ANNUAL MEETING.

THE ANNUAL MEETING of the Contributors to the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, was held at the Presbyterian Church, Lombard Street, between Eighth and Ninth Streets, on the evening of First month 11th, 1877; President Dillwyn Parrish in the chair.

The meeting was opened by the Rev. Dr. J. B. Reeve asking a blessing.

Minutes of the last Annual Meeting were read and approved.

The Annual Report of the Board of Managers was read, as follows:

ANNUAL REPORT.

The Centennial year of American Independence having become numbered with the things of the past, the time has arrived when it is our duty to report how it has fared with our Home during this eventful period.

The health of our aged family has been remarkably good, only seven deaths having occurred during the year, and these were from chronic diseases. Henry Washington, one of the deceased, resided in an adjoining county, had paid his admission fee and reached the city, when death overtook him, ere he had been an actual resident in the Home, from which, however, he was buried. We think this small mortality augurs well for the sanitary condition of our Institution. Doubtless a beneficial effect was exerted by the Centennial. The constant passing and re-passing of pedestrians and street cars on Belmont Avenue, and the trains on the Pennsylvania R. R., conveying passengers to and from the great Exhibition, and the opportunity which a number of them had to visit the Exposition, also the Zoological Garden, and the numerous visitors that have called to see the Institution, could not fail to exert an enlivening influence, by diverting their minds from their real or imagined ailments.

Although we have previously had strong provocation, yet for the first time since the organization of the Home have we expelled any of the inmates; but the conduct of two women

and one man was such as to render it necessary, much though we regretted the necessity. Another (Mary Martin), left voluntarily, because she was unwilling to submit to the rules.

Sixteen have been admitted, making our inmates to number at the end of the year seventy-seven, who, with the matron and assistants, give an aggregate in the family of eighty-seven persons.

Of course considerable means are required to meet current expenses, and it is with thankfulness that we can say, that our Heavenly Father has blessed our efforts, and opened the hearts of many to contribute, either in money or goods.

The Executors of Jesse George have again remembered us, by a donation from that estate of two thousand dollars.

The purchase of the property on Belmont Avenue has been consummated, retaining the 27 feet which it was at first proposed to reconvey to the former owner. This has required the sale of some of our investments, whilst two thousand dollars still remain unpaid, which we trust the liberality of our friends will enable us to liquidate at an early day.

The demand for sites for business purposes during the period that the Exposition was open, enabled us to lease temporarily this property at a good rental, but these ventures of our tenants not proving remunerative, we have failed to realize as much as was anticipated.

Entertainments have been kindly given by some of our friends on "Fourth of July," "Thanksgiving" and "Christmas" days, and the "Georgia Singers," early in the Spring, visited the Home and sang some of their choicest tunes, to the evident gratification of the hearers.

The religious meetings are regularly kept up, and have been favored with the company and participation of many of various denominations.

Our Institution is non-sectarian, sheltering within its walls Catholic and Protestant alike, and the visits and ministrations of all are gratefully appreciated by these dependent ones.

Our friend, George W. Goines, who for several years has been one of our Managers, has recently deceased. His health had been poor for some time, but he, nevertheless, manifested his continued interest by meeting with us when of ability. Thus one by one we are called away from this material world

to that which is better and more glorious. May each seek to act his part well, and by endeavoring to smooth the pathway of those whom the Divine Master called his brethren, we shall surely have the promised reward.

Our friend, Samuel R. Shipley, who has been identified with the Home since its establishment, and for most of the time its Treasurer, has, from the press of other engagements, felt it right to resign from our Board. Much of the success attending the earlier period of our Home was due to his earnest efforts, and his interest has continued to the present time. We cannot doubt but that his feelings and influence will continue to be for our welfare.

Our Matron, though advancing in years, continues efficient, and her kind attentions seem to be generally appreciated by our aged ones. We give a few extracts from her reports:

Fifth mo. 3d. "As to the health of the Home, we have several who are weak and feeble; one is not able to lie down much, either by night or by day, yet we feel that we are providentially blessed in having so many able to be about. Everything seems peace and quietness."

Seventh mo. 12th. "We have had very many pleasant visits, many fervent prayers and good wishes for our prosperity. Visitors have expressed their gratification in seeing so comfortable a place for the aged. A company of five came on the Sabbath morning, and held meetings with the inmates. One of them, a lady from South Carolina, had seen much of the ills of slavery, and could compare the two, showing how many more comforts were had in the Home. It seemed to waken up a sense of feeling amongst them."

Ninth mo. 3d. "Ten of them were at the Exhibition, taking their lunch with them; they rode around the ground, and went into the Main Building, and came home saying they were like the queen of Sheba, they could not tell the half. They were so pleased they wished to go again."

