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Annual Meeting.

Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, cor. Belmont and Girard Avenues, Philadelphia.

The Twenty-second Annual Meeting of the Contributors of the above named institution was held at the Home, Sixth month 10th, 1886, the President, Dillwyn Parrish, presiding, assisted by the Vice-President, William Still.

After a few moments spent in silent devotion, the exercises were opened with singing "Nearer my God to Thee," by the old people.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The annual report of the Board of Managers was read by the Secretary, which, on motion duly seconded, was accepted and referred to the incoming Board for publication.

The Treasurer read his report for the past year, which was received and also referred to the incoming Board for publication.

The following named contributors were appointed by the Chair to nominate officers for the ensuing year, viz., Henry M. Laing, S. P. Godwin, Elizabeth Lewis, Henrietta Duterte, and Mary A. Campbell.

They reported the following names, who were duly elected to serve for the ensuing year. (See page 3).

William Still introduced the Rev. W. H. Furness, who addressed the meeting in the following remarks:

"As I have been asked to speak by my friend, William Still, I shall have to fall back on the infirmities of age, and remain seated, and call to your mind some events of the past. Thirty-six years ago I was at the Tabernacle in the city of New York with William Lloyd Garrison, Wendell Phillips, Mr. Harper, Lucretia Mott and others, and I there witnessed a scene which I consider, from the impression made on my mind, as an era. Before the meeting, the New York press had been doing all it could

to inflame the public mind, and I was told that there certainly would be a row. Mr. Garrison was the first speaker; I was down to speak next. Isaiah Rynders, a pro-slavery man of that time, produced a man, of whom Garrison said to me, 'that man is a compositor who has prepared a speech very carefully.' When he spoke he tried to prove that the colored people were not human, etc. He was tedious and was interrupted by his friends. When finished, Frederick Douglass came forward, the very opposite in dress and appearance to the man who had just been speaking. He said, 'I cannot follow the gentleman in his argument to prove that we are not human. I offer myself for your examination. Am I a man?' There was tremendous applause. Rynders was next to him and threatened to knock him down, and said, 'You are no black man.' Douglass replied, 'I am your brother.' Rynders retorted, 'Half-brother.' Some one in the audience interrupted with some threatening remarks; Douglass replied in a loud voice, 'It's no use, I have my half-brother here to back me.' He went on saying, 'We make the sugar for your coffee, the clothes you wear, we live here and expect to die here'. Some one called out, 'And cut our throats.' He replied, 'O, no, we will only cut your hair. I see my friend Ward here, who will now address you.' Rev. Samuel R. Ward came forward with a magnificent voice and said, 'I have always been called "nigger," and the only consolation offered me was, that when I got to heaven, I should be made white; but if I cannot go to heaven just as God created me, then let me go to the other place'. He went on to say, 'this man who has just spoken has undertaken to explain our whole anatomy and declares we are not human. I have seen white boys with retreating foreheads and projecting jaws, and of whom we might say as Dickens does of Smike, 'When you knock here (illustrating on his own forehead) there is nobody at home.'"

Dr. Furness went on to say, "Those were exciting times indeed, and when they were over I missed the stimulus and felt much as the man who had his brother's troublesome estate to settle, when he said, 'I wish my brother had not died.' I recollect a case when a slave-dealer wished to purchase a man to take to the far south, and while the sale was being consummated the slave went out, and placing his hand on a horse-block, deliber-

ately chopped it off. That was indeed, a heroic act." Dr. Furness finished by saying that he was glad to be present at this meeting and to know that there was such a worthy institution doing so vast an amount of good.

Judge Wilson was then introduced, who said that this was his first visit to the Home, and that he was very glad to be present; but that he would much prefer listening to the others than to talk himself. He said he remembered this colored man, Mr. Ward, just spoken of by Dr. Furness, at his father's place, when quite a boy, and recollected his speaking in most eloquent strains at the church of which his father was the pastor. He then went on to say, "I had no idea this Home was so beautifully situated; I also recognize the faces of some of the inmates. I have no doubt the money expended in keeping up the Institution has been judiciously used, and that the charitable will continue to give liberally to its support. This Home seems to me one of the most Christian-like missions, and I would encourage the ladies and gentlemen who have the care of it, to do just as they are doing; their reward is not to be found here but hence. It must be grateful to them, however, to know that their work is appreciated, and have their friends gather around them here and bid them 'God speed' on that which they shall be called to do in the future."

H. Garrigues was called on next and said, "What we have been hearing this afternoon, the reports that have been read and the interesting accounts that have been recited by our aged father about all that he had passed through long before we entered into the work might bring to our minds the question, What shall the harvest be?"

The old people joined him in singing the hymn, "What shall the harvest be?"

