SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING.

PHILADELPHIA, 6 Mo. 9th, 1881.

The annual meeting of the Contributors to the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, was held at the Home, Belmont and Girard Avenues this day.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Dillwyn Parrish.

The proceedings were commenced by Rev. Wm. S. Heaton in prayer, after which the minutes of the last annual meeting were read.

The annual report of the Board of Managers, showing the condition of the Home for the past fiscal year was read, considered and referred to the incoming Board for publication and distribution.

The report of our Treasurer (which has been examined and found correct by the auditors) was presented and read ; after which, it was approved and directed to be placed upon the minutes.

It was on motion resolved, that a committee be appointed to bring forward the names of suitable persons (who are contributors) to act as officers for the ensuing year.

The President appointed the following as the nominating committee, C. M. Phillips, Dr. Caroline V. Anderson, Lavinia S. Harvey, Thomas H. Davis and H. S. Duterte.

Rev. George Dana Boardman delivered a short and instructive address, and was followed by Rev. Charles G. Ames. Miss Fanny M. Jackson with some of her pupils sang some selections, after which Miss Jackson gave a very interesting account of the proposed industrial school, to be established for the benefit of colored youth of both sexes.

Rev. Joseph S. Thompson made an address, and was followed by Mrs. Wistar Morris in a few remarks full of sympathy and encouragement.

Rev. Mr. Beckett, sang a Hymn, and one of the inmates who has attained the remarkable age of one hundred and five years spoke a few words, and sang several verses of a hymn.

The report of the nominating committee being received, they reported the names of officers and managers, (see page three) who were duly chosen.

After a few words from our Treasurer, Israel H. Johnson, who urged upon those present the necessity of maintaining their interest in the Institution to enable us to continue the good work, and appropriate remarks from Samuel Emlen the meeting adjourned.

Harriet Smith,

Born 12 mo., 25, 1797. Died 8 mo., 17, 1880.

Whereas, since our last meeting, there has been removed from among us, by the hand of death, our friend and associate HARRIET SMITH, and whereas, it is fitting that we should place on record some tribute to her memory: therefore

RESOLVED: That in the death of HARRIET SMITH, the Home has lost a devoted friend, who from its beginning evinced a deep interest in its welfare; one to whose council, encouragement and effective aid the present building was largely indebted for its erection, during the life time of herself and husband; and who while her health permitted gave evidence of her interest by her frequent visits to its inmates.

To the Members and Contributors to the Home for Aged and
Infirm Colored Persons.

In presenting the Seventeenth Annual Report of our Institution, we would reiterate our thankfulness to an over ruling Providence, who has continued to bless our labors in this part of His vineyard. Perhaps never in the existence of the Home has it been more prosperous.

Having an abiding faith that our contributors are not weary in well doing, we have admitted during the year, 8 men and 12 women; whilst ten have died and two left voluntarily; thus making the number of our wards at present 104, of whom 25 are men and 79 women.

This large family considering their age, is unusually healthy. We apprehend the care exercised for the comfort and happiness of those under our charge will compare favorably with any similar Institution.

It is proper that we should acknowledge the faithfulness of our employees and the prompt attention of our physicians, which has contributed to this end.

During the year several small legacies have been received, thus continuing after death, the interest in our work, manifested during life by so many of our contributors. We hope their example may be followed by many; as with a larger investment and increased donations, we could very materially extend our usefulness. The chief need of the home at present is money to carry the good work to more completeness. A new wing is needed, where all the sick, who are obliged to keep their beds, may be gathered into one place. The economy and convenience of a sick ward are evident. Old people are naturally chilly and being sick are more so.

A sick ward could be heated and ventilated far more thoroughly and at the same time, at less expense than the large rooms in different parts of the building. Again, the work of attendance would be greatly lessened, and lastly it is neither healthy nor convenient, to have sick and well in rooms together. It is a restraint upon the well ones, and not pleasant for the others.

