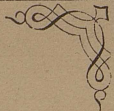
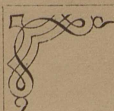

ANNUAL MEETING.

AT THE TWELFTH ANNUAL MEETING of the contributors to the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, held at the Home, First month 13th, 1876, the President being out of the city, the Vice-President, Wm. Still, occupied the chair.

On motion of Samuel R. Shipley, the reading of the Minutes of the last Annual Meeting was dispensed with.

The Annual Report, as presented by the Board of Managers, was read, and referred to the incoming Board for publication, and they were instructed to print the Treasurer's Report in connection therewith.

ANNUAL REPORT.

Time, in its rapid flight, has again brought around the period when it is requisite that we should render to the contributors an account of our stewardship, and in doing so, it is with feelings of thankfulness that our Heavenly Father has so far blessed the Institution as to place it in our power more fully to carry out the object for which it was established.

At the last Annual Meeting we had 67 inmates. Since then 14 have been removed by death, whose average age was 81 years; 19 were admitted, leaving now in the Home 72, viz.: 61 women and 11 men, who, with the employees, make our family to consist of over 80 persons.

This large company requires considerable means for its support, and it is gratifying to know, that as we have extended our usefulness, there has seemed to be a proportionate increase in the contributions from the friends of the Institution. Whilst returning our sincere thanks to these for their liberality, we would urge on them not to relax their interest nor tighten their purse strings.

Our building could accommodate 25 additional inmates, and we hope the time is not far distant when our entire space shall

be fully occupied. This, of course, will require additional means, not only for the support of the enlarged family, but other provisions are needed for the comfort and the preservation of the health of the inmates, although the latter has been remarkably good for so large a number of the aged and infirm. One of the most pressing wants is the need of apartments entirely separate from the main building, to be used as an infirmary, to which the seriously sick, especially those affected with contagious disorders, could be removed; and in a family like ours there are almost always some needing such a provision.

The opening of Girard Avenue, and the necessity of our filling up our premises with additional earth, will require considerable expenditure. To guard against the location of anything prejudicial to the welfare of the Home, as well as to furnish a better means of access, it has been deemed advisable to purchase some adjoining property on Belmont Avenue. This, however, will not be altogether unproductive, as great benefit has been realized by having the fresh vegetables raised in our present garden, and it will be a source of enjoyment for such as may be of ability, to cultivate their little garden plots, and thus, by having their minds profitably occupied, withdraw their thoughts from their own ailments.

We have again been favored by the liberality of the Executors of Jesse George; and the Executors of John M. Sharpless and Mary D. Brown have paid over the legacies respectively bequeathed to the Home. From the Executors of Stephen Smith we have received the interest on his legacy held in trust, and several houses, on which, however, his widow has a right of dower.

The legacy of Hannah T. Darlington, of West Chester, having, according to law, lapsed, a part of the heirs have recognized her wishes, and so far as their shares were concerned, made them over to the Home, being one-third of her bequest.

We have also been notified of a legacy from Peter Sieger, deceased, which, however, we will not receive until the sale of certain real estate.

These manifestations of interest in those who have been removed from works to rewards, we desire to keep in remembrance, and in accordance with our rule, the respective amounts will be invested as part of the endowment, and the names of the donors annually published.

We desire that our friends, in making their wills, will not overlook the needs of the Home, so that we may in the future have many such mementoes to hand down to posterity.

On the 13th of Seventh month another of our centenarian inmates was summoned to her eternal rest. "Aunt Sally Baynard," as she was familiarly known, was a remarkable character. Although some doubts exist as to her having attained the remarkable age (115) attributed to her, yet there is sufficient in her history to warrant the conviction that she was much past her 100th year.

Her hair was of a pure white, very fine and silky, and although bent with age, she was quite active. Her mind remained clear and her sight good till near her close, so that within a short time of her decease she could thread her needle and sew as in earlier life, never having needed the aid of spectacles. She was born a slave in Maryland, and in early life labored very hard, having to work in the corn-field, besides attending to a large dairy; but, said she, "hard work never hurt Aunt Sally." Her industrious habits were continued through a long life, and within a few months of her death she would brush up her room and clean all the knives in the establishment, being troubled when her feebleness prevented what she regarded as her duty. Always enjoying good health, she gradually weakened, having no ailment but old age.