Samuel P. Godwin was the next speaker. He said, "I hold in my hand a paper from the inmates of this Home, in which they desire to express their gratitude to the Managers and Officers who have the care of them, as follows:"

To the President and Board of Managers of the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons.

Dear Friends:—Another anniversary of this beneficent institution is about opening, and we, its inmates, take great pleasure

in expressing unto you our most appreciative thanks for your kind, loving and devotional attention for our good. You have watched over and cared for us (we who are advancing towards our Father's house) with so much tenderness, so much anxiety, and with self-sacrifice to yourselves, that we do in love and in truth ask of you to please accept our gratitude for the same. Also, we are very grateful for your kindness by selecting for us our present Matron and Housekeeper. They do us good, they go in and out before us as kind, honest and noble Christian women, bringing their sheaves with them. We also include our Doctor.

Mr. Godwin said it gave him great satisfaction to read this paper, and expressed a desire that the old people would daily live so as to cause as little trouble as possible to those having the charge of them. He also said this was one of those charities about which there was no argument. "All agree that this is God's work and you are his agents, caring for the aged and infirm. It is indeed true, that the citizens have been liberal, but the Treasurer has been called upon to pay \$900 and has only \$300 in the Treasury to meet it." He hoped the charitably disposed, blessed with abundance, would come forward and supply the deficiency. He stated that he had been visiting the Home for years and he would encourage the Managers to believe that they would have no trouble about money; it would surely be provided.

The Rev. Mr. Hood, of South Carolina, was the next speaker. He said that he had been present at several of the annual meetings in the past, and he had great pleasure in being here at this one. He remarked in reference to what Mr. Godwin had said, that there could be indeed, no argument against the usefulness of this institution, for there can be but one opinion as to the blessedness of taking care of the aged and infirm. "It has been said that after twenty years of freedom, the colored people should be farther advanced in education, etc., than they are. There are many of us who are prosperous farmers, mechanics, etc., yet the majority have only log cabins to live in; they have shelter but

no home comforts as the working people of the north have. We have no papers to read, no library books, no home influence or that which goes to make a true home; no influence to follow the child through after life and lead him to aspire for better things. If the northern man had his home comforts removed and lived in a log cabin, he would not be in the advanced condition of society in which he is now. I must say, however, that the colored people of the south, even with the little creature comforts afforded them, are happy and contented. I desire to close my remarks with the earnest desire for the future prosperity of this noble and useful Home."

The Rev. Dr. Reeve spoke next, and said, although the funds of the institution seemed very low indeed, at times, yet they seemed to flow in from no one knew where, hardly. It is like the fire that Bunyan speaks of, that is never quenched; like the unseen who pours on the oil to keep up the flame. "I think today, as we are gathered here in large numbers, mingling with the inmates, we are made to feel that great blessedness, of which we are told, that it is more blessed to give than to receive."

I. H. Johnson spoke, and said, "It is rather late, and I do not desire to detain the company, but I would like to say, that through the unbounded goodness of our Heavenly Father, we have been supported during the past year, and have always had enough, and I have no doubt that during the fiscal year enough will be coming in for all our needs. Our Heavenly Father seems to have the care of the old people in His especial keeping. This morning, unsolicited, \$200 came in, and I have no doubt enough will be coming in to meet the demands on the Treasury. Our income is not enough to support us, but this Home has the blessing of our Heavenly Father, and a very little with His blessing is worth more than thousands without it."

Mr. Weaver, of Virginia, addressed a few words of encouragement to the Managers and old people of the Home.

The exercises were then concluded with the singing of the hymn, "Beulah Land."

Annual Report.

In submitting this Twenty-second Annual Report, the Board of Managers of the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons feel great satisfaction in being able to state, that, through the blessings of a kind Providence, and the generous support of its contributors and friends, they have been able to carry on successfully and satisfactorily, the work of this most worthy institution.

At the first of the year we had 114 inmates. During the year ten women and one man have been admitted.

As in previous years, death has been a frequent visitor at the Home, coming to many as a blessed release from sickness and suffering, and bringing to them rest and peace in their best sense. Dating from Sixth month 1st, 1885, to Fifth month 31st, 1886, 18 deaths are recorded; 5 men and 13 women; which, with one woman removed, leaves the present number 106.

All these have been furnished with shelter, wholesome food, necessary clothing, medical attendance, and all that go to make a comfortable home, and are grateful recipients for the bounty provided for them. It seems fitting in this connection, to note the death of Cassy Brown, an aged Christian inmate, who passed away Second month 16th, 1886. She had been confined to her bed for more than four years, often suffering greatly, yet she was never heard to murmur or complain, but bore her afflictions with

the most patient endurance and loving submission to her Heavenly Father's will. "Just waiting," was very often her reply to inquiries after her health; and truly, for a long time, she seemed "just on the boundaries of the Spirit-land." When at last the summons came, we have the fullest assurance that she was found with her "lamp trimmed and burning," ready to enter into that heavenly rest for which she had so long and patiently waited.

