ANNUAL MEETING.

HOME for Aged and infirm Colored Persons, corner Belmont and Girard avenues, Philadelphia.

The Twenty-third Annual Meeting of the Contributors of the above named institution was held at the Home, Sixth month, 9th, 1887, William Still, presiding.

The Meeting was opened with prayer by John Gibson, one of the inmates, who is said to be 115 years of age. After which the company present sang the hymn, "Nearer my God to thee."

The Minutes of the last Annual Meeting were then read and approved.

The Annual Report of the Board of Managers was read by Samuel P. Godwin, who commented upon the good work the Home was doing, and hoped all would not only by their prayers and presence help on this good work, but also by their means. He believed every dollar given to this worthy cause would again return to the donor tenfold. On conclusion of the reading, a motion was made to accept the report, and refer it to the incoming Board of Managers for publication.

The Treasurer's Report was read, received and also referred to the incoming Board for publication.

The following named contributors are appointed to nominate officers for the ensuing year, viz: Samuel P. Godwin, Henrietta S. Duterte, Lydia E. Pennock and Mary A. Campbell. They reported the following names, who, upon motion duly seconded, were elected to serve for the ensuing year. (See page 3).

The Rev. William Becket sang the hymn, "I know what awaits me."

Henry Franklin presented the Home with a splendid framed engraving of John Brown going to execution. He said: "I left Maryland in 1837, turned my back upon slavery and came North just fifty years ago. I visited this Home a short time ago, and was delighted to see such a good place for the old and feeble of my race. I feel it a duty to do all I can for this noble charity. In commemoration of the fiftieth anniversary of my liberty, I present to the Home this picture, that all may, when looking at it, behold what John Brown has done for the colored people. He was the man who first struck the blow that afterwards ended in Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation. John Brown, as well as Abraham Lincoln, sacrificed their lives for the liberty of our people."

William Still stated that, "It had been his privilege lately to visit the locality where John Brown was imprisoned and hung, on a visit to Stover College, which had been built in the memory of John Brown. The college is in successful operation, having some four hundred colored students. I wondered and marveled again and again at what has been wrought by our self-denying friends, and none to-day has done more than Stover College towards destroying the effects of slavery." The company then sang, "John Brown's Body."

The Rev. I. D. Baker then addressed the meeting. He stated, "that years ago, while waiting for a street car, he was addressed by an elderly colored woman, who said: 'My son, you can ride in that car, but I cannot; I shall not live to see the day when these distinctions will be removed, but you, I hope, will.' Thank God! I have. Distinctions which never prevailed with God, but only with men, since He is no respecter of persons. I need not say to you that this is a most blessed institution, whose anniversary we are celebrating to-day. To me, there is nothing more beautiful on earth than serene, peaceful, happy old age. If there is anything I like to look upon, it is an old face which is not a sad one. I have seen old faces wrinkled and seamed, on which there was a look of care and loneliness, which pained me to the heart; but, on the other hand, a face which is beautiful with the light of God, which is calm with the presence of Jesus, no matter how many wrinkles the years may have wrought upon it, to me it is most

beautiful. I am sure, if our dear Lord was in this city to-day, in that form in which He walked the streets of Jerusalem, He would bend His steps to this very place, glad to be under this roof, glad to be a guest here to-day; and it would bring joy to His heart to see these brethren and sisters spending their declining days in the comforts of religion, and He would say to you who contribute to the support of this institution: 'Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of one of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto Me.'

Dr. T. W. S. Wiley next spoke. He said: "I can most truly say that I feel this to be a very happy occasion. I think we all must acknowledge great sympathy for these persons for whom this Home has been established. There is something in the condition of the aged, which excites our sympathy and compassion much more than for the young. The young have hope before them to give them cheer, and if they are enduring much distress, there is a future to comfort and gladden them. To me, the decline of old age is much more attractive. Long may this institution flourish; more and more may God increase its usefulness; may rich blessings come from heaven above upon all those who contribute of their time and means for its support."

William Still was elected President, and he accepted the office with appropriate remarks.

Margaret Jones and Mrs. Thomas Boling sang hymns, in the choruses of which, the old people joined. The Rev. Mr. Phillips next spoke, and was followed by the Rev. Mr. Beckett.

The old folks then sang "Palms of Victory" and the "Doxology," and the exercises closed with a benediction.

ANNUAL REPORT.

THE Board of Managers of the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons present their Twenty-third Annual Report to their friends and contributors, feeling deeply thankful that the past year has been one of prosperity to the institution; and we can say with grateful hearts that, through the generous support thus received, we have been enabled to relieve much of the suffering and discomfort attendant upon our aged and infirm persons.

