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The improved management of our Alms House, and other reasons, tended to prevent many from seeing the urgent need of a Home for these dependent ones, and it was perhaps over a year before definite action was taken. However, a subscription paper was prepared, and the first contribution was 50 cents, from a Friend now deceased, and perhaps the second, 10 cents, from a poor store-girl, who hearing it spoken of, felt interested enough to throw in her mite.

It was finally concluded to invite a few persons to meet in the third story room of the Pharmacy, No. 800 Arch Street, which was kindly offered for the purpose, on Ninth mo., 19th, 1864. About half a dozen attended, and after consultation, Maurice Hall and another person were appointed to arrange for a second meeting, and by means of a circular, give a more extended invitation.

This meeting was held at No. 109 North Tenth Street, over the office of Friends' Review, on the afternoon of Ninth mo., 28th. A larger number of persons were present, who, after consultation, resolved to solicit contributions, and adjourned for three weeks.

On the evening of Tenth mo., 17th, an adjourned meeting was held at the same place, \$470 being reported as subscribed, and those present added to this, so that at the close of the meeting, \$1300 could be depended on.

Encouragement being thus received, the organization was proceeded with, and before the end of the year a house was purchased, but not entirely cleared of debt until the succeeding year.

The first inmate entered Third mo., 7th, 1865, and she was also the first to pass from thence to her Eternal Home, having been in the Institution, $2\frac{1}{2}$ months.

Although additions were made to the building, yet we were soon crowded, twenty-six aged women being the utmost capacity of the house, and the managers felt anxious for enlarged accommodations.

Our late fellow member Stephen Smith, having long meditated aiding the Institution materially, very liberally contributed the ground and over \$28,000, of the funds needed for the erection of the present building, into which we removed Eighth mo., 7th, 1871, and which has a capacity for over one-hundred inmates.

Thus, from a small beginning, has grown this charity which we believe has been a blessing to many, not only those who have been

sheltered within its walls, but also to those who have aided in promoting it, for "it is more blessed to give, than to receive." We feel thankful to our Heavenly Father that he has thus favored our efforts, and we have faith to believe that he has yet in store for us, a more extended field of usefulness in this direction. One hundred and fifteen persons have been admitted, of whom forty-eight have deceased, leaving sixty-seven now in the Home.

The average age of those deceased has been over eighty years, four were over one hundred years of age, and nine between ninety and one hundred.

Our aged family keeps as healthy as could be expected, and the proximity to Fairmount Park and the frequent passing of the Walnut Street cars along Belmont Avenue, tends to interest and enliven them, and prevents their minds being too much absorbed in their own physical condition. Their deportment in general, and willingness where able to assist our very efficient matron and those of their associates, more feeble than themselves, is certainly commendable. In this connection we would especially allude to Rebecca Reason, who deceased Sixth mo., 4th, aged eighty-three years. She was the first admitted after our removal to the present building, and was a beautiful example of their desire to serve one another.

For fifteen months she devoted herself to the care of a very feeble blind woman, allowing her to hold by her dress, and thus leading her through the hall, suiting her pace and motions to her feebleness, anticipating every thing for her comfort which was in her power, calling her "my child," (though older than herself,) and drawing attention to her on every occasion.

From the Matron's Reports we give some extracts showing the gratitude and loving feeling of some who have been removed to their Eternal Home, during the past year.

First mo. 1874. She alludes to the death of Martha Howard and says: "She was a tender sympathizing woman, always ready to assist her room mates when they required a helping hand, and we believe she was prepared to enter into that rest which is promised to the Righteous."

Second mo. 11th. "Lillie Waters died on 29th of First mo., aged seventy-seven years. She was a very delicate little woman, and having taken a heavy cold it ended in Pleurisy. When near her close, she was asked if she had any fear of death, she replied none at all. If I had gone last night when I was so low, what a beautiful home I should have been in this morning,

soon I shall be there. As to the affairs of the Home, everything is moving on harmoniously."

Third mo. 11th. "We have nearly passed another winter with no reasonable cause of complaint. It is pleasant to know that our barrel of meal has not been shortened nor our cruise of oil run out."

Fifth mo. 6th. In speaking of the death of two of the inmates, she says of Louisa Walmsley: "She was a great sufferer, and looked forward to death as a happy release, remarking that it had no sting for her and she was happy in the thought her dear mother was waiting her arrival where parting would be known no more."

