The Eighteenth Annual Meeting of the Contributors to the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, was held this day. The meeting was opened with Prayer by Rev. J. S. Thompson; after which the minutes of the preceeding annual meeting were read and approved. The Board of Managers presented their report for the past year which was read, approved, and authorized to be printed for distribution. The Report of the Treasurer was read, approved and ordered to be entered on the minutes. The following were appointed a committee to nominate Officers to serve the ensuing year, Mary C. Maris, Mary A. Shaw, Alice Pennock, Humphreys Garrigues and Sarah Smith, who subsequently reported those printed on page 4 who were duly elected for the ensuing year. The President appointed Joseph Bacon and Alfred H. Love to audit the Treasurer's account previous to presentation at the next annual meeting. The Rev. Neilson McVickar then delivered an address, and was followed by H. Garrigues with singing. Mary Grew spoke of the great work accomplished by the emancipation of the slaves, and the importance of pushing forward the work of education.

The inmates of the Home sang a few verses and were followed in addresses by Rev. D. Walters of South Carolina and Rev. Sol. P. Hood of Lincoln University. The Infant Class of Brandywine Street Bethany School was present with flowers for the Inmates, and favored the audience with the singing of some beautiful hymns. Fanny Case, one of the oldest Inmates made a few remarks upon the Grace of God and "Glory of the Everlasting Gospel."

Rev. Mr. Hopkins of North Carolina made an address followed by Samuel P. Godwin and Mrs. Frances E. W. Harper.

After singing by the Inmates and others the meeting adjourned with a Benediction from the Rev. Joseph S. Thompson.

To the Contributors to the Home for Aged and
Infirm Colored Persons.

The Board of Managers report with much satisfaction, that during the past year our Home has been blessed by a kind Providence. Continued success has crowned our efforts, and harmony has characterized the working of the Institution.

In accordance with the doctrine, that, our love to God, is manifested in our actions towards our fellow men, irrespective of name or condition, and in sympathy for that "worthy class of Persons who have endeavored through life to maintain themselves, but from various causes are finally dependent on the charity of others" our Home was founded.

Among its numerous inmates, there has been a great variety of dispositions, and it could hardly be expected but there should be some dissatisfied ones, moreover aged people need the exercise of patience and kindness, which traits we believe will be found exemplified in our efficient Matron, whose position, owing to these various dispositions is an onerous one.

She has our entire confidence and support in every right effort for the preservation of that order and discipline without which an Institution of this kind must soon become disorganized.

In order to meet the demand for admission some of the rooms on the first floor have been fitted up with beds, and are now fully occupied.

The total number admitted since the commencement has been 249. Fourteen women and two men, have been admitted within the past year; seven women and four men have died, and one removed to an Insane Asylum.

The present number of Inmates is 86 women and 22 men, to which if we add the employes it will be seen that our family is a very large one, requiring considerable means for its support.

Whilst endeavoring not to be wasteful we are confident that the most rigid scrutiny would prove, that the food is abundant, and wholesome, and the comfort of the inner and outer man properly provided for. The large supply of fresh vegetables from our garden, has materially aided in furnishing the table with wholesome diet, as well as lessening our expenses.

Religious meetings have been held regularly on First days, under the direction of members of various denominations, those on the First First day of each month by Methodists, Second First day by Baptists, Third First day by Presbyterians, Fourth First day by Episcopalians, and when five occur in any month Friends are more especially invited to participate.

Additional to this, the Methodist Local Preachers Association have services every First day evening; the Baptists every Third day morning and Episcopalians on the morning of the Third Fourth day of each month.

These meetings oftentimes are quite large and very interesting, and, while strengthening to their spiritual life also brighten and cheer the physical, for where we are deprived in a great measure of the company of our relatives and friends, the mind dwells so much on itself, that it has a weakening effect, we would therefore thank all, who have taken part in these gatherings, as well as those who have visited the family at other times, either for religious or social commingling, being satisfied they may be compared to the cup of water given to the thirsty one, and tend to revive and prolong the lives of our aged pilgrims.

Donation Day 1st month, 2nd, was very satisfactory in renewing the assurance that our many friends, still bear these dependent ones in remembrance.

