SIXTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING.

PHILADELPHIA, Sixth month 10th, 1880.

The Annual Meeting of the Contributors to the "Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons," was held at the Home this day.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Dillwyn Parrish. The Rev. B. F. Tanner offered prayer.

The minutes of our last annual meeting were read and approved.

The Board of Managers then presented their Annual Report, which was read, approved and referred to the incoming Board for publication and distribution.

The Report of the Treasurer was presented, showing that the income from all sources for the past year amounted to \$10,540.43 and the expenditures \$9916.24, leaving the small balance of \$624.19 now in his hands.

It was on motion resolved that a committee of four be appointed to nominate officers for the ensuing year. Whereupon the President appointed the following: Sarah Lewis, Hannah Stokes, Dr. J. B. Reeves and Samuel P. Godwin.

After singing by the inmates and others, addresses were delivered by Fannie M. Jackson, Rev. Dr. Henry C. M'Cook, Bishop Campbell, Edwin H. Coates, Dr. Reeves, Samuel P. Godwin and Dr. Tanner. Their varied subjects elicited much interest, and were well received by those present.

One of the inmates, known as "Grandmother Hogwood" and believed to be one hundred and four years of age, then addressed the meeting, thanking those who had been so generous and kind in keeping up such a blessed institution, where she and others could find a resting place in their old days.

Ann W. Laws, our former Matron, also spoke feelingly to the Managers and inmates, of the high regard she had always felt for them; and rejoiced that no unpleasant word had ever passed between any of the Managers and herself.

The committee on nomination reported names for officers, managers and co-operative committee, who were unanimously elected to serve for the ensuing year.

The President then appointed as auditors for the ensuing year, Joseph Bacon and Alfred H. Love. Adjourned.

SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Board of Managers whose term of office is about to expire, take pleasure in presenting to the *Contributors* to the funds for the support of the Home, this, their Annual Report of their labours for the past year. They feel thankful they have been able by means of your liberal contributions, to maintain a comfortable home for such a large number of old and infirm men and women, who, bowed down by the infirmities of many winters, are unable to labor for their support; and who might, but for your generous assistance, have been suffering from want and exposure. Remember: "He that giveth to the poor lendeth to the Lord."

Since our last annual report twelve of the inmates have been removed by death (four men and eight women), twenty admitted (six men and fourteen women); making the total number in the Home, Sixth month first, ninety-six, which with eleven employees make a family of one hundred and seven depending almost wholly upon your charity.

The capacity of the Home being limited to one hundred inmates, and being now about full, we shall be unable to receive applications from those living outside of the city, without you and others kindly disposed, will come forward and pledge a sufficient amount to increase the capacity of the building; otherwise our great work must be limited to its present numbers.

We report with sorrow the sudden death (by heart disease) of our Housekeeper, Anna W. Crippen; who died the 25th of last July. She filled the position acceptably to the Board of Managers. The Board did not deem it necessary to again fill the position, as they considered the Matron fully able to discharge the duties of Housekeeper.

During the past year legacies have been received from David Milne, Dr. Joseph W. Taylor and Lucy Taylor; the latter a temporary boarder in the Home, who was so well pleased with the kindness shown her, and the comfort received, that she bequeathed her entire estate to the institution. A tribute from one whom she had so tenderly nursed and cared for, is annexed; showing with what respect she ever had been held,

The religious exercises have been regularly maintained during the past year; those on the Sabbath, being held by the different denominations in a truly Christian-like and sympathetic manner; often being seasons of deep religious feelings.

The Board, in behalf of the inmates, cordially extend their thanks to the Officers of the Zoological Garden and Permanent Exhibition Company, for the kind invitations to visit, free of charge, their respective exhibitions; to John Collins and Rev. John G. Bawn, Jr. for stereopticon and magic lantern entertainments; also, to the Fisk Jubilee Singers, for one of their delightful visits.