Some thoughtful friend may inquire whether the inmates could not aid considerably by sewing and knitting. In the language of their intelligent and capable Matron, we reply that washing, ironing, scrubbing, hoeing, digging up roots, and "grubbing" are not the occupations which leave the hands fitted for the nimble and delicate needle. But they do what they can, and who shall require more? They take care of their own rooms, and assist in the work of the house, inside and out. Those who can, sew carpet rags and piece quilts. The stronger ones show a cheerful alacrity in waiting upon the sick and it is often deeply touching to see one of these companions in age and infirmity helping along another who is blind or more feeble than himself.

So to the extent of their ability they bear one another's burdens, and are not forgetful to be pitiful and courteous.

The exercises at the Home on Donation Day, were very interesting. Although it was one of the coldest days of the past cold winter it was well attended, and the speeches of Rev. Chas. G. Ames, Judge Tourgee, Judge Peirce, Bishop Campbell and others, warmed the blood of all who heard them, and made the occasion a memorable one.

A donation of \$500 dollars was presented by the children of Lucretia Mott, and Judge Pierce presented a check for \$25 from Sophia Pierce's Estate.

Religious meetings have been held at the Home during the year, with increasing interest. At times they have been much crowded and we believe that they have been periods of great refreshing to all who have been present.

Since last report, Harriet Smith, and Sarah D. Barnard who for many years, were connected with the management of the Home, have entered into life. How truly may it be said of these faithful friends of humanity, that they rest from their labors, and their works do follow them. Lucretia Mott, has also passed to her eternal reward; yet her presence shines softly here to-day in the memory of her life long services for these, His little ones. Her gentle ministrations distilled as the dew, and her devotion to the cause of justice and freedom for all men, was as constant and as

unvaried as the sun in its daily course. The example of her life is a shining light that will shine more and more, unto the perfect day.

In view of the Bi-Centennial of the settlement of Penna., to be celebrated next year, it may not be amiss to sketch again the history of this labor of love for the benefit of the Aged and Infirm, a work which certainly is in harmony with the humanitarian, peace-loving spirit of the founder of our commonwealth. With no disrespect to a necessary charity, we can but remember that as late as 1864, the only charitable Institution whose doors were open to colored men and women in the extremity of age and Infirmity was the *the Almshouse*. This fact was brought keenly home to the hearts of a few Friends by the case of Eliza Perry, an escaped slave. She after a long life of hard and faithful service as a domestic, worn out by labor and enfeebled by age found no place in which to rest her grey head and die, but in the Almshouse. A lady who from youth had known and esteemed her, felt such regret for this sequel to an industrious life, that the desire arose in her mind for some Asylum for others who might be similarly circumstanced. She expressed this feeling to her friends, among them her neighbor Maurice Hall, whom she often talked with on this subject. He informed her that the Stewards of Bethel A. M. E. Church, under the leadership of Jabez Pitt Campbell, had already held a meeting to consider the establishment of such an Asylum for their pensioned members, and that the Stewards had been informed by Stephen Smith that he had made provision for such an Institution in his will; so the matter was allowed to rest. But the friend of this cause, fearing that the anticipated bequest of Stephen Smith might be in a distant future, resolved to try to supply earlier what seemed to her so urgent a need. Continuing to press it on her friends' attention she gradually interested some of them; but the improvement in the management of the Almshouse seemed to many to do away with the necessity of another establishment.

A subscription paper was issued and some contributions received, the first being fifty cents by a Friend, and perhaps the second was ten cents donated by a young store girl, who chanced to hear the

concern spoken of and sympathizing therewith, desired to throw in her mite to aid in its fulfillment.

Enquiry was made for accomodations, which it was thought at first must be very limited, and the rental from the widow of Bishop Brown of two not very large rooms was contemplated.

About this time the concern seemed to ripen in other minds; the calling of a few persons together to consider the proposition was suggested, and a meeting was held 9 mo., 19, 1864.

After consultation it was concluded to invite another meeting by circular, and a committee of two were named to attend thereto.

The meeting was held on the afternoon of 9 mo., 28, 1864.

Another meeting was held 10 mo., 17, 1864, when sufficient subscriptions and pledges being reported to warrant it, an organization was proceeded with. A constitution was adopted 10 mo., 25, 1864, and at a meeting 11 mo., 3, in the basement of St. Thomas' Church Fifth and Adelphi Sts., officers were chosen and 12 managers of each sex; of whom only five now remain connected with its management.

