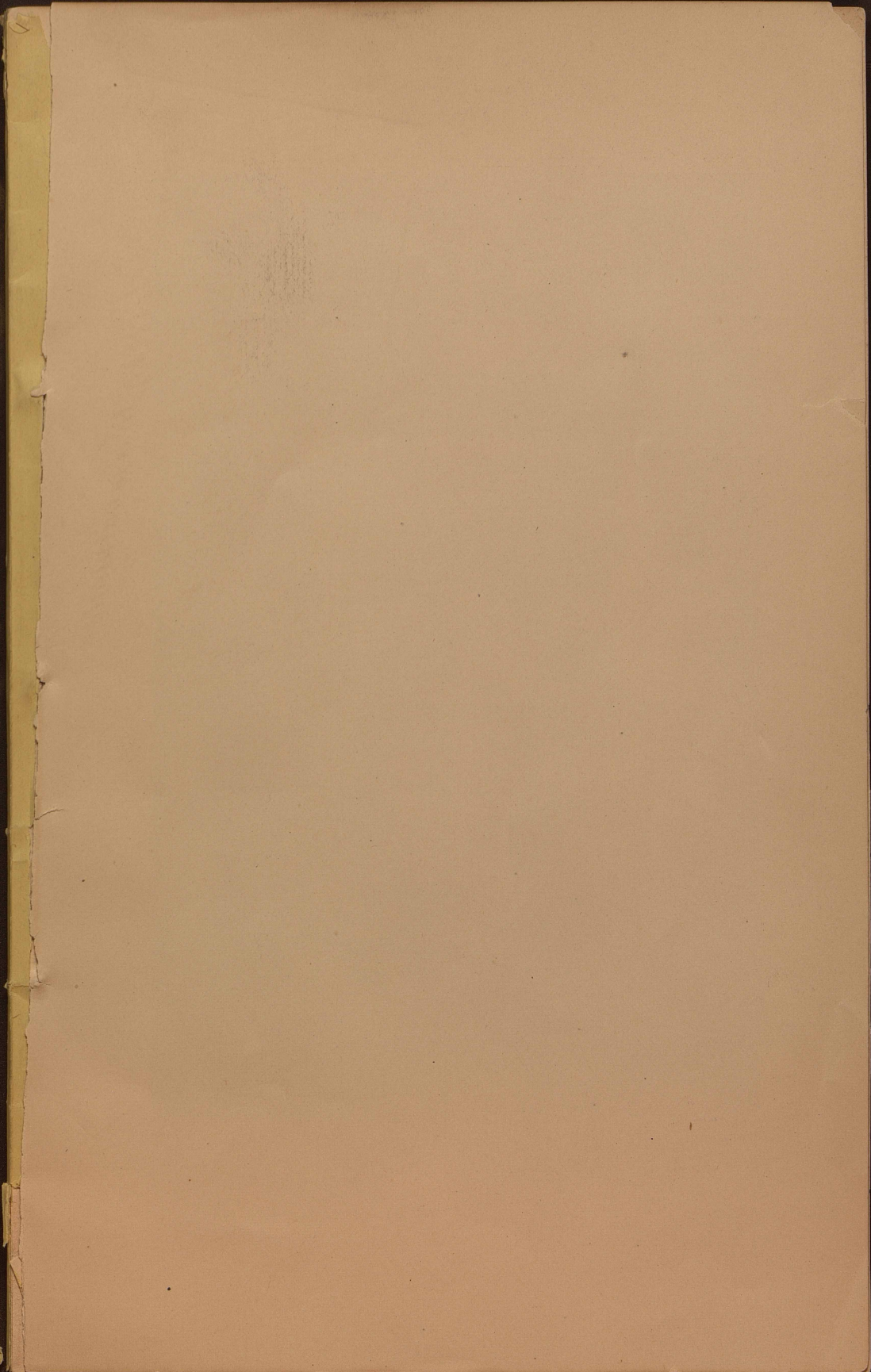
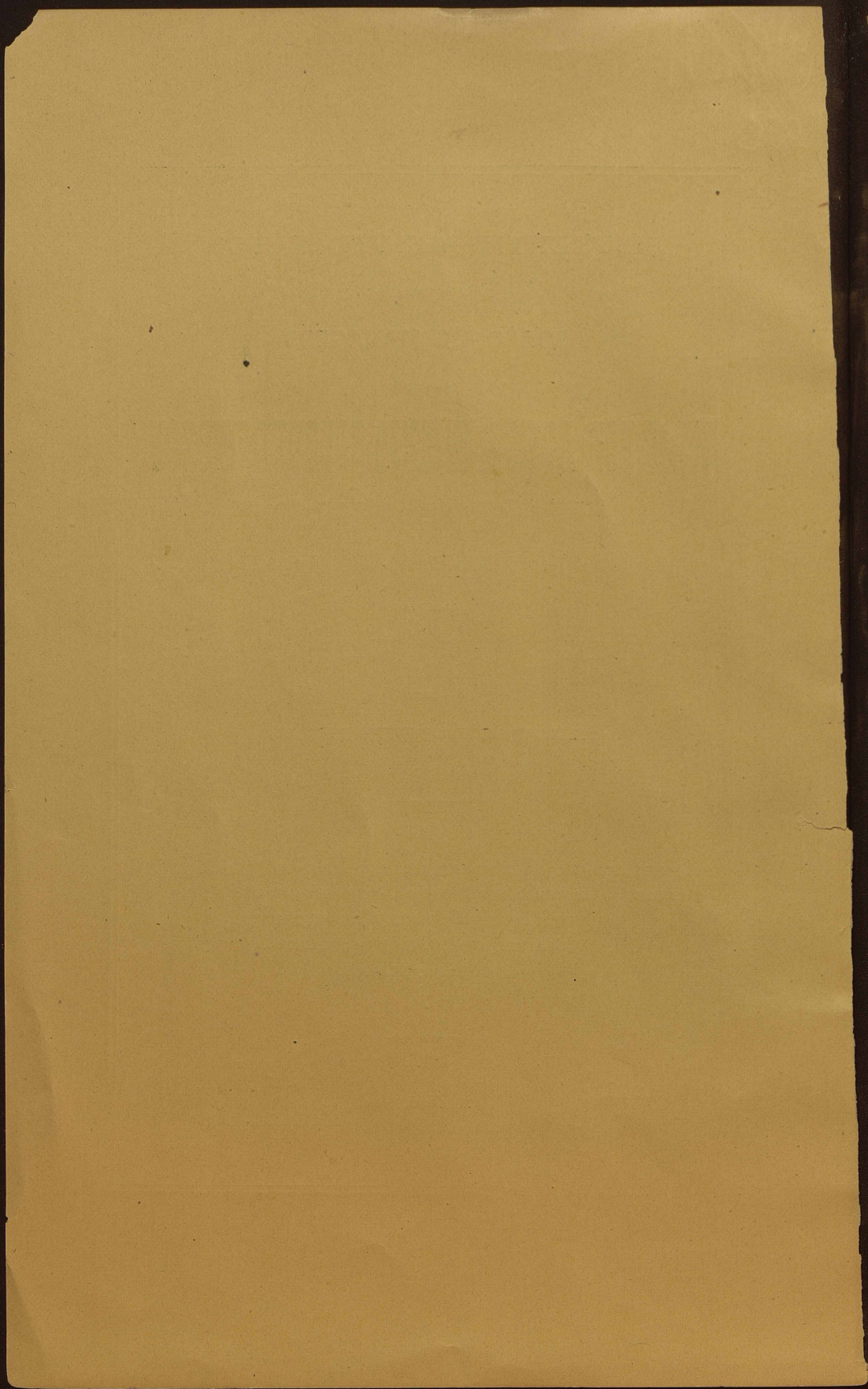

