ANNUAL MEETING.

The Twenty-first Annual Meeting of the Contributors of the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, cor. Belmont and Girard Avenues, was held at the Home Sixth month 11th, 1885, William Still in the chair.

The Meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. B. F. Lee, and the singing of a hymn, "Nearer my God to Thee." After this, the minutes of the preceding Annual Meeting were read and approved.

The Board of Managers presented their report for the past year, which was read, approved and referred to the incoming Board for publication.

The report of the Treasurer was read, approved, and directed to be placed upon the minutes.

The following Contributors were appointed to nominate officers for the ensuing year, viz.—Samuel P. Godwin, Catharine M. Phillips, H. Garrigues, and Sarah Smith. They reported the following named persons (printed on Page 3) who were duly elected to serve for the ensuing year.

The Rev. H. L. Wayland addressed the meeting. He said that he saw many faces present of those who, in the past, had been active members of the Underground Railway, a corporation at that time, much more profitable to its passengers than to its officers. There was much odium and no little danger attached to the positions of those then actively engaged in running the road. He was glad to know of the good work this Institution was doing, and he desired to encourage all those connected with its management-to persevere in their noble and benevolent labors, by which the old and feeble are cared for, and their declining years made comfortable and happy in the midst of a Christian community. "How different" the speaker remarked, "is the case in lands unchristianized, lands not governed by the principles of beneficent religion which our Saviour taught." For example, in India, the aged, when too feeble to be of any use to the community or to care for themselves, are conducted to the banks of the river and then suffocated in the "sacred mud"

of the Ganges. At other places, these aged ones are led into the wilds of the jungle and left amid those savage solitudes to be devoured by the beasts of the wilderness. How different the condition of the old and weak in our own blessed land, where the influence of the Lord Jesus Christ prevails, who ministered not only to the spiritual but to the bodily comfort and recuperation of the sick and feeble of His day. His influence is still extended by his followers in this, our day, and is exhibited by the many extant associations for alleviating the sufferings of His poor and dependent children.

The Rev. Mangasar Mangasarian next addressed the meeting in some appropriate remarks, replete with eloquence and feeling. He was pleased to see by the report just read, that this Institution not only administered to the bodily comforts of its charge, by housing and feeding them, but added to these physical aids, a lively interest in their intellectual and spiritual welfare, making their lives nobler and happier by the elevating influences of a series of social entertainments, lectures, etc., as well as by the soul refreshing power of religious and devotional exercises.

This, the speaker thought, was work worthy of the disciples of the Master, following the example of the divine charity of Christ, that highest type of love, doing not for themselves but for their brethren in need. He hoped this noble and beneficent charity would be ever aided and sustained by the Chrisitan people of this community.

H. Garrigues made a few very interesting and appropriate remarks, and afterwards led the old folks in the singing of a hymn, "Bringing in the Sheaves."

Fanny M. Coppin followed, speaking of the good work this Home is performing. She remarked that one time she hesitated in asking for funds for purposes of charity, fearing that her requests might be considered importunate. Later, however, she had been led to believe that the reverse is the case, that they who love the Lord are not only willing, but anxious also, to help those who are of the Lord, to make the way of His dependent ones smooth and pleasant, and blest with comfort to the end.

Samuel P. Godwin spoke in relation to the small balance in the Treasury, and hoped that those whom God had blessed with abundance would "loosen their purse strings," and help on the good cause.

Samuel Emlen was the next speaker. He was glad to know of this most excellent work in our city, and earnestly desired the encouragement of all connected with the management of the Home. He addressed the old people, stating that he was glad to hear that they were grateful for the many blessings they were receiving. He trusted they would manifest their gratitude by being obedient to the wise and wholesome rules of the Institution, thus giving as little trouble as possible to its managers and officials. He recommended that the old people express in words as well as actions their grateful appreciation of the kindness of those appointed over them, as this would tend to encourage those their helpers and benefactors, and to lighten their labors. He believed this was God's work, and had no doubt, that to Him, its managers looked for guidance, strength and wisdom in the government of the Home. He concluded his remarks by recommending a reduction of the debt now encumbering the new building at as early a date as possible, and he thought it right that Institutions should do what all acknowledge should be done by individuals, viz., free themselves from debt before incurring further expenditures for improvements, etc.

After the singing of a hymn, "In the Sweet Bye and bye" by the old people, the meeting adjourned with prayer by Rev. Theo. Gould.

ANNUAL REPORT.

