ANNUAL MEETING.

The Nineteenth Annual Meeting of the Contributors to the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, was held Sixth month, 14th, 1883, William Still, President. The meeting was opened with prayer by Humphrey S. Garrigues; after which the minutes of the preceding Annual Meeting were read and approved.

The Board of Managers presented their report for the past year; it was read and approved, and referred to the incoming Board for publication. The report of the Treasurer was read and approved, and directed to be entered upon the minutes. The following Contributors were appointed to nominate officers to serve the ensuing year: Gulielma M. S. P. Jones, Humphrey S. Garrigues, Samuel P. Godwin, Henrietta S. Duterte and Anna T. Laing, they reported those printed on page 3rd; who were duly elected for the ensuing year. Joseph Bacon and A. H. Love were appointed to audit the Treasurer's account, previous to the next Annual Meeting.

Samuel P. Godwin delivered an interesting address, and was followed by Francis Wells, of the *Evening Bulletin*, after which the audience were entertained with singing, by Humphrey S. Garrigues and some children under the care of Fanny M. Coppin. A stirring and interesting address, on the duty of the young and strong caring for the aged and feeble, was delivered by Fanny M. Coppin. Other addresses followed by H. Garrigues and others.

The corner-stone of the new addition at the south end of the main building was laid, enclosing within a leaden box, which was set in the marble stone, the following articles: Photographs of Stephen Smith, the Home as it now is, Lucretia Mott, copies of the Christian Recorder, Friends' Review, The Journal, Friends' Intelligencer, New York Globe, Weekly Gazette, Public Ledger, Philadelphia Inquirer, Philadelphia Press, Philadelphia Times and two Annual Reports.

On motion adjourned.

ANNUAL REPORT.

In making this, the Nineteenth report of the Home, it is with feelings of pleasure and gratitude that we are enabled to speak with confidence of the good work that continues here to be done.

The past year has brought its changes. The Board of Managers feels the loss of two of its most efficient members. Ann Jess, by iong continued physical suffering, is prevented from meeting with us, and Sarah Lewis whose clear insight, good judgement and earnest work were so valuable, has been removed by death. May her purified spirit be ever a strength and guide to those who are left in this work. Ann Laws, a former Manager, after serving this Home faithfully for many years as Matron, entered as an inmate, where she had a long illness, patiently borne until released by death, Eighth month 24th, 1882.

During the past year four men, and seventeen women entered the Home. Among the inmates of the Home there have been twenty-four deaths, two men and twenty-two women, one an old woman aged one hundred and five. James Booth, who was sent to the Norristown Asylum, died there and was brought back to the Home for burial. The mortality this year seems great, yet not so great when we remember that some have grown very old in the Institution. Several have been invalids from incurable diseases of long standing, causing much suffering, which death alone can relieve. A few have been brought there so enfeebled as to be hardly able to reach

their rooms, which they never after left. This past winter the old folks, numbering one hundred and sixteen, brought into requisition all the rooms that could be spared for lodging For health and comfort they are too much crowded.

Desirous of accommodating, comfortably, those of this worthy class who apply, and there being no adequate protection in this large house in case of fire, the Managers are now building a fire-proof addition, with an elevator that will convey the old people from the upper stories to the first floor. This will give great pleasure to some who have never been down stairs since they first entered. One woman said "she would like once more to put her feet on the ground ere she went to Heaven." This new building is to contain the much needed rooms, so that the sick and dying may be separated from those who are well. Such a building, plain as it could be made, will be expensive. We commenced the work, because of our necessities, before we have money enough in our hands for its completion, as it will cost \$15000, and we have collected only \$8000, but have full confidence that Philadelphians, with their reputation for benevolence, will hand forth of their abundance to contribute to the comfort of this faithful but now dependent class.

Two of the Committee visit the Home each week and, after rigid scrutiny, they are ready to report that care is taken to keep the inmates warmly clothed, neat and clean. The food is abundant and good. The expense of furnishing the table with wholesome and nutritious diet is much lessened by the abundant supply of fresh vegetables from the garden.