We append herewith the report of our Treasurer, whose accounts have been examined by your auditors, and found correct. The item of repairs for the past year has been increased, by the additions and improvement of the building. Our grounds are utilized as a vegetable garden, producing almost sufficient to supply our table.

The cost of maintaining each inmate averages about eighty-eight dollars per year, inclusive of all improvements.

The Managers extend their thanks to all the employees, who, by their unwearied attention and kindness, have assisted them in their efforts to make the institution a *Home* in the full meaning of the word.

We would acknowledge the gratuitous services of Ann Ware and Jane Johnson, in laying out the dead since our Home was opened. Respectfully submitted on behalf of the Board of Managers.

In memory of LUCY TAYLOR, who was a boarder in this Home for five months before her death, which occurred on February 14th, 1880, in the 81st year of her age.

She had lived in the family of Mr. Andrew D. Cash for fifty-five years, and until it was broken up—had been faithful in her labors and in the full performance of all her duties, and had in that time accumulated the sum of four thousand dollars, the interest of which she used to pay her board for several years before her death. It was of her own free will and choice that she come to this Home in her old age, to enjoy the pure air of the country and the beautiful scenery which she delighted in, and so happy was she in the respect and affection shown her there by all who knew her, from the lady managers to the lowliest inmate; so deeply impressed was she with the excellence of the Institution, and the desire to do her share towards benefitting her own race, that at her own request her will was made leaving her entire fortune to this Home.

Her character as a faithful servant and friend, and as a true Christian, is worthy to be recorded and imitated.

She has "Inherited the Kingdom of Heaven," for she was "meek and lowly in spirit." She has "obtained mercy," for she "was merciful." She was "pure in heart," and "has seen God." In faith she had become as "a little child," and far greater than all she possessed that "charity which suffereth long and is kind, and thinketh no evil."

In her illness she was surrounded by those who had loved her for years. She died as she had lived—hopeful—full of faith and joy, and resigned to her Heavenly Father's will. May her example live in this Institution, and may her memory long remain fresh and green in this Home, as it will in the home and hearts of those whom she so faithfully served for years.

I, whom she so tenderly nursed and cared for, pay this loving tribute, to her memory.

CHARTER OF INCORPORATION.

WHEREAS, the undersigned citizens of this Commonwealth have, together with other citizens, associated for the purpose of establishing in the City of Philadelphia a Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, and are desirous of being incorporated agreeably to the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, entitled, "An Act to confer on certain Associations of the Citizens of this Commonwealth the powers and immunities of Corporations, or bodies politic in law." They therefore declare the following to be the objects, articles and conditions of their said association, agreeably to which they desire to be incorporated, viz.:

TITLE.

1st. This Association shall be called "THE HOME FOR AGED AND INFIRM COLORED PERSONS."

OBJECT.

2d. The object of this Association shall be the relief of that worthy class of colored persons who have endeavored through life to maintain themselves, but from various causes are finally dependent upon the charity of others.

ARTICLES AND CONDITIONS.

3d. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall perform the duties usual to those positions, and a Board of Managers, twenty-four in number, who shall make all needful rules and regulations, subject to the approval of the Association at its annual meeting, to which they shall submit a report of their proceedings. The officers shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board.

4th. A quorum of the Association shall be fifteen, and of the Managers, ten. The Managers shall meet at least once in each month.

5th. At each annual meeting, two auditors shall be appointed to examine the Treasurer's account previous to its presentation at the next annual meeting, and report as to its correctness.

6th. Respectable colored persons may be admitted into the Home or boarded therein, with the consent of the Visiting Committee, in accordance with the rules which the Managers may adopt for the government of the Institution.

7th. The terms of membership of the Association shall be an annual contribution of two dollars. The payment of twenty-five dollars shall constitute a life membership.

8th. The Association shall meet annually, for the election of officers and other business, on the second Fifth-day (Thursday) in the Sixth month (June) of each year, at such time and place as may be agreed on, of which two weeks' notice shall be given by the Managers.*

9th. The clear yearly income of real and personal estate held by the Association shall not at any time exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars.