The resignation of Esther A. Barnes as Matron, was followed by the appointment of Melinda Brown, who entered upon the duties of the office 21st of Eleventh month, and who has faithfully and acceptably fulfilled the duties of her position. The labor and responsibility of such a position are apparent, and it is only by a prayerful dependence upon Divine help that such can be successfully performed. Harmony and good feeling prevail at present at the Home to an extent that is very gratifying. The House Committee on the occasions of their frequent visits, have been well pleased with the domestic arrangements as administered in the several departments; and the grateful and loving spirit manifested by a large number of the inmates, leads to the belief that our Matron, through a kind and gentle spirit, combined with necessary firmness, has found the way to the hearts and affections of these trusting old people.

To lighten the labors of the Matron, it was thought advisable, on account of our large family, to obtain the assistance of a Housekeeper, and the services of Mary E. Jordan were secured, which, so far, have been very satisfactory.

The portion of the grounds set apart as a garden, and under the management of Calvin W. Mitchell, has been made to produce a good supply of excellent vegetables; which, in their season, go far toward furnishing the table, thus reducing somewhat the expenses in this direction.

The religious meetings have been held regularly, and often largely attended, giving great satisfaction to the aged inmates, whose craving for religious fellowship is a strong characteristic of their race, and which has been through many a weary day, a drop of nectar in the cup of life.

The several holiday occasions, at Christmas, New Year, Thanksgiving, and others, have been made occasions of enjoyment and

good cheer, nothing being withheld that could be reasonably furnished to make the inmates sensible of the fact that they are remembered in a loving and very substantial manner, by those who have the interest of this Home and its occupants at heart.

On three occasions, several of the inmates, supplied with tickets gratuitously, under the care of the Matron, visited the Zoological Garden, and were furnished by Mr. Frank Hart, proprietor of the restaurant, with ice-cream, which they greatly appreciated.

The usual entertainment in celebration of Emancipation in the West Indies, was given at the Home by direction of a kind friend, Sarah Marshall; the children from the "Home for Destitute Colored Children," being supplied, together with the old people, with an abundance of ice-cream and cake. They were addressed by Mrs. Coppin and Mrs. Harper, a recitation being given by Miss Harper. They were also favored with vocal and instrumental music, furnished by Mrs. Haus and son, and Mrs. McMurtrie; all of which gladdened their hearts and made the day memorable.

Donation Day occurred on the second day of the New Year, and a number of gifts of various characters, all useful and welcome, found their way into the Home. This too, was made an occasion of pleasure to the old people by addresses from the Rev. Leonard Bacon, Ex-Mayor King and others. A stereopticon exhibition by Thomas H. McCollin in the evening, was followed by supper furnished by one of the Managers, all of which was greatly enjoyed.

Our Treasury has been replenished by legacies received from the estates of Mary Anna Longstreth, James Bromley, Susan Rhea Barton and Sarah T. Betts. Of each of these deceased friends, so beautiful in their lives, it may be appropriately said, as it was of One of old, "He being dead, yet speaketh." "They rest from their labors, and their works do follow them."

In looking over the record of the year just closed, and of which we here render an account, we find much to encourage and cheer, and little that is cause for complaint.

Without wishing to make invidious distinctions, we would like, in the name of their delighted hearers, and in our own, to extend our cordial thanks to the young people from the different

churches, who have regularly, every two weeks, given musical entertainments in the Home. And in concluding this report, we gladly take the opportunity it furnishes to extend our grateful acknowledgments to all the friends of the Home and its inmates, who have in any way contributed toward its support, or in making happier this most deserving class; for surely, none more strongly appeal to the kind and sympathetic heart than the aged and infirm; more especially when attendant upon them are friendlessness and want.

It is truly "more blessed to give than to receive," and no greater joy have we than in knowing, that in some way, great or small, we have lessened the sum of human suffering in this beautiful world of ours.

We have Examined the account of Israel H. Rules.

RULE 1.

The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the rules, see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M. and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person shall be admitted to the Home but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least 60 years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will be retained no longer, but will be charged board for the time they may be residents in the Home at the rate of two and a half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which is to be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the Institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of sixty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the Institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subjected to the same rules, and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board, previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence and the report of the Committee on Admissions thereon, and any information they may deem important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death, the funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 9.

None but the Physician of the Institution, or his substitute, shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends

desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at liberty to employ such; providing the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the Institution.

RULE 10.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 11.

Religious Meetings shall be held in the Home on the First day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12.

Any of the inmates desirous of visiting their friends (on their written invitation), must obtain permission from the Matron.

RULE 13.

No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home, unless ordered by the Physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 14.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M. nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.