In this large family, with the variety of dispositions, a remarkable degree of kind and thoughtful care, one toward another, prevails. Expressions of joy and thankfulness are often heard from these aged people for such a good and comfortable home, where they are so well cared for. One old man, after an expression of gratitude for our care, and the pleasure of seeing us come to them with cheerful countenances, said, "Well, there is one thing we can do for you, we can pray for you."

The care given to the old people by the Matron and her assistants, appears to be appreciated by most of them and a kindly

feeling generally exists. We trust they will ever remember that these old people are many of them but children of mature growth, with strong desires natural to their years. It requires a close self-watchfulness and a strong Christian principle, to enable them always to manifest that gentleness, patience and forbearance, which as a necessity they must possess, if they smooth the path of the aged to a higher bodily and spiritual rest. As this is done for those under their care, so will it be to them. The Matron may rest assured she will have our support in every right effort to promote the good order and discipline of the Home.

Religious meetings have been held regularly on First-days. These meetings are often very large, and are seasons of great enjoyment to the old people. Their devotional and emotional natures lead them to participate in the exercises, and evidences are manifest of a spiritual strength, from these minglings.

These people are eminently social, and the Committee in their visits to them are cordially received. The pleasure and profit of these visits are mutual, and from these feeble ones we may gain instruction. Their cheerful view of the future, their firm trust and confidence in an All-wise and loving Father, banishes all fear.

Donation Day, on Twelfth month, 19th, 1882, brought to us the evidence that these dependent ones were held in remembrance by their many friends.

We would here express our appreciation of Drs. Thatcher and Anderson for their faithful attendance upon the sick, and for the kind and careful nursing given by those upon whom this duty falls.

Our thanks are due to the Directors of the Zoological Garden for free admission to visit it, which gave many of the old folks much pleasure.

The old folks have received much enjoyment from the thoughtfulness of a company of young persons who have several times come out to the Home to sing to them. Such attentions aid in passing away the weary hours of old age and are always highly appreciated.

We gratefully acknowledge the receipt of \$221, raised at a festival held by the colored women, in Liberty Hall. Such kindly remembrances of the Home are encouraging.

On the Fourth of July, as usual, a bountiful supply of ice-cream and cake was received from John Bowman, and on Eighth month 1st, a supply was furnished by M. A. Johnson and Sarah Marshall.

Having endeavored during the past year to faithfully perform the obligation committed to our care, we now commend the Home to the incoming Board, trusting that with the new improvements its comfort and prosperity will be increased.

PHILLIS HOGWOOD.

Aunt Phillis, or Grand-mother Hogwood, as she was familiarly called, entered the Home on the Fifth day of August, 1875, at the advanced age of ninety-eight years, where she remained until her death, which occurred July 7th, 1882, at the age of 105 years.

During her entire sojourn, up to the close of her pilgrimage, her mind remained clear, her sight so good as to enable her to sew and read without glasses. Her spirit was always cheerful and buoyant, and she was a happy recipient of the care and protection of the Home.

With a childish trust in her dear "Heavenly Father," she was ever ready to manifest her appreciation and gratitude for the providential situation she occupied in the Home. Her time was spent mostly in her room, her fragile body being too weak to enable her to take much exercise. She never failed to find delight in reading her Bible, singing her favorite hymns, and entertaining the numerous visitors with various reminiscences of the incidents in her eventful life. She had a remarkable memory, and possessed a simple and happy way of reverting to the past.

A large volume might have been gathered from her store-house of facts and recollections, which would read simply like romance. On extra occasions, such as Annual meetings and Holidays, when the friends would be gathered there in large numbers, stimulated by the earnest desire of the visitors to see her, and her no less earnest wish to see them, and to express her gratitude, she would, by an extraordinary effort, manage to be found in their midst.

Although exceedingly modest and unobtrusive, nothing added so greatly to the interest of the occasion as to see Aunt Phillis Hogwood tremblingly rising to her feet, to make her

little speech and sing two or three verses of her favorite hymn. The burden of her remarks would be to tell how good her "Heavenly Father" had always been to her, and how comfortable and happy she was in the Home—just waiting for Him to take her to the better and Everlasting Home.