Eleventh mo. 8th. She mentions that forty of the inmates had been to the Exposition, and also speaks of the death of Rosanna Hubert, an inmate about one year. "She was a woman of severe affliction for eleven years, but was a great example of humility and patience. She was all thanks and praises (to use her own words), to think that unworthy me should be shut in from the world, where nothing can molest or disturb."

Dr. Rossell continues attentive to his duties, and our Druggist, Dr. Gilbert Balfour, deserves our thanks for many acts of kindness rendered.

The Treasurer submitted his Annual Report, which was read, and directed to be entered on the Minutes.

The alterations to, or change of position of, By-Laws, Articles V., VI., &c., as proposed by Managers, were approved, as printed on pages 15 and 16.

The action of the Board of Managers in changing Rule 3d for the Government of the Home, by inserting the word "sixty" in place of "fifty," was agreed to, so that hereafter all applicants must be at least sixty years of age. The increase of the entrance fee was not approved, and it therefore remains at "One Hundred Dollars."

A Committee consisting of Sarah Lewis, Matthias Shoemaker, Benjamin T. Tanner, Samuel P. Godwin and Henrietta S. Duterte, was appointed by the chair to propose the names of suitable persons to act as Officers and Managers for the ensuing year, whereupon they submitted those printed on page 3, who were duly chosen.

The President appointed Joseph Bacon and Alfred H. Love as Auditors for next year.

On motion, the Annual Report, together with that of the Treasurer, was referred to the new Board of Managers for publication with the proceedings, as they may deem best.

After remarks by J. Wheaton Smith, J. Walker Jackson, Samuel P. Godwin, Israel H. Johnson, and others, adjourned.

CHARTER OF INCORPORATION.

WHEREAS, The undersigned citizens of this Commonwealth have, together with other citizens, associated for the purpose of establishing in the City of Philadelphia a Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, and are desirous of being incorporated agreeably to the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act to confer on certain Associations of the Citizens of this Commonwealth the powers and immunities of Corporations of bodies politic in law;" They therefore declare the following to be the objects, articles and conditions of their said association, agreeably to which they desire to be incorporated, viz.:

TITLE.

1st. This Association shall be called "THE HOME FOR AGED AND INFIRM COLORED PERSONS."

OBJECT.

2d. The object of this Association shall be the relief of that worthy class of colored persons who have endeavored through life to maintain themselves, but from various causes are finally dependent upon the charity of others.

ARTICLES AND CONDITIONS.

3d. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall perform the duties usual to those positions, and a Board of Managers, twenty-four in number, who shall make all needful rules and regulations, subject to the approval of the Association at its annual meeting, to which they shall submit a report of their proceedings. The officers shall be *ex officio* members of the Board.

4th. A quorum of the Association shall be fifteen, and of the Managers, ten. The Managers shall meet at least once in each month.

5th. At each annual meeting two auditors shall be appointed to examine the Treasurer's account previous to its presentation at the next annual meeting, and report as to its correctness.

6th. Respectable colored persons may be admitted into the Home or boarded therein, with the consent of the Visiting Committee, in accordance with the rules which the Managers may adopt for the government of the Institution.

7th. The terms of membership of the Association shall be an annual contribution of two dollars. The payment of twenty-five dollars shall constitute a life membership.

8th. The Association shall meet annually, for the election of officers and other business, on the second Fifth-day (Thursday) in the First month (January) of each year, at such time and place as may be agreed on, of which two weeks' notice shall be given by the Managers.

9th. The clear yearly income of real and personal estate held by the Association shall not at any time exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars.

10th. The Association shall have power to make by-laws, not inconsistent with this Charter nor the laws of the land, and to alter and annul the same at pleasure, and a failure to elect officers at any time shall not dissolve this Corporation.

11th. If any member shall die or resign, the vacancy may be filled by the election, at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, of one to serve in his stead until the next annual meeting of the Association.

In the matter of the Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons."

And now, this second day of December, A. D., 1867, the Articles of Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons" having been heretofore, to wit, on the thirteenth day of November, A. D., 1867, filed in the office of the Prothonotary of said Court, and due notice having been inserted in a newspaper printed in said county, in due conformity to law; therefore, on motion of Edward Hopper, it is declared and decreed that the persons so associated under such articles shall, according to the articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in the law.

And it is further ordered and directed, that the said Charter of Incorporation shall be recorded in the Office for the Recording of Deeds in and for the said County of Philadelphia. And on the said instrument being so recorded, the persons so associated or meaning to associate shall, according to the objects, articles, and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a corporation or body politic in law and in fact, to have continuance by the name, style, and title in said instrument provided and declared.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the seal of the said Court, this thirteenth day of December, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

The Managers shall meet on the second Fourth-day in every month, at 4 o'clock.