Thirteen others have likewise been summoned from our midst.

From the Matron's Reports we make some extracts:

Third mo. 14th. "We desire to thank our Heavenly Father for His all-sustaining care over us, and for the unwearied exertions of kind friends. It is true we have had sickness and death; but have been preserved from fever or infectious disease.

Mary Howard, who entered the Home last Ninth mo., deceased Second mo. 12th. She had lived in the city many years, but was a native of

Maryland. We are told by those who knew her from early youth, that she was always remarkable for meekness and sobriety.

Being greatly afflicted and suffering from various diseases, so that she could seldom lie down, yet she bore it all patiently, was a woman of few words, and no one ever heard her complain.

Maria Wilson, another great sufferer, after a residence of about three months, was released on the morning of the 7th inst., aged 83.

Aunt Sally is still lingering, being better some days than on others. When told it was the first of March, she said it was her birthday, but could not remember the year. Being told her age, she replied, "Well, I can't clean my room, or scour knives and forks, but I think you all might give me something, because I lived so long."

Third mo. 21st. Esther Langford passed quietly away, after being afflicted for twenty years. She would say, "I often wonder why I have been so long a sufferer here; I know it is all right, however, and desire to bear it patiently," of which she truly left us an example. Not even a drop of cold water was handed her without the return, "I thank you."

Seventh mo. 13th. The summer is fast passing, and our aged family are as well as might be expected. It is common for us to have 10 or 12 in their chambers unable, on account of febleness, to get down stairs, but have had no infectious disease. Adelia Novee quietly passed away Fifth mo. 7th, aged 77. She was a native of the West Indies, and for the twenty years that I have known her, was deprived of eyesight, and suffered many privations. Truly it may be said that she was a woman of sorrow and acquainted with grief, yet she never murmured, and was ever ready to give a word of counsel or reproof. She was a tender, sympathizing mother; we miss her much, whilst we believe our loss is her gain.

Eleventh mo. During the month we lost Elinda Barney, a native of Virginia, who came here to spend the remnant of her days (as she often said), with her only child; but alas! this hope was soon blasted, as he died, leaving his poor mother a stranger in a strange land. For awhile she could do nothing but mourn, but upon reflection thought this was not right, but that her trust should be in Him who had ever cared for her. Through the exertions of friends, she was enabled to enter the Home Tenth mo. 20, 1873, and was much pleased, but after sixteen months she had a severe hemorrhage, which reduced her so that she was confined to her chamber. She bore this affliction patiently, having a bright hope that when done suffering she would have a resting place with the redeemed, and died Eleventh mo. 3d, aged 77.

Religious meetings have been held much to the comfort of the household, many of whom, we believe, are earnest disciples of Christ, and when the summons comes for their depar-

ture to their spiritual home, they will receive the welcome promised to the faithful soul.

The kindness of those of various denominations who attend at these weekly meetings, also those who meet with them monthly in a prayer-meeting, we appreciate. Surely they have a reward here, and it will be held in remembrance by Him who said, "Inasmuch as ye did it unto the least of these my brethren, ye did it unto Me."

On the "4th of July" John Bowman, our baker, liberally treated our old folks with ice-cream and cake.

On Seventh mo. 31st, Sarah Marshall and Mary M. Johnson kindly gave them an entertainment in commemoration of West India Emancipation.

The children connected with the Home for Destitute Colored Children, at Maylandville, were also in attendance, and Frances E. W. Harper made an address. It was a mutual enjoyment to both the aged and the youth.

A similar entertainment was given by our friend, Wm. Still, Ninth mo. 3d, to the inmates of both Homes. An abundant supply of fruit was furnished, and Daniel Parvis and his juvenile choir being present, they, as well as the old folks, the Maylandville children, and Elizabeth Greenfield (the Black Swan), sang many beautiful songs, and F. E. W. Harper and B. T. Tanner addressed the company.