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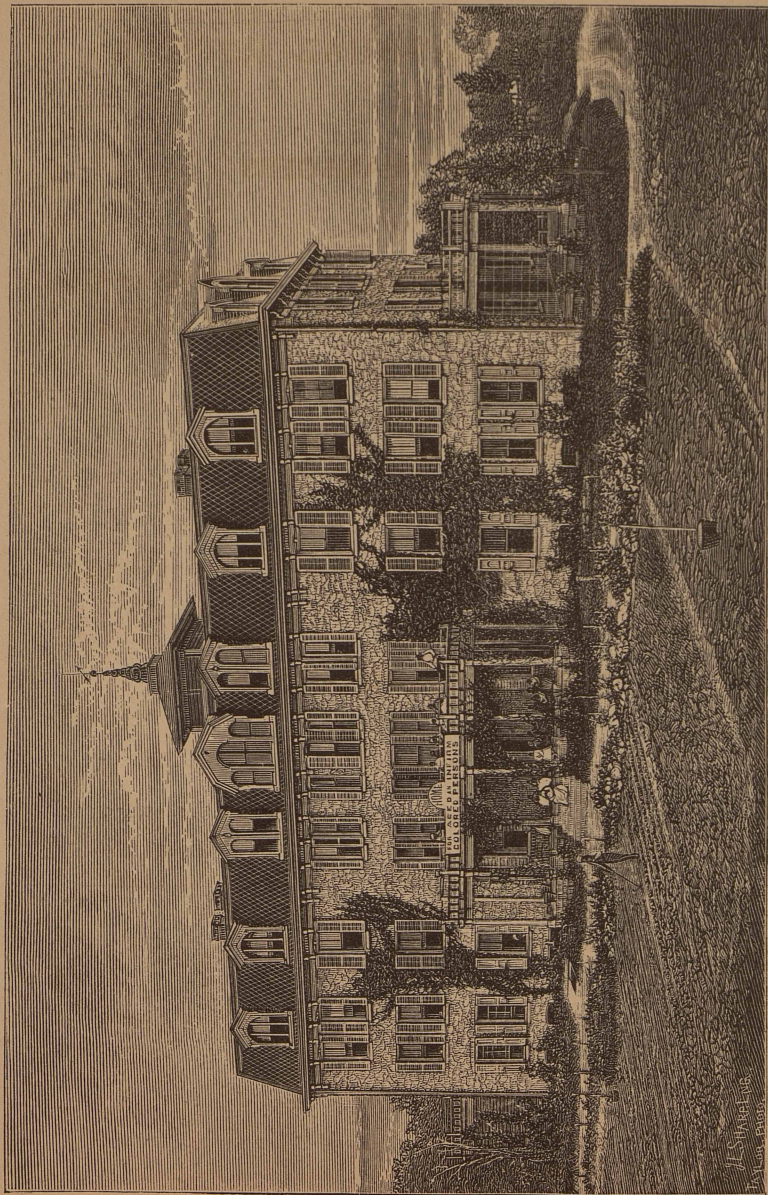