Another year has passed since our last Annual Meeting, bearing into the infinite, its record of the thoughts and deeds of earthly life; and this Twenty-first Anniversary now asks of our Home and Managers, What has your record been? We humbly trust that it may not be deemed unworthy in the sight of Him, whose blessing alone can "give the increase" to all man's labor in the harvest field of life.

Since its establishment in 1864, this Home has given shelter. comfort and we trust, a fair degree of happiness to 314 of the aged and helpless people, for whose welfare it was designed and inaugurated.

Within the past year 132 inmates, 31 men and 101 women have been sheltered in this Institution; there have been 20 new admissions and 18 deaths, leaving within its walls at the date of this Report, 114 persons; of whom 25 are men, and 89 women.

The general health of the Inmates has been good.

Many substantial tokens of favor and appreciation have been received during the past year, in the form of money and goods, as well as in that of Christian sympathy, as evinced by religious and social visits, entertainments, lectures, etc., gratuitously given, and outside efforts for its benefit, of which the following details are given.

Seventh month 4th, the "Fourth of July," the Inmates were given the usual entertainment, on which occasion a gift of ice cream and cakes from John Bowman, greatly added to the enjoyment. There were also addresses made by A. Calhoun, Connor and others.

Eighth month 1st, Emancipation Day." On this anniversary of the proclamation of the freedom of their brethren in the West Indies, another welcome and most enjoyable donation was received by the "old folks," and duly appreciated by them. It was from the kindness of two of the most valued friends of the Home, Mary M. Johnson and Sarah Marshall.

Tenth month 13th and 14th. A committee of ladies consisting of Mrs. H. S. Duterte, Esther Furman and others, held a festival at Liberty Hall, for the benefit of the Building Fund; the amount of the proceeds of which will be found in the Treasurer's Report.

Tenth month 15th. Our Home received the honor of a visit from the widow of the late President Roberts, of the Republic of Liberia.

Eleventh month 19th. Chloe Lloyd, a worthy inmate of the Home, who had reached the advanced age of 105 years (of whose gentle, faithful and hopeful spirit, mention was made in our last Report), passed peacefully away in that same spirit of childlike trust and resignation, doubtless to that far better Home above, within whose happy precincts, those who have been "faithful over a few things," "enter into the joy of their Lord."

Eleventh month 19th and 20th. An "Apron Bazaar" was held in Brandywine Street for the benefit of the Building Fund, netting the Institution five hundred and thirty-two dollars and sixteen cents (\$532.16). Through the kindness of Marcellus Balderston, the use of the room occupied by the Bazaar was given free of charge.

Eleventh month 27th. "Thanksgiving Day" at our Home was remembered by the accustomed "feast of good things" provided, among which substantial reminders of the season, the "time-honored turkey" was a conspicuous figure. A feeling of thankful joy, befitting the occasion, was manifested by the participants of the banquet.

Twelfth month 8th. A concert was given by the pupils of Mrs. Crails' school.

Twelfth month 25th. "Christmas Day," so generally observed throughout Christian Nations as a season of reverence and rejoicing, was a time of innocent enjoyment for our Inmates, who did not miss their "Christmas Turkey" or other pleasures of the festive board; but which, we trust, they received with thankful hearts to Him to whom all days and hearts belong. Addresses appropriate to the occasion were delivered by H. Garrigues, A. Calhoun and others.

Twelfth month 27th. An entertainment was given to our Home and its grateful Inmates by one of our Managers.

First month 1st, 1885. The usual "New Year's Day" donations and entertainments were received and enjoyed. An entertainment by Mrs. Fanny M. Coppin and Miss Harper was given in the evening; in which Miss Harper greatly added to the enjoyment of the old people by excellent recitations.

First month 13th. A special religious meeting was held, at which Rufus P. King spoke cheering and encouraging words of spiritual counsel to his aged hearers.

Second month 5th. On this evening, a concert by H. Garrigues and a company of young folks proved a very acceptable and much enjoyed treat to the music loving Inmates of the Institution, as well as to all others present.

Second month 21st. On this day, Belinda Jackson, formerly Matron of this Institution departed this life in peace. We would here record the respectful tribute of the Managers to her memory. She was indeed, a good and faithful mother to her charge, fulfilling all the duties of her very responsible and often arduous position with fidelity, energy and ability, while at the same time endearing herself to all, by her gentle and kindly disposition and management. We believe that the account of her "stewardship" has been acceptable to her Lord, for her charge over the feeble ones committed to her care.