On the recent New Year's day a meeting was held, at which a number of those interested in the Institution attended. Samuel P. Godwin, Dr. Richard Newton, Dr. John B. Reeve, F. E. W. Harper, and B. T. Tanner participated in the religious exercises, and the Parvis choir sang some appropriate hymns. Our aged family were much gratified.

Last spring some of the Hutchinson family being in the city, manifested their interest by visiting the Home, and ministered to the pleasure of the inmates by singing some of their choice pieces.

Our Matron continues faithfully attentive to the arduous duties of her position. The physician is regular in his visits, and the druggist, Gilbert Balfour, and others who have manifested their kindness, merit our thanks.

CHARTER OF INCORPORATION.

WHEREAS, The undersigned citizens of this Commonwealth have, together with other citizens, associated for the purpose of establishing in the City of Philadelphia a Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, and are desirous of being incorporated agreeably to the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act to confer on certain Associations of the Citizens of this Commonwealth the powers and immunities of Corporations of bodies politic in law;" They therefore declare the following to be the objects, articles and conditions of their said association, agreeably to which they desire to be incorporated, viz.:

TITLE.

1st. This Association shall be called "THE HOME FOR AGED AND INFIRM COLORED PERSONS."

OBJECT.

2d. The object of this Association shall be the relief of that worthy class of colored persons who have endeavored through life to maintain themselves, but from various causes are finally dependent upon the charity of others.

ARTICLES AND CONDITIONS.

3d. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall perform the duties usual to those positions, and a Board of Managers, twenty-four in number, who shall make all needful rules and regulations, subject to the approval of the Association at its annual meeting, to which they shall submit a report of their proceedings. The officers shall be *ex officio* members of the Board.

4th. A quorum of the Association shall be fifteen, and of the Managers, ten. The Managers shall meet at least once in each month.

5th. At each annual meeting two auditors shall be appointed to examine the Treasurer's account previous to its presentation at the next annual meeting, and report as to its correctness.

6th. Respectable colored persons may be admitted into the Home or boarded therein, with the consent of the Visiting Committee, in accordance with the rules which the Managers may adopt for the government of the institution.

7th. The terms of membership of the Association shall be an annual contribution of two dollars. The payment of twenty-five dollars shall constitute a life membership.

8th. The Association shall meet annually, for the election of officers and other business, on the second Fifth-day (Thursday) in the First month (January) of each year, at such time and place as may be agreed on, of which two weeks' notice shall be given by the Managers.

9th. The clear yearly income of real and personal estate held by the Association shall not at any time exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars.

10th. The Association shall have power to make by-laws, not inconsistent with this Charter nor the laws of the land, and to alter and annul the same at pleasure, and a failure to elect officers at any time shall not dissolve this Corporation.

11th. If any Manager shall die or resign, the vacancy may be filled by the election, at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, of one to serve in his stead until the next annual meeting of the Association.

In the matter of the Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons."

And now, this second day of December, A. D., 1867, the Articles of Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons" having been heretofore, to wit, on the thirteenth day of November, A. D., 1867, filed in the office of the Prothonotary of said Court, and due notice having been inserted in a newspaper printed in said county, in due conformity to law; therefore, on motion of Edward Hopper, it is declared and decreed that the persons so associated under such articles shall, according to the articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in the law.

And it is further ordered and directed, that the said Charter of Incorporation shall be recorded in the Office for the Recording of Deeds in and for the said County of Philadelphia. And on the said instrument being so recorded, the persons so associated or meaning to associate shall, according to the objects, articles, and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a corporation or body politic in law and in fact, to have continuance by the name, style, and title in said instrument provided and declared.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the seal of the said Court, this thirteenth day of December, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

The Managers shall meet on the second Fourth-day in every month, at 4 o'clock.

ARTICLE II.

Special Meetings may be called by the Chairman, or at the request of any three members.

ARTICLE III.

All reports of Committees shall be made to the Board in writing.

ARTICLE IV.

The meetings of the Board shall be conducted according to the Rules of Order usual in similar bodies.

ARTICLE V.

Standing Committees on the following subjects shall be appointed by the Chairman at the first meeting in each current year.