ANNUAL MEETING.

PHILADELPHIA, Sixth month 12th, 1879.

The Annual Meeting of the Contributors to the "Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons," was held this day at the Home, Girard and Belmont Avenues.

In the absence of the President, on account of a late serious indisposition, William Still was called to the chair.

The meeting was opened by Bishop Campbell asking a blessing. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.

The Annual Report as presented by the Board of Managers was then read, approved, and referred to the incoming Board for publication and distribution.

The Report of the Treasurer, Israel H. Johnson, was presented, (signed by the Auditors as correct,) read, approved and referred to the incoming Board.

It was resolved that the Chair appoint a committee of five to nominate officers to serve the ensuing year. Whereupon C. M. Phillips, Mordecai L. Buzby, Alice Pennock, Lavinia S. Harvey, and Harriet S. Duterte were appointed.

Col. John W. Forney, of the "Philadelphia Progress," was then introduced and delivered some well-timed remarks, and was followed by Rev. H. A. Knight, Samuel P. Godwin, Francis Wells, of the "Evening Bulletin," Rev. Theo. Gould, and H. H. Lewis, all of which were listened to with pleasure.

The inmates, together with some of the visitors, then sang several pieces, which were appreciated by those present.

The nominating committee presented the following names for the officers for the ensuing year, whose names being unanimously agreed to, were declared elected.

The President, pro-tem, appointed Joseph Bacon and Alfred H. Love as auditors. Then adjourned.

ANNUAL REPORT.

To the Contributors of the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons:

Time's rapid flight again brings us to the period when we should render an account of our stewardship, and although there have been seasons of difficulty and trial, we can in the survey of the past see manifested the blessings of our Heavenly Father upon our feeble efforts for the good of some of His helpless ones. May we ever feel thankful for this superintending care, and trusting in this love depend on the Holy Spirit for guidance in our future work.

Since our last year's report eight (8) have been removed by death, and two who were unwilling to obey our rules, after patient labor, it was decided to remove, but their voluntary withdrawal saved us this unpleasant duty. Twenty-one (21) have been admitted as members of our aged band of pilgrims, which now numbers eighty-seven (87), and adding our officers and employees makes up a family of one hundred persons.

Charlotte Crawford, Abby N. Paul and Diana Pinckney are the only ones still living who were admitted the first year of our organization, and only six survive of those removed to our present building.

Fifteen years have nearly expired since the initial meeting was held, and how many of the laborers in the vineyard have been removed, we trust, from works to rewards. Of the little company on that occasion all the colored brethren, viz: Maurice Hall, Abram Fields and Henry Gordon are numbered with the dead. Though no marble shaft be erected to commemorate their worth, we believe they have a far more noble monument in the Lamb's Book of Life, which endureth forever. Five only of our present Managers were members of the original Board.