There was a large attendance, and the addresses of Rev. I. Addison Henry, C. G. Shaeffer and the other exercises were very interesting.

The New Orleans Jubilee Singers visited the Home on Thanksgiving day, and our family had the pleasure of listening to their melodious singing.

Through the renewed liberality of the Manager of the Zoological Garden, many of the Inmates have spent very agreeable days within its enclosure.

Acknowledgement is also due for the kind invitation to attend the *Fair* for the advancement of Silk Culture, held at St. George's Hall.

Liberal donations have been received from the Executors of the Estate of the late Jesse George \$3,000, from Sarah C. Baldwin \$500, and legacies from the Estates of Dr. Geroge B. Wood, Abram S. Wolf, Henry Potts of Montgomery County, Sarah Miller, and Forrest and Darwine Painter two shares of the \$100 Legacy of Hannah Darlington, also a liberal supply of fuel from several coal operators. Our fellow Managers, Bishop Jabez P. Campbell and Wife have transfered to the Home the dwelling 615 Peace Street, conditioned, on half of its income being paid to them during their lives.

This generous action is worthy of the imitation of others, as it places the property in a position to avoid any risk of litigation, and contesting of Wills, which of late has seemed to be contagious. Other legacies are reported, some of them however not payable till a future date. We sincerely hope, that our friends will not weary in well doing on our behalf, for there are many ways for a judicious expenditure of money to the advantage of the Institution.

A separate building as an infirmary is much needed, and in case of any contagious disease, would be indispensable.

Our Physicians both Homeopathic and Allopathic have been attentive and efficient in their department; and the health of the Family, for so large a number of aged people, has been we think remarkably good.

The completion of the Elevated Rail Road, enables visitors to reach the Home from the Broad Street Station in ten minutes, and we hope our friends will avail themselves of this easy method of visiting us.

We submit herewith the report of our Treasurer which has been examined by your Auditors and found correct.

CHARTER OF INCORPORATION.

WHEREAS, the undersigned citizens of this Commonwealth have, together with other citizens, associated for the purpose of establishing in the City of Philadelphia a Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, and are desirous of being incorporated agreeably to the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, entitled, "An Act to confer on certain Associations of the Citizens of this Commonwealth the powers and immunities of Corporations, or bodies politic in law." They therefore declare the following to be the objects, articles and conditions of their said association, agreeable to which they desire to be incorporated, viz. :

TITLE.

1st. This Association shall be called "THE HOME FOR AGED AND INFIRM COLORED PERSONS."

OBJECT.

2nd. The object of this Association shall be the relief of that worthy class of colored persons who have endeavored through life to maintain themselves, but from various causes are finally dependent upon the charity of others.

ARTICLES AND CONDITIONS.

3rd. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall perform the duties usual to those positions, and a Board of Managers, twenty-four in number, who will make all needful rules and regulations, subject to the approval of the Association at its annual meeting, to which they shall submit a report of the proceedings. The officers shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board.

4th. A quorum of the Association shall be fifteen, and of the Managers, ten. The Managers shall meet at least once in each month.

5th. At each annual meeting, two auditors shall be appointed to examine the Treasurer's account previous to its presentation at the next annual meeting, and report as to its correctness.

6th. Respectable colored persons may be admitted into the Home or boarded therein, with the consent of the Visiting Committee, in accordance with the rules which the Managers may adopt for the government of the Institution.

7th. The terms of membership of the Association shall be an annual contribution of two dollars. The payment of twenty-five dollars shall constitute a life membership.

8th. The Association shall meet annually, for the election of officers and other business, on the second Fifth-day (Thursday) in the Sixth month (June) of each year, at such time and place as may be agreed on, of which two weeks' notice shall be given by the Managers.*

9th. The clear yearly income of real and personal estate held by the Association shall not at any time exceed the sum of ten thousand dollars.

10th. The Association shall have the power to make By-Laws, not inconsistent with this Charter nor the laws of the land, and to alter and annul the same at pleasure, and a failure to elect officers at any time shall not dissolve this Corporation.