Second month 22nd. In commemoration of the Anniversary commonly known as "Washington's Birthday," a magic lantern exhibition was given at the Home by John Collins, which proved a source of delight to the Inmates, as well as an acceptable kindness to its Managers and friends.

Third month 5th. Mrs. Mary A. Livermore kindly offered her services for the benefit of the Home, by delivering a lecture entitled "The Boys of the Period." Through the kindness of the Rev. Dr. Peddie, Pastor of the Baptist Church, cor. 18th and Spring Garden Streets, the use of that beautiful building was placed at our disposal for that evening. The proceeds of the lecture amounted to \$247.00, and the thanks of the Managers are hereby heartily extended for those generous offerings, and the many acts of kindness shown by all on that occasion.

Fourth month 5th. This day, commonly called "Easter," was observed in the Home as a day of social and festive pleasures.

Fourth month 14th. A very pleasant and instructive lecture was given at our Institution by Edward S. Morris, whose long official residence in Liberia rendered him able to give to our Inmates a most interesting discourse, concerning the country and people of their race in that far distant land, who, though dwelling so remotely are yet united with them in the bonds of sympathy and nationality.

Fourth month 15th. A concert much enjoyed by all in the Home was given by Mrs. A. L. Haas and family and Mrs. M'Murtrie, for which our thanks are here expressed to its kind performers and promoters.

Fourth month 29th. E. H. Coates entertained the old people with an interesting lecture on the subject of the "Underground Railway," graphically describing the hair-breadth escapes from countless dangers, both to the escaping slaves and to the managers of the road.

We would also express here our grateful acknowledgements to the Press of this city for many notices gratuitously published on our behalf, when funds were needed for the Home; as likewise to several firms, whose generosity has supplied us, free of charge, with many tons of coal for the Institution; also, to the Managers of the Zoological Gardens for the free admission of our Inmates into the grounds a number of times during the year, and to Mr. Hart, who kindly supplied them with ice cream on those occasions.

To Ann Ware and Jane Johnson we extend the grateful thanks of the members of this Institution, for kind attention in that last office of Christian Charity, the laying out of the dead, given by them to our deceased Inmates, "without money and without price."

We also gratefully appreciate and acknowledge the kindly offices of Dr. Jesse W. Thatcher to the sick, as well as to Henry Meuller, our Pharmacist.

Our sincere thanks are due to many friends for liberal donations of money and goods, as also for the lectures, concerts, entertainments and other kindly efforts to promote the physical, moral and mental welfare of our aged charge.

To the Local Preachers Association our grateful acknowledgements are extended for their Christian kindness, in supplying ministers to aid in the religious services of our Home, on every First-day evening.

Owing to the attention of our Attorney, W. C. Hannis, the will of Lucy Taylor was sustained by the Court, thus securing to our Institution the benefit of her bequest.

We cannot consistently close this Report without reference to the able and efficient manner in which the duties of our present Matron, Esther A. Barnes, have been fulfilled; and we would also record our commendation of the faithful services so cheerfully rendered by the attendants and assistants in general, whose individual merits we would be glad to notice, did the limits of this Report permit.

The Managers here desire to call the attention of contributors to the fact, that there is still fifteen hundred dollars due on the new Infirmary, erected a year ago, and would ask those charitably disposed to assist in the payment of this debt. In concluding our Report of the Home, we may appropriately assert that its Inmates may be truthfully described as a cheerful, peaceful, contented and God respecting family, whose faults may be attributed mostly to the disadvantages of their former social condition, and their present childishness of age; and whose simple virtues, humble trust in Heaven, and hearty gratitude for all the comforts they receive, render them worthy objects of Christian Charity and philanthropic aid.

RULES.

RULE 1.

The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the rules, see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M. and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person shall be admitted to the Home but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least 60 years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, unless otherwise directed by the Board of Managers. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will be retained no longer, but will be charged board for the time they may be residents in the Home at the rate of two and a half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which is to be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the Institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of sixty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the Institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subjected to the same rules, and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board, previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence and the report of the Committee on Admissions thereon, and any information they may deem important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death, the funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 6.

None but the Physician of the Institution, or his substitute shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at liberty to employ such; providing the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the Institution.

RULE 10.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 11.

Religious Meetings shall be held in the Home on the First day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12.

Any of the inmates desirous of visiting their friends (on their written invitation), must obtain permission from the matron.

RULE 13.

No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home, unless ordered by the physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 14.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitor will not be admitted before 10 A. M. nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.