Before the close of the year, the dwelling 340 S. Front St., was purchased (but not clear of debt till the following year,) donations of furniture and other necessaries were received, and Millicent B. Parvin, who had been an assistant matron at the Pennsylvania Hospital was selected as Matron.

12 mo., 13th, 1867 an act of incorporation was secured and in 1868 an addition to the building was made but this was not sufficient to meet the demand for admission.

Near the close of 1869 Stephen Smith encouraged by his wife Harriet Smith, donated about one acre of land and in the two years following presented ground rents valued at \$28,000 which enabled us to erect the present edifice, the corner stone of which was laid 10 mo., 13, 1870. It was dedicated 6 mo., 29, 1871, and the inmates removed thither, 8 mo., 7, 1871.

Since the organization, 46 men and 187 women have been admitted, 19 men and 100 women have deceased, and 8 women and 2 men left voluntary.

The average age of those who have deceased was 79 years.

Thus it will be seen that, that which was in its inception as the grain of mustard seed, has become as it were a great tree, dispensing shade and comfort to many weary ones, and affording a quiet retreat to these aged fathers and mothers, who now beside the silent sea await the muffled oar.

A word about the founders Stephen and Harriet Smith. Stephen Smith was born in 1795 four miles from Columbia, Lancaster Co., Penna. At the time of his birth slavery had been abolished in Penna., but minors born in slavery had to serve till they were Twenty-one; so little Stephen at four years of age was sold to a lumber dealer for the term of his minority. When he reached manhood he set up in the lumber business for himself, with a capital of \$50 and a first rate wife. "Uncle Smith" always had a keen eye and a clear head for business. Although he only had what education he had given himself, he was more than a match for any of our school boys in arithmetic. After 78 years of useful and honorable service for his family and his people he died, 9 mo., 14, 1873, worth \$200,000. Those who know what kind of woman Harriet Smith was, know how very fitting and just the inscription upon this Home is: "Founded by Stephen Smith and Harriet his wife." The manly fairness of this inscription indicates that Stephen Smith not only traveled a long way from chattelism to manhood, but that he also traveled a long way on the road to that higher manhood, which honorably recognizes an equal co-laborer, in a faithful, energetic, cool headed and sagacious wife.

Our thanks are due to the officers of the Zoological Garden, and Permanent Exhibition for free admission to the Inmates, also to many kind friends who have remembered the home on New Year's, Christmas, Thanksgiving, Fourth of July, Donation Day and at other times

CHARTER OF INCORPORATION.

WHEREAS, the undersigned citizens of this Commonwealth have, together with other citizens, associated for the purpose of establishing in the City of Philadelphia a Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, and are desirous of being incorporated agreeably to the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, entitled, "An Act to confer on certain Associations of the Citizens of this Commonwealth the powers and immunities of Corporations, or bodies politic in law." They therefore declare the following to be the objects, articles and conditions of their said association, agreeably to which they desire to be incorporated, viz.:

TITLE.

1st. This Association shall be called "THE HOME FOR AGED AND INFIRM COLORED PERSONS."

OBJECT.

2nd. The object of this Association shall be the relief of that worthy class of colored persons who have endeavored through life to maintain themselves, but from various causes are finally dependent upon the charity of others.

ARTICLES AND CONDITIONS.

3rd. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall perform the duties usual to those positions, and a Board of Managers, twenty-four in number, who shall make all needful rules and regulations, subject to the approval of the Association at its annual meeting, to which they shall submit a report of their proceedings. The officers shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board.

4th. A quorum of the Association shall be fifteen, and of the Managers, ten. The Managers shall meet at least once in each month.

5th. At each annual meeting, two auditors shall be appointed to examine the Treasurer's account previous to its presentation at the next annual meeting, and report as to its correctness.

6th. Respectable colored persons may be admitted into the Home or boarded therein, with the consent of the Visiting Committee, in accordance with the rules which the Managers may adopt for the government of the Institution.

7th. The terms of membership of the Association shall be an annual contribution of two dollars. The payment of twenty-five dollars shall constitute a life membership.