11th. If any member shall die or resign, the vacancy may be filled by the election, at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, of one to serve in his stead until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IN THE COURT OF COMMON PLEAS, IN AND FOR
THE COUNTY OF PHILADELPHIA.

*In the matter of the Incorporation of "The Home for Aged
and Infirm Colored Persons."*

And now, this second day of December, A. D. 1867. the Articles of Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons" having been heretofore, to wit, on the thirteenth day of November, A. D. 1867, filed in the office of the Prothonotary of said Court, and due notice having been inserted in a newspaper printed in said County, in due conformity to law; therefore, on motion of Edward Hopper, it is declared and decreed, that the persons so associated under such articles shall, according to the articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in the law.

And it is further ordered and directed that the said Charter of Incorporation shall be recorded in the Office for the Recording of Deeds in and for the the said County of Philadelphia. And on the said instrument being so recorded, the persons so associated or meaning to associate shall, according to the objects, articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a corporation or body politic in law and in fact, to have continuance by the name, style and title in said instrument provided and declared.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the seal of the said Court, this thirteenth day of December, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

The Managers shall meet on the second Fourth-day in every month, at 4 o'clock.

ARTICLE II.

Special Meetings may be called by the Chairman, or at the request of any three members.

ARTICLE III.

All reports of committees shall be made to the Board in writing.

ARTICLE IV.

The meetings of the Board shall be conducted according to the Rules of Order usual in similar bodies.

ARTICLE V.

Standing committees on the following subjects shall be appointed by the chairman at the first meeting in each current year:

- 1st. A Committee of Management.
- 2d. A Committee on Admissions.
- 3d. A Committee on Property and Finance.
- 4th. A Committee on Supplies.
- 5th. A Committee on Religious Meetings.
- 6th. A Committee on Interments.

ARTICLE VI.

The Committee of Management shall consist of the female members of the Board. They shall have a general supervision of the internal arrangements of the Home, and shall propose to the Board any regulations or measures which may be needed for its government. They shall divide themselves into the following Sub-committees:

1st. A House Committee of two, to be appointed monthly in rotation; to visit the Home each week, and endeavor to be present once during meals. They shall make themselves acquainted with the situation and wants of the inmates, generally direct the concerns of the family, and report their observations in a book provided for this purpose.

2nd. A Clothing Committee of four, who shall superintend the making and distribution of clothing, and give directions in regard to any industrial employment of the inmates.

ARTICLE VII.

The Committee on Admissions shall receive and enter applications for admission, and make the necessary inquiry in regard to the application, previous to the action of the Board thereon.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Committee on Property and Finance shall consist of the male members of the Board, and shall have charge of the real estate and financial affairs of the Home.

ARTICLE IX.

The Committee on Supplies, in conjunction with the Matron, shall make all necessary purchases for the Home.

ARTICLE X.

The Committee on Interments shall make all needful arrangements for the funerals of our inmates, and at least one of them shall be present on such occasions.

ARTICLE XI.

The Board shall appoint annually one or more Physicians, to look after the health of the inmates.

ARTICLE XII.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. Calling the Roll.
2. Reading the minutes.
3. Report of the Treasurer.
4. Report of Standing Committees, viz:
 - Committee on Supplies.
 - “ Management.
 - “ Admissions.
 - “ Property and Finance.

6. Unfinished Business.
7. New Business.

RULES.

RULE 1.

The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the rules, see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M. and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person shall be admitted to the Home, but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least sixty years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred dollaas, unless otherwise directed by the Board of Managers. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will be retained no longer, but will be charged board for the time they may be

residents in the Home at the rate of two and a half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which is to be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the Institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of sixty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the Institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subject to the same rules, and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Committee on Admissions thereon, and any information they may deem important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death, the funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 9.

None but the Physician of the Institution; or his substitute shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at liberty to employ such, provided the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the Institution.

RULE 10.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 11.

Religious Meetings shall be held in the Home on the First day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12.

Any of the inmates desirous of visiting their friends (on their written invitation), must obtain permission from the Matron.

RULE 13.

No stimulents or liquors to be used in the Home, unless ordered by the Physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 14.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.