10th. The Association shall have power to make By-Laws, not inconsistent with this Charter nor the laws of the land, and to alter and annul the same at pleasure, and a failure to elect officers at any time shall not dissolve this Corporation.

11th. If any member shall die or resign the vacancy may be filled by the election, at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, of one to serve in his stead until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IN THE COURT OF COMMON PLEAS, IN AND FOR
THE COUNTY OF PHILADELPHIA.

*In the matter of the Incorporation of "The Home for Aged
and Infirm Colored Persons."*

And now, this second day of December, A. D. 1867, the Articles of Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons" having been heretofore, to wit, on the thirteenth day of November, A. D. 1867, filed in the office of the Prothonotary of said Court, and due notice having been inserted in a newspaper printed in said county, in due conformity to law; therefore, on motion of Edward Hopper, it is declared and decreed, that the persons so associated under such articles shall, according to the articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in the law.

And it is further ordered and directed that the said Charter of Incorporation shall be recorded in the Office for the Recording of Deeds in and for the said County of Philadelphia. And on the said instrument being so recorded, the persons so associated or meaning to associate shall, according to the objects, articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a corporation or body politic in law and in fact, to have continuance by the name, style and title in said instrument provided and declared.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the seal of the said Court, this thirteenth day of December, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

The Managers shall meet on the second Fourth-day in every month, at 4 o'clock.

ARTICLE II.

Special Meetings may be called by the Chairman, or at the request of any three members.

ARTICLE III.

All reports of committees shall be made to the Board in writing.

ARTICLE IV.

The meetings of the Board shall be conducted according to the Rules of Order usual in similar bodies.

ARTICLE V.

Standing committees on the following subjects shall be appointed by the Chairman at the first meeting in each current year:

- 1st. A Committee of Management.
- 2d. A Committee on Admission.
- 3d. A Committee on Property and Finance.
- 4th. A Committee on Supplies.
- 5th. A Committee on Religious Meetings.
- 6th. A Committee on Interments.

ARTICLE VI.

The Committee of Management shall consist of the female members of the Board. They shall have a general supervision of the internal arrangement of the Home, and shall propose to the Board any regulations or measures which may be needed for its government. They shall divide themselves into the following Sub-committees:

1st. A House Committee of two, to be appointed monthly in rotation; to visit the Home each week, and endeavor to be present once during meals. They shall make themselves acquainted with the situation and wants of the inmates, generally direct the concerns of the family, and report their observations in a book provided for this purpose.

2d. A Clothing Committee of four, who shall superintend the making and distribution of clothing, and give directions in regard to any industrial employment of the inmates.

ARTICLE VII.

The Committee on Admissions shall receive and enter applications for admission, and make the necessary inquiry in regard to the application, previous to the action of the Board thereon.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Committee on Property and Finance shall consist of the male members of the Board, and shall have charge of the real estate and financial affairs of the Home.

ARTICLE IX.

The Committee on Supplies, in conjunction with the Matron, shall make all necessary purchases for the Home.

ARTICLE X.

The Committee on Interments shall make all needful arrangements for the funerals of our inmates, and at least one of them shall be present on such occasions.

ARTICLE XI.

The Board shall appoint annually one or more physicians, to look after the health of the inmates.

RULES.

RULE 1.

The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the rules, see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarrelling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M., and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person will be admitted to the Home, but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least sixty years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred dollars, unless otherwise directed by the Board of Managers. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will be retained no longer, but shall be charged board for the time they may be

residents in the Home at the rate of two and a-half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which is to be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the Institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of sixty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the Institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subject to the same rules, and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Committee on Admissions thereon, and any information they may deem important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death, the funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 9.

None but the Physician of the Institution, or his substitute, shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at liberty to employ such, provided the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the Institution.

RULE 10.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 11.

Religious Meetings shall be held in the Home on the first day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12.

Any of the inmates desiring to visit their friends (on their written invitation), must obtain permission from the Matron.

RULE 13.

No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home, unless ordered by the Physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 14.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.