8th. The Association shall meet annually, for the election of officers and other business, on the second Fifth-day (Thursday) in the Sixth month (June) of each year, at such time and place as may be agreed on, of which two weeks' notice shall be given by the Managers.*

9th. The clear yearly income of real and personal estate held by the Association shall not at any time exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars.

10th. The Association shall have the power to make By-Laws, not inconsistent with this Charter nor the laws of the land, and to alter and annul the same at pleasure, and a failure to elect officers at any time shall not dissolve this Corporation.

11th. If any member shall die or resign, the vacancy may be filled by the election, at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, of one to serve in his stead until the next annual meeting of the Association.

And now, this second day of December, A. D. 1867, the Articles of Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons" having been heretofore, to wit, on the thirteenth day of November, A. D. 1867, filed in the office of the Prothonotary of said Court, and due notice having been inserted in a newspaper printed in said county, in due conformity to law; therefore, on motion of Edward Hopper, it is declared and decreed, that the persons so associated under such articles shall, according to the articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in the law.

And it is further ordered and directed that the said Charter of Incorporation shall be recorded in the Office for the Recording of Deeds in and for the said County of Philadelphia. And on the said instrument being so recorded, the persons so associated or meaning to associate shall, according to the objects, articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a corporation or body politic in law and in fact, to have continuance by the name, style and title in said instrument provided and declared.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the seal of the said Court, this thirteenth day of December, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

The Managers shall meet on the second Fourth-day in every month, at 4 o'clock.

ARTICLE II.

Special Meetings may be called by the Chairman, or at the request of any three members.

ARTICLE III.

All reports of committees shall be made to the Board in writing.

ARTICLE IV.

The meetings of the Board shall be conducted according to the Rules of Order usual in similar bodies.

ARTICLE V.

Standing committees on the following subjects shall be appointed by the chairman at the first meeting in each current year :

- 1st. A Committee of Management.
- 2d. A Committee on Admissions.
- 3d. A Committee on Property and Finance.
- 4th. A Committee on Supplies.
- 5th. A Committee on Religious Meetings.
- 6th. A Committee on Interments.

ARTICLE VI.

The Committee of Management shall consist of the female members of the Board. They shall have a general supervision of the internal arrangement of the Home, and shall propose to the Board any regulations or measures which may be needed for its government. They shall divide themselves into the following Sub-committees:

1st. A House Committee of two, to be appointed monthly in rotation; to visit the Home each week, and endeavor to be present once during meals. They shall make themselves acquainted with the situation and wants of the inmates, generally direct the concerns of the family, and report their observations in a book provided for this purpose.

2nd. A Clothing Committee of four, who shall superintend the making and distribution of clothing, and give directions in regard to any industrial employment of the inmates.

ARTICLE VII.

The Committee on Admissions shall receive and enter applications for admission, and make the necessary inquiry in regard to the application, previous to the action of the Board thereon.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Committee on Property and Finance shall consist of the male members of the Board, and shall have charge of the real estate and financial affairs of the Home.

ARTICLE IX.

The Committee on Supplies, in conjunction with the Matron, shall make all necessary purchases for the Home.

ARTICLE X.

The Committee on Interments shall make all needful arrangements for the funerals of our inmates, and at least one of them shall be present on such occasions.

ARTICLE XI.

The Board shall appoint annually one or more physicians, to look after the health of the inmates.

ARTICLE XII.

RULES.

RULE 1.

The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the rules, see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M. and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person shall be admitted to the Home, but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least sixty years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred dollars, unless otherwise directed by the Board of Managers. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will be retained no longer, but shall be charged board for the time they may be

residents in the Home at the rate of two and a half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which is to be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the Institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of sixty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the Institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subject to the same rules, and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Committee on Admissions thereon, and any information they may deem important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death, the funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 9.

None but the Physician of the Institution, or his substitute, shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at liberty to employ such, provided the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the Institution.

RULE 10.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 11.

Religious Meetings shall be held in the Home on the First day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12.

Any of the inmates desiring to visit their friends (on their written invitation), must obtain permission from the Matron.

RULE 13.

No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home, unless ordered by the Physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 14.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.