In the period named, among those who have been under our care there has been a great variety of dispositions, but with all the failings that have been displayed there has also been manifested much true Christian feeling and ardent desire to serve faithfully their Lord and Master and win the crown at the end of their earthly race.

Our valued friend Ann W. Laws, who was one of the first Board of Managers and a few years later was elected Matron, has, after nearly eleven years of faithful service in that capacity, become so

enfeebled by her advancing years that her resignation seemed necessary and was accepted Second month last. Although relieved of the onerous duties of that position we have deemed it no more than due to her moral worth of character, and an evidence of our appreciation of her interest in the welfare of the Home and her devotion to the comfort of its inmates, to elect her to an honorary position in our household during the remainder of her life. We have elected Balinda Jackson as Matron, which position she has filled acceptably since Third month first.

During the past year legacies from the estates of Peter Sieger, Ellwood T. Pusey, Daniel Maule and Charlotte Eckfeldt have been received, also a liberal contribution by the Executors from the estate of Abraham L. Pennock.

We rejoice that these, as others, have remembered our institution in making their wills, as an enlarged income would enable us to do much more good, by affording the means to accommodate a greater number of inmates.

Two fire-proof stairways have been constructed to facilitate escape in case of fire, and we have in contemplation an improvement in our heating apparatus by the introduction of steam, which will not only be safer, but more healthful and reliable.

The religious opportunities have been frequent on the first as well as other days of the week, and those of various denominations who have kindly remembered the inmates of our Home doubtless feel an ample reward in the sweet peace which always results from Christian acts of benevolence.

A few extracts from our Matron's reports may not be without interest:

Seventh month.—“Since my last report we have lost one, Annie Mitchell, who came from Maryland; and, to use her words, ‘was a stranger in a strange land, and having lost all her family felt herself to be a woman of sorrow.’ She became an inmate of the Home Twelfth month, 1875, and spent the remainder of her days in doing many things for others. During her last sickness of thirteen weeks she suffered much, but was perfectly calm, in love with all and passed quietly off, asleep in Jesus.”

Ninth month.—“Our aged family keeps as healthy as could be expected considering the warm weather. Most of their ages range

from seventy-eight to one hundred and one; nine are blind; several with paralysis and some feeble minded."

Eleventh month.—"Our family is in tolerably good health; we have had but two deaths since the first summer months. The last one deceased, Sarah Brinkly, was a woman of distress for nine months, being deprived of speech, and it was truly trying to be with her."

Through the kind consideration of the Officers of the Zoological Gardens and Permanent Exhibition such of our aged ones as were not too feeble have had the gratuitous privilege of visiting these places, much to their gratification, for which our thanks are due.

On Christmas, New Years and some other occasions, entertainments have, through the kindness of friends, been furnished to cheer and interest the aged pilgrims, and they and we feel gratified for this attention.

Our physicians, Dr. Jesse W. Thatcher and Dr. S. Mason McCollin, have been attentive to their duties and merit our thanks.

Considering that some of our inmates are centenarians and all are, in general, very far advanced in years, the health of the institution has been remarkably good.

CHARTER OF INCORPORATION.

WHEREAS, The undersigned citizens of this Commonwealth have, together with other citizens, associated for the purpose of establishing in the City of Philadelphia a Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, and are desirous of being incorporated agreeably to the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, entitled, "An Act to confer on certain Associations of the Citizens of this Commonwealth the powers and immunities of Corporations, or bodies politic in law." They therefore declare the following to be the objects, articles and conditions of their said association, agreeably to which they desire to be incorporated, viz. :

TITLE.

1st. This Association shall be called "THE HOME FOR AGED AND INFIRM COLORED PERSONS."

OBJECT.

2d. The object of this Association shall be the relief of that worthy class of colored persons who have endeavored through life to maintain themselves, but from various causes are finally dependent upon the charity of others.

ARTICLES AND CONDITIONS.

3d. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall perform the duties usual to those positions, and a Board of Managers, twenty-four in number, who shall make all needful rules and regulations, subject to the approval of the Association at its annual meeting, to which they shall submit a report

of their proceedings. The officers shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board.

4th. A quorum of the Association shall be fifteen, and of the Managers, ten. The Managers shall meet at least once in each month.

5th. At each annual meeting, two auditors shall be appointed to examine the Treasurer's account previous to its presentation at the next annual meeting, and report as to its correctness.