Many, doubtless, will recall the melody and charming sweetness of her voice as she would sing, "From all that dwell below the skies," to the tune of Old Hundred, &c., &c. Her strength would allow her to stand but a few minutes during her performance of what she evidently regarded as a sacred duty, not only to her Heavenly Father, but to the friends and inmates of the Home. In her deportment she was most exemplary, very tidy, and careful not to render herself burdensome or disagreeable to her room-mates, the Matron or Managers. Indeed, it may be truthfully said, that not a single murmur escaped her lips during her residence at the Home. None conversed with her without being greatly interested in her stories; they were led to admire, and made to believe that she was truly a wonderful woman.

It is not too much to assume that the influence of her orderly life and strong faith had a very potent effect in strengthening and encouraging many others, in their advanced years. Unmistakably it had the effect of increasing the pleasure and interest of the Managers, as they observed her thankful spirit and were assured that they had her gratitude. In this gentle and Christ-like spirit she entered the Home, and in this self-same spirit she constantly lived and let her light shine, until her final change arrived.

While we shall miss her cheering presence and willing service, we believe that, having done her work in the day-time, she has entered into her heavenly Master's rest.

To her family, and particularly her bereaved sister, we would offer our tender sympathy, in their loss.

IN MEMORIAM.

Our friend, Ann W. Laws, peacefully departed this life on the Twenty-fourth of Eighth month, 1882. Having lived far beyond the allotted three-score and ten years she has laid down the burden of the flesh, we trust, for a happier state of existence.

Her connection with the Home has been of a three-fold character, first as Manager, then for years as Matron, and finally as an inmate.

Through all those years, until declining health had impaired her mental faculties, her interest in the Institution continued unabated, and as both Manager and Matron, many of us will remember the lenient disposition with which she dealt with the weaknesses and infirmities of age, and the Christian care which she bestowed on the sick and afflicted.

We therefore desire to place upon record our appreciation of her services.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

The past year has been one of unusual interest at the Home, from a medical standpoint. Apparently there has been much illness, and many deaths. Yet the facts warrant our saying, the general condition of the inmates has been quite as good as could have been expected in so large and infirm a family.

Phillis Hogwood, aged one hundred and five, and Margaret Cuff, aged one hundred and three, were apparently free from

disease, and simply slept away.

Phillis Anderson, Ann George, Elizabeth Bevens, Maria Lee, and Ann W. Laws, the former Matron, were victims of paralysis, but not sufferers, having attained the age usually allotted

to man. They, too, quietly passed away.

Julia Fountain, Mary Jackson and Mary Ann Laws, all suffering when they entered the Home; the first almost a wreck from nervous trouble, having reached her seventy-fifth year; the other two with heart trouble, their speedy close was inevitable.

Martha Simpson, Elizabeth Beatly, Ruth Hill and Louisa Smothers, were great sufferers with chronic complaints, increas-

ing in severity with time.

Mary Jane Derrickson, aged forty-three; Maria Wallace, sixty-five, and Rachel Brown, eighty-three. Seemingly for them there was no rest save in the grave. They were all anxious to be released. In each case there was an abnormal

growth, causing intense suffering.

From this meagre report it will be seen that a few of those mentioned were more eligible to a Hospital for Incurables than to a Home such as this; and yet similar cases are likely to occur anywhere, proving more conclusively than words the necessity of the new building—the Infirmary. It is to be hoped that some provision will be possible for this seeming luxury, for the future sanitary welfare of the Home.

RULES.

RULE 1.

The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management She is to enforce the rules, see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M. and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person shall be admitted to the Home but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least sixty years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, unless otherwise directed by the Board of Managers. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will be retained no longer, but will be charged board for the time they may be residents in the Home at the rate of two and a half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which is to be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to admission therein; and it any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the Institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of sixty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the Institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subject to the same rules, and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board, previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Committee on Admissions thereon, and any information they may deem important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death, the funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 9.

None but the Physician of the Institution, or his substitute, shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at

liberty to employ such; provided the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the Institution.

RULE 10.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 11.

Religious Meetings shall be held in the Home on the First day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12.

Any of the inmates desirous of visiting their friends (on their written invitation), must obtain permission from the Matron.

RULE 13.

No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home, unless ordered by the physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 14.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.