- 1st. A Committee of Management.
- 2d. A Committee on Property and Finance.
- 3d. A Committee on Supplies.
- 4th. A Committee on Religious Meetings.
- 5th. A Committee on Interments.

ARTICLE VI.

The Committee of Management shall consist of the female members of the Board. They shall have a general supervision of the internal arrangements of the Home, and shall propose to the Board any regulations or measures which may be needed for its government. They shall divide themselves into the following Sub-committees:

1st. A Visiting Committee of four, to be appointed monthly in rotation; any two of whom shall visit the Home twice in each week, and endeavor to be present once during meals. They shall make themselves acquainted with the situation and

wants of the inmates, generally direct the concerns of the family, and report their observations in a book provided for this purpose. They shall receive and enter applications for admission, and make the necessary inquiry in regard to the application, previous to the action of the Board thereon.

2d. A Reading Committee of four, to be appointed monthly, to visit the Home frequently, and read to the inmates from the Scriptures, or other suitable book, and also furnish reading matter for the institution, and supervise any arrangements of an educational character.

3d. A Clothing Committee of four, who shall Superintend the making and distribution of clothing, and give directions in regard to any industrial employment for the inmates.

ARTICLE VII.

The Committee on Property and Finance shall consist of the male members of the Board, and shall have charge of the real estate and financial affairs of the Home.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Committee on Supplies, in conjunction with the Matron, shall make all necessary purchases for the Home.

ARTICLE IX.

The Committee on Interments shall make all needful arrangements for the funerals of our inmates, and at least one of them shall be present on such occasions.

ARTICLE X.

The Board shall appoint annually one or more physicians, to look after the health of the inmates.

RULES AND REGULATIONS,

FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE HOME.

RULE 1.

The Matron shall have the entire charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the Rules, to be present at the meals, to see that they are properly served up, and everything is on the table before the family are seated; that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick, and proper order is observed at the table. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all articles sent to the Home, whether purchased or otherwise, and an exact account of all expenditures, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M., and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person will be admitted into the Home but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least fifty years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred dollars. This rule may be varied from if so directed by the Managers. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will not be retained longer, but shall be charged board for the time they may be residents in the Home

at the rate of two and a half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which shall be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home prior to their admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for the purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of fifty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subject to the same rules, and have no privileges different from the other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Visiting Committee thereon, and any other information that may be deemed important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and that their funeral expenses shall be paid.

RULE 9.

Those received into the Home will be cared for without other expense during their lives, provided the Managers have the funds.

RULE 10.

The inmates are prohibited from soliciting aid outside of the institution.

RULE 11.

None but the Physician of the Institution, or his substitute, shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner.

RULE 12.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are of ability shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 13.

Religious meetings shall be held in the Home on the first day of the week, at 10½ o'clock A. M., and 4 o'clock P. M., for those unable or not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 14.

Any one of the inmates may be visited (with their consent) for religious purposes at any suitable time; but if a religious opportunity is desired with all of the family, it must be first approved by at least two of the Managers.

RULE 15.

A bell will be rung ten minutes before each meal, when all who are able will repair to the dining-room. When seated, a suitable pause shall be observed before eating.

RULE 16.

The sick or infirm will be accommodated with meals in their own rooms, but all others will be expected to take them at the general table.

RULE 17.

It will be expected that all who are capable will make their own beds, and sweep their rooms, early every morning; such as are not will have it done for them.

RULE 18.

The inmates are expected to sew, knit or do any other services for the benefit of the Home of which they are capable.

RULE 19.

Any of the inmates desiring to visit their friends (on *their written invitation*), must obtain permission from the Matron.

RULE 20.

If any of the friends of the inmates present articles for individual use or for general distribution, the same must be placed in charge of the Matron and furnished at her discretion.

RULE 21.

No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home unless ordered by a physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 22.

No person will be permitted to interfere or find fault with the Matron. Any complaints should be made to the Managers for their action.

RULE 23.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., or after 5 P. M., except in special cases.

RULE 24.

The strictest attention must be paid by each one of the family to these Rules. For the first and second offense, the Matron will admonish the offender; for a third, she will complain to the Visiting Committee; and for a fourth, removal from the Home, if so directed by the Board.
