rules which the Managers may adopt for the government of the institution.

7th. The terms of membership of the Association shall be an annual contribution of two dollars. The payment of twenty-five dollars shall constitute a life membership.

8th. The Association shall meet annually, for the election of officers and other business, on the second Fifth-day (Thursday) in the First month (January) of each year, at such time and place as may be agreed on, of which two weeks' notice shall be given by the Managers.

9th. The clear yearly income of real and personal estate held by the Association shall not at any time exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars.

10th. The Association shall have power to make by-laws not inconsistent with this Charter nor the laws of the land, and to alter and annul the same at pleasure, and a failure to elect officers at any time shall not dissolve this Corporation.

11th. If any Manager shall die or resign, the vacancy may be filled by the election, at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, of one to serve in his stead until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IN THE COURT OF COMMON PLEAS, IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF PHILADELPHIA.

In the matter of the Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons."

An now, this second day of December, A. D. 1867, the Articles of Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons" having been heretofore, to wit, on the thirteenth day of November, A. D. 1867, filed in the office of the Prothonatory of said Court, and due notice having been inserted in a newspaper printed in said county, in due conformity to law; therefore, on motion of Edward Hopper, it is declared and decreed that the persons so associated under such articles shall, according to the articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in the law.

And it is further ordered and directed, that the said Charter of Incorporation shall be recorded in the Office for the Recording of Deeds in and for the said County of Philadelphia. And on the said instrument being so recorded, the persons so associated or meaning to associate shall, according to the objects, articles, and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a corporation or body politic in law and in fact, to have continuance by the name, style, and title in said instrument provided and declared.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE HOME.

RULE I.

The Matron shall have the entire charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the Rules, to be present at the meals, to see that they are properly served up, and everything is on the table before the family are seated; that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick, and proper order is observed at the table. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all articles sent to the Home, whether purchased or otherwise, and an exact account of all expenditures, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M., and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person will be admitted into the Home but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least fifty years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred dollars. This rule may be varied from if so directed by the Managers.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home prior to

their admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for the purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of fifty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subject to the same rules, and have no privileges different from the other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Visiting Committee thereon, and any other information that may be deemed important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and that their funeral expenses shall be paid.

RULE o.

Those received into the Home will be cared for without other expense during their lives, provided the Managers have the funds.

RULE 10.

The inmates are prohibited from soliciting aid outside of the institution.

RULE 11.

None but the Physician of the Institution, or his substitute,

shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner.

RULE 12.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are of ability shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 13.

Religious meetings shall be held in the Home on the first day of the week, at $10\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock A. M., and 4 o'clock P. M., for those unable or not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 14.

Any one of the inmates may be visited (with their consent) for religious purposes at any suitable time; but if a religious opportunity is desired with all of the family, it must be first approved by at least two of the Managers.

RULE 15.

A bell will be rung ten minutes before each meal, when all who are able will repair to the dining-room. When seated, a suitable pause shall be observed before eating.

RULE 16.

The sick or infirm will be accommodated with meals in their own rooms, but all others will be expected to take them at the general table.

RULE 17.

It will be expected that all who are capable will make their own beds, and sweep their rooms, early every morning; such as are not will have it done for them.

RULE 18.

The inmates are expected to sew, knit or do any other services for the benefit of the Home of which they are capable.

RULE 19.

Any of the inmates desiring to visit their friends (on their written invitation), must obtain permission from the Matron.

RULE 20.

If any of the friends of the inmates present articles for individual use or for general distribution, the same must be placed in charge of the Matron and furnished at her discretion.

RULE 21.

No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home unless ordered by a physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 22.

No person will be permitted to interfere or find fault with the Matron. Any complaint should be made to the Managers for their action.

RULE 23.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., or after 5 P. M., except in special cases.

RULE 24.

The strictest attention must be paid by each one of the family to these Rules. For the first and second offense, the Matron will admonish the offender; for a third, she will complain to the Visiting Committee; and for a fourth, removal from the Home, if so directed by the Board.