6th. Respectable colored persons may be admitted into the Home or boarded therein, with the consent of the Visiting Committee, in accordance with the rules which the Managers may adopt for the government of the Institution.

7th. The terms of membership of the Association shall be an annual contribution of two dollars. The payment of twenty-five dollars shall constitute a life membership.

8th. The Association shall meet annually, for the election of officers and other business, on the second Fifth-day (Thursday) in the Sixth month (June) of each year, at such time and place as may be agreed on, of which two weeks' notice shall be given by the Managers.*

9th. The clear yearly income of real and personal estate held by the Association shall not at any time exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars.

10th. The Association shall have power to make By-Laws, not inconsistent with this Charter nor the laws of the land, and to alter and annul the same at pleasure, and a failure to elect officers at any time shall not dissolve this Corporation.

11th. If any member shall die or resign the vacancy may be filled by the election, at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, of one to serve in his stead until the next annual meeting of the Association.

Infirm Colored Persons."*

And now, this second day of December, A. D. 1867, the Articles of Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons" having been heretofore, to wit, on the thirteenth day of November, A. D. 1867, filed in the office of the Prothonotary of said Court, and due notice having been inserted in a newspaper printed in said county, in due conformity to law; therefore, on motion of Edward Hopper, it is declared and decreed, that the persons so associated under such articles shall, according to the articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in the law.

And it is further ordered and directed that the said Charter of Incorporation shall be recorded in the Office for the Recording of Deeds in and for the said County of Philadelphia. And on the said instrument being so recorded, the persons so associated or meaning to associate shall, according to the objects, articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a corporation or body politic in law and in fact, to have continuance by the name, style and title in said instrument provided and declared.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the seal of the said Court, this thirteenth day of December, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

The Managers shall meet on the second Fourth-day in every month, at 4 o'clock.

ARTICLE II.

Special Meetings may be called by the Chairman, or at the request of any three members.

ARTICLE III.

All reports of committees shall be made to the Board in writing.

ARTICLE IV.

The meetings of the Board shall be conducted according to the Rules of Order usual in similar bodies.

ARTICLE V.

Standing committees on the following subjects shall be appointed by the Chairman at the first meeting in each current year :

- 1st. A Committee of Management.
- 2d. A Committee on Admissions.
- 3d. A Committee on Property and Finance.
- 4th. A Committee on Supplies.
- 5th. A Committee on Religious Meetings.
- 6th. A Committee on Interments.

ARTICLE VI.

The Committee of Management shall consist of the female members of the Board. They shall have a general supervision of the internal arrangements of the Home, and shall propose to the Board any regulations or measures which may be needed for its government. They shall divide themselves into the following Sub-committees :

1st. A House Committee of two, to be appointed monthly in rotation ; to visit the Home each week, and endeavor to be present once during meals. They shall make themselves acquainted with the situation and wants of the inmates, generally direct the concerns of the family, and report their observations in a book provided for this purpose.

2d. A Clothing Committee of four, who shall superintend the making and distribution of clothing, and give directions in regard to any industrial employment for the inmates.

ARTICLE VII.

The Committee on Admissions shall receive and enter applications for admission, and make the necessary inquiry in regard to the application, previous to the action of the Board thereon.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Committee on Property and Finance shall consist of the male members of the Board, and shall have charge of the real estate and financial affairs of the Home.

ARTICLE IX.

The Committee on Supplies, in conjunction with the Matron, shall make all necessary purchases for the Home.

ARTICLE X.

The Committee on Interments shall make all needful arrangements for the funerals of our inmates, and at least one of them shall be present on such occasions.

ARTICLE XI.

The Board shall appoint annually one or more physicians, to look after the health of the inmates.

 RULES.

RULE 1.

The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the rules, see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarrelling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M., and see that all unnecessary fires and light are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person will be admitted into the Home, but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least sixty years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred dollars, unless otherwise directed by the Board of Managers. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will be retained no longer, but shall be charged board for the time they may be

residents in the Home at the rate of two and a-half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which is to be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to their admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the Institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for the purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of sixty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the Institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subject to the same rules, and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Committee on Admissions thereon, and any information that may be deemed important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death, their funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 9.

None but the Physician of the Institution, or his substitute, shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at liberty to employ such, provided the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the Institution.

RULE 10.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 11.

Religious Meetings shall be held in the Home on the first day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12.

Any of the inmates desiring to visit their friends, (on their written invitation,) must obtain permission from the Matron.

RULE 13.

No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home, unless ordered by the Physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 14.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.