The other deceased was Hetty Lee. She was a native of Virginia, and in early life a plantation slave, and bore the marks of hard usage to the day of her death. She came to the Home Twelfth mo. 23d, 1873, so feeble and broken down, that she had to be carried into the house, was confined to her chamber all the time. We trust she has gone to a brighter world.

Seventh mo. 8th. "As to the Fourth, it was a gala day at the Home, we had the stars and stripes thrown to the breeze, and every one that could walk or see sitting out to view the passing and repassing of the numerous carriages, etc., and as to the entertainment kindly furnished, several of the managers present thought it one of the best."

Tenth mo. 14th. "The summer having passed, we feel that we have been providentially blessed in having no unusual sickness. She says of Phillis Smith, who was admitted into the Home Third mo. 16th, 1865: The first four years she enjoyed much, and often spoke of 'her Good Home' which she thought so superior to living in one room. But alas! earthly pleasures soon pass away. On New Year's night, 1870, we had given to us by a kind friend a gay entertainment, and during the evening everything seemed lively. The next morning Phillis slipped on the ice and it resulted in paralysis, which deprived her of the use of her lower limbs, and her speech was affected. She would say, 'how I want to get Home, but no, I must be patient.' She had a favorite hymn called the Christian Home in Heaven, and when one of her friends called she always desired him to sing it. The latter years of her life were tiresome and painful."

"Alfred King became an inmate Fourth mo. 15th, 1873, and was much afflicted when he came, but in a few weeks recovered sufficiently to be able to go about. He was ever found cheerful and pleasant, often spoke of the great goodness of God in providing such a Home for the aged. He was a quiet, humble spirit, frequently expressing a desire to enter into that rest that remains for the people of God, and would add: 'I feel so unworthy yet I have faith to believe, He will count me worthy, I feel willing to trust Him. I believe I shall enter into that city whose builder and maker is God.' He had been sick one week after this conversation, and while sitting in his chair, fell in a paralytic fit and breathed his last."

Mary Edwards was said to be a native of Africa, and came to this country from St. Domingo (about the time of the insurrection), with the family she then resided with. After many years engagement as a domestic, she commenced vending ground nut cakes, at Third and Market Sts., and afterwards at Second and Pine, in which employment she continued over half a century.

She could speak French fluently, but very broken English, was a strong Catholic in feeling, and her funeral was conducted in accordance with the forms of that persuasion. She had been a widow over forty years, and was past one hundred years of age when she died, but seemed to have no sickness more than the weakness of old age.

Twelfth mo. 9th. "Another month has passed with its different changes, yet in the midst of all, we can but say we have been providentially blessed, several of our family seem feeble and almost ready to drop. Rachel Gibson, who for the last six months has been suffering from paralysis of the brain, although for a while apparently better, desired to come down on Thanksgiving day for the last time, her wish was gratified, she enjoyed it much and said it was very nice."

"Rachel was one we have always valued, she was an exemplary woman, one who had many good traits for which we loved her, and hoped she might recover and be with us a little longer. But a wise Providence ordered otherwise, and the warfare came to a close yesterday."

First mo. 16th, 1875. "All more or less appeared to enjoy the Holidays; they said they had a feast of fat things, both spiritually and temporarily. On Christmas morning they were up at 4 o'clock to have their morning meeting; it was quite a pleasant time.

Then on New Year's Eve we had speaking till within a few minutes of twelve, when each one bowed in silent prayer. Whilst thus engaged, the spirit of love seemed to overshadow the place, each one arose giving a cordial shake of the hand, and expressing their thankfulness to the great giver of all good, who had brought us safely through another year.

We have also had our sorrow; that Sainted Mother in Israel, Mary Miller Highland, deceased, Twelfth mo. 18th, aged ninety-five years.

She was born in Delaware, and was always a peace maker, ever having a word of instruction or encouragement. I regret that I have allowed to pass away so many good words that fell from the lips of this dear old mother.

She always delighted to take her meals in the Dining Room to hear reading, to ask a blessing or to offer a prayer.

The last time she was down, after the reading of the fourteenth Chapter of St. John, she said she would like to say a few words, but her breath was so short that she feared it would take too long. She was told we would wait for her. She said: "Children, I was looking at that vacant chair, thinking mine might be the next. I am not troubled about it, if the King comes to night, I feel ready to meet Him. But if I never meet you at this table again, strive to live in love. We need not think that because we cannot read, that we will be excused from prayer, for the Great Teacher who teaches all things, is Jesus Christ himself, and the Kingdom of Heaven is within us, let us obey him and we shall not often do wrong."