ARTICLE II.

Special Meetings may be called by the Chairman, or at the request of any three members.

ARTICLE III.

All reports of Committees shall be made to the Board in writing.

ARTICLE IV.

The meetings of the Board shall be conducted according to the Rules of Order usual in similar bodies.

ARTICLE V.

Standing Committees on the following subjects shall be appointed by the Chairman at the first meeting in each current year.

- 1st. A Committee of Management.
- 2d. A Committee on Admissions.
- 3d. A Committee on Property and Finance.
- 4th. A Committee on Supplies.
- 5th. A Committee on Religious Meetings.
- 6th. A Committee on Interments.

ARTICLE VI.

The Committee of Management shall consist of the female members of the Board. They shall have a general supervision of the internal arrangements of the Home, and shall propose to the Board any regulations or measures which may be needed for its government. They shall divide themselves into the following Sub-committees:

1st. A House Committee of two, to be appointed monthly in rotation; to visit the Home each week, and endeavor to be present once during meals. They shall make themselves acquainted with the situation and wants of the inmates, generally direct the concerns of the family, and report their observations in a book provided for this purpose.

2d. A Clothing Committee of four, who shall Superintend the making and distribution of clothing, and give directions in regard to any industrial employment for the inmates.

ARTICLE VII.

The Committee on Admissions shall receive and enter applications for admission, and make the necessary inquiry in regard to the application, previous to the action of the Board thereon.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Committee on Property and Finance shall consist of the male members of the Board, and shall have charge of the real estate and financial affairs of the Home.

ARTICLE IX.

The Committee on Supplies, in conjunction with the Matron, shall make all necessary purchases for the Home.

ARTICLE X.

The Committee on Interments shall make all needful arrangements for the funerals of our inmates, and at least one of them shall be present on such occasions.

ARTICLE XI.

The Board shall appoint annually one or more physicians, to look after the health of the inmates.

RULES AND REGULATIONS,

FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE HOME.

RULE 1.

The Matron shall have the entire charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the Rules, to be present at the meals, to see that they are properly served up, and everything is on the table before the family are seated; that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick, and proper order is observed at the table. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all articles sent to the Home, whether purchased or otherwise, and an exact account of all expenditures, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M., and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person will be admitted into the Home but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least sixty years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred dollars. This rule may be varied from if so directed by the Managers. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will not be retained longer, but shall be charged board for the time they may be residents in the Home

at the rate of two and a half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which shall be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home prior to their admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for the purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of fifty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subject to the same rules, and have no privileges different from the other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Visiting Committee thereon, and any other information that may be deemed important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and that their funeral expenses shall be paid.

RULE 9.

Those received into the Home will be cared for without other expense during their lives, provided the Managers have the funds.

RULE 10.

The inmates are prohibited from soliciting aid outside of the institution.

RULE 11.

None but the Physician of the institution, or his substitute, shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner.

RULE 12.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are of ability shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 13.

Religious meetings shall be held in the Home on the first day of the week, at 10½ o'clock A. M., and 4 o'clock P. M., for those unable or not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 14.

Any one of the inmates may be visited (with their consent) for religious purposes at any suitable time; but if a religious opportunity is desired with all of the family, it must be first approved by at least two of the Managers.

RULE 15.

A bell will be rung ten minutes before each meal, when all who are able will repair to the dining-room. When seated, a suitable pause shall be observed before eating.

RULE 16.

The sick or infirm will be accommodated with meals in their own rooms, but all others will be expected to take them at the general table.

RULE 17.

It will be expected that all who are capable will make their own beds, and sweep their rooms, early every morning; such as are not will have it done for them.

RULE 18.

The inmates are expected to sew, knit or do any other services for the benefit of the Home of which they are capable.

RULE 19.

Any of the inmates desiring to visit their friends (on *their written invitation*), must obtain permission from the Matron.

RULE 20.

If any of the friends of the inmates present articles for individual use or for general distribution, the same must be placed in charge of the Matron and furnished at her discretion.

RULE 21.

No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home unless ordered by a physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 22.

No person will be permitted to interfere or find fault with the Matron. Any complaints should be made to the Managers for their action.

RULE 23.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., or after 5 P. M., except in special cases.

RULE 24.

The strictest attention must be paid by each one of the family to these Rules. For the first and second offense, the Matron will admonish the offender; for a third, she will complain to the Visiting Committee; and for a fourth, removal from the Home, if so directed by the Board.