Were the number of our inmates up to the full capacity of our Building, it would require for their support Ten or Twelve Thousand Dollars annually, which would be the interest of about Two Hundred Thousand Dollars, and although we have received several lega-

cies, yet the aggregate of our investments is only about Nine Thousand Dollars, a very small proportion of the total needed to make it self-sustaining, and we must therefore mainly depend on the liberal contributions of those willing to aid in the good work.

The near approach of the Centennial of American Independence, and the preparations for it, has included the grading and paving of Girard Avenue by the City, and as that Avenue is our northern boundary, we have a large amount to pay as our share of this expense, so that it will be seen that the sum needed the ensuing year will be much larger than heretofore.

Owing to a mistaken idea having prevailed in the public mind which materially affected our collections in the past year, and in order to meet necessary expenses, compelled the sale of some of our securities (which however, we have since re-invested); we were induced to appoint the first of the present year as "Donation Day," and extended an invitation for contributions.

The liberality with which this has been responded to, re-assures us of the support of the benevolent public, and that with faith and works combined, much may be done. The total received in answer to this appeal to this date, is One Thousand Two Hundred and Twenty-eight Dollars in cash, besides many donations of provisions and other articles needed in the Institution.

Soon after the organization of our Board, a Committee was appointed to endeavor to create a greater interest in the Home amongst our colored friends, who although as a body not so well supplied with pecuniary means as some others, yet many of these *have* accumulated wealth, some share of which we think ought to be bestowed on Institutions like our own, intended to benefit those who are more nearly affiliated with themselves.

We therefore feel to urge this upon the attention of such, and to remind them of the admonition of the Apostle James. "What doth it profit" if "one of you say unto them: Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled; notwithstanding, ye give them not those things which are needful to the body."

During the year the grounds have been partly filled up, planted with vegetables and a number of fruit trees, thus improving its appearance as well as furnishing a part of the supplies of fresh vegetables for the table.

Religious meetings have been generally kept up, and mostly some connected with the different denominations are in attendance. The company of these as well as visitors at other times are much appreciated.

Our valued friend, Samuel R. Shipley, being about to visit Europe for some months, resigned his position as Treasurer, to which we appointed Israel H. Johnson. His return is anticipated in the

Spring, and we confidently look for his continued interest in our "Home." Our estimable Matron continues unwearied in her efforts to attend to the wants and comfort of those under her care. Dr. Rosell has attended to the patients regularly, and the many kindnesses of Gilbert Balfour our druggist and other friends, have our appreciation and acknowledgment.

On the "Fourth of July," "Thanksgiving Day" and "Christmas Day," through the liberality of some of the managers and friends of the Institution, entertainments were furnished to the family, which tended much to brighten them up, and the remembrance thereof to cheer them for many days; and particularly the services of the Virginia and Tennessee Singers, who kindly volunteered on some of these occasions.

Dr. Rosell's Annual Report was referred to the incoming Board, for consideration.

On motion it was "Resolved, that a Committee of three be appointed with authority to take such action as they may deem advisable, (with the sanction of the Managers) to secure such changes in our Charter and Constitution, as may be necessary for the proper carrying out of the objects of the Home.

George W. Hancock, Dillwyn Parrish and Marcellus Balderston were appointed said Committee, and on motion, they were instructed in making such changes, to have the time of the annual meeting altered to the Tenth month.

The Committee on Nominations, reported the list of Officers, Managers and Cooperative Committee, printed on page 3, and the Vice President appointed two Auditors, all of whom were approved by the meeting. Adjourned.

CHARTER OF INCORPORATION.

WHEREAS, The undersigned citizens of this Commonwealth have, together with other citizens, associated for the purpose of establishing in the City of Philadelphia a Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, and are desirous of being incorporated agreeably to the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act to confer on certain Associations of the Citizens of this Commonwealth the powers and immunities of Corporations of bodies politic in law;" They therefore declare the following to be the objects, articles and conditions of their said association, agreeably to which they desire to be incorporated, viz.:

TITLE.

1st. This Association shall be called "THE HOME FOR AGED AND INFIRM COLORED PERSONS."

OBJECT.

2d. The object of this Association shall be the relief of that worthy class of colored persons who have endeavored through life to maintain themselves, but from various causes are finally dependent upon the charity of others.

ARTICLES AND CONDITIONS.

3d. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall perform the duties usual to those positions, and a Board of Managers, twenty-four in number, who shall make all needful rules and regulations, subject to the approval of the Association at its annual meeting, to which they shall submit a report of their proceedings. The officers shall be *ex officio* members of the Board.

4th. A quorum of the Association shall be fifteen, and of the Managers, ten. The Managers shall meet at least once in each month.

5th. At each annual meeting two auditors shall be appointed to examine the Treasurer's account previous to its presentation at the next annual meeting, and report as to its correctness.

6th. Respectable colored persons may be admitted into the Home or boarded therein, with the consent of the Visiting Committee, in accordance with the rules which the Managers may adopt for the government of the institution.

7th. The terms of membership of the Association shall be an annual contribution of two dollars. The payment of twenty-five dollars shall constitute a life membership.

8th. The Association shall meet annually, for the election of officers and other business, on the second Fifth-day (Thursday) in the First month (January) of each year, at such time and place as may be agreed on, of which two weeks' notice shall be given by the Managers.

9th. The clear yearly income of real and personal estate held by the Association shall not at any time exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars.

10th. The Association shall have power to make by-laws, not inconsistent with this Charter nor the laws of the land, and to alter and annul the same at pleasure, and a failure to elect officers at any time shall not dissolve this Corporation.

11th. If any Manager shall die or resign, the vacancy may be filled by the election, at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, of one to serve in his stead until the next annual meeting of the Association.

And now, this second day of December, A. D., 1867, the Articles of Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons" having been heretofore, to wit, on the thirteenth day of November, A. D. 1867, filed in the office of the Prothonotary of said Court, and due notice having been inserted in a newspaper printed in said county, in due conformity to law; therefore, on motion of Edward Hopper, it is declared and decreed that the persons so associated under such articles shall, according to the articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in the law.

And it is further ordered and directed, that the said Charter of Incorporation shall be recorded in the Office for the Recording of Deeds in and for the said County of Philadelphia. And on the said instrument being so recorded, the persons so associated or meaning to associate shall, according to the objects, articles, and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a corporation or body politic in law and in fact, to have continuance by the name, style, and title in said instrument provided and declared.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE HOME.

RULE 1.

The Matron shall have the entire charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the Rules, to be present at the meals, to see that they are properly served up, and everything is on the table before the family are seated; that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick, and proper order is observed at the table. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all articles sent to the Home, whether purchased or otherwise, and an exact account of all expenditures, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M., and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person will be admitted into the Home but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least fifty years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred dollars. This rule may be varied from if so directed by the Managers.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the home prior to

their admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for the purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of fifty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subject to the same rules, and have no privileges different from the other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Visiting Committee thereon, and any other information that may be deemed important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and that their funeral expenses shall be paid.

RULE 9.

Those received into the Home will be cared for without other expense during their lives, provided the Managers have the funds.

RULE 10.

The inmates are prohibited from soliciting aid outside of the institution.

RULE 11.

None but the Physician of the Institution, or his substitute, shall

attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner.

RULE 12.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are of ability shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 13.

Religious meetings shall be held in the Home on the first day of the week, at 10½ o'clock A. M., and 4 o'clock P. M., for those unable or not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 14.

Any one of the inmates may be visited (with their consent) for religious purposes at any suitable time; but if a religious opportunity is desired with all of the family, it must be first approved by at least two of the Managers.

RULE 15.

A bell will be rung ten minutes before each meal, when all who are able will repair to the dining-room. When seated, a suitable pause shall be observed before eating.

RULE 16.

The sick or infirm will be accommodated with meals in their own rooms, but all others will be expected to take them at the general table.

RULE 17.

It will be expected that all who are capable will make their own beds, and sweep their rooms, early every morning; such as are not will have it done for them.

RULE 18.

The inmates are expected to sew, knit or do any other services for the benefit of the Home of which they are capable.

RULE 19.

Any of the inmates desiring to visit their friends (on *their written invitation*), must obtain permission from the Matron.

RULE 20.

If any of the friends of the inmates present articles for individual use or for general distribution, the same must be placed in charge of the Matron and furnished at her discretion.

RULE 21.

No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home unless ordered by a physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 22.

No person will be permitted to interfere or find fault with the Matron. Any complaints should be made to the Managers for their action.

RULE 23.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., or after 5 P. M., except in special cases.

RULE 24.

The strictest attention must be paid by each one of the family to these Rules. For the first and second offense, the Matron will admonish the offender; for a third, she will complain to the Visiting Committee; and for a fourth, removal from the Home, if so directed by the Board.