The records of the Home contain a very interesting account of the various channels through which the liberal and kind-hearted have found it pleasant to supplement the work of this worthy charity—only a synopsis of which can be embraced in this limited report.

On Sixth month, 19th, seventy-five of the most active of the old people went on a picnic excursion to Richland Park, through the kindness of Henry Willten, who furnished conveyances for them, and very generously treated them to ice cream.

The Fourth of July was celebrated in a very pleasant manner—some kind friends furnishing amusement by singing, recitations, etc., George Roegner donating a very abundant supply of ice cream and cake. Several of the Managers were also in attendance, and in looking back upon it at this distance, they may probably be excused for indulging in a feeling akin to pride in recalling this happy scene; with the old people seated in the meeting-room, glad

and expectant, and clad in their best attire, the house clean and sweet from its Spring renovating, and the grounds gay and fragrant with flowers.

A number of the inmates made a visit, during the Summer, to the Zoological Gardens, under the escort of the Matron—being admitted gratuitously. All had a delightful time, and were kindly furnished with ice cream by Mr. Hart, proprietor of the Restaurant, which added not a little to this very pleasant occasion.

Eighth month, 1st, the Celebration of Emancipation in the West Indies was a feature in the life of the Home, the little ones from the Home for Destitute Colored Children participating with the old people in the festivities. In addition to the appropriate speaking and singing by several interested friends, the children contributed their share in making the day enjoyable, by recitations and some of their Kindergarten exercises. A bountiful supply of refreshments for all was furnished by the liberality of our ever-thoughtful friend, Sarah Marshall.

Those unable to go on the picnic excursion were taken out for a ride by the thoughtful kindness of Henry Willten, who treated them to ice cream—this furnished a pleasant topic for conversation for many days.

The holidays, Christmas, Thanksgiving, and New Year, were marked by abundant good cheer, religious exercises being a part of the day's observances.

Donation Day came with the New Year, and many kind friends availed themselves of this opportunity of showing their interest in the Home and its inmates by gifts of various kinds, which found grateful recipients of their bounties. One pleasant feature of the day we especially wish to note, the donation from the Olivet Presbyterian Church Sunday School; also that from the South Presbyterian Church Sunday School—Primary Department—very kind and thoughtful actions on the part of these little ones, which might well be imitated by others.

Concerts have been given by the choirs of several churches, which have given great pleasure to their hearers, who have a special relish for this kind of entertainment, and we would like here to tender thanks in their name.

On May 23rd, the Conference of Zion Methodist Church visited

the Home. Addresses were made by Bishop Lomax, Rev. A. Cartwright, of Africa, W. H. Day and others. A bountiful supply of cake and lemonade was furnished to all by Mrs. Jones, Dutrete, Jordan, Bohling and others.

Religious meetings have been held on each Sabbath-day, and are often largely attended. These are seasons of great enjoyment to the aged inmates; the religious exercises in which they delight to join, are very satisfying to their natures, and seeing and mingling with their friends somewhat relieves the monotony of their lives.

Several of our inmates have been mercifully removed to their long and peaceful rest.

At the time of our last Annual Report, there were in the Home 106 inmates; during the year 6 men and 22 women have been received, and 18 have died, 3 men and 15 women; this number, with two women removed, leaves us at present with a very interesting family of 114 men and women, whose ages range from 60 to 115 years.

The domestic arrangements of the Home have been satisfactorily conducted under the management of our efficient Matron, Malinda Brown, and our housekeeper, Mary E. Jordan, supported by a well directed corps of assistants, who, in their various departments, have conscientiously discharged their duties, and to whom we feel our thanks are due.

We gratefully acknowledge the very timely and most welcome gift of \$1,000 from John F. Smith; also, legacies from the estates of Dillwyn Parrish, Henry Seybert and Mary H. Newbold. We speak for these good friends who have gone to their reward, that, in bestowing their wealth in so praiseworthy a manner, they did not forget the Scripture injunction, "He that giveth to the poor, lendeth to the Lord."

Our retrospect of the year just passed, as connected with the Home, is greatly darkened by the loss we have sustained, in the removal by death, of our beloved and valued friend, Dillwyn Parrish, who, since the founding of the Institution has been its President, and through all its changing fortunes, one of its steadfast friends. Though there has been a very fitting Memorial prepared to be printed herewith, we cannot let the opportunity pass

without giving some expression to our own deep sense of loss, under the shadow of which we are still dwelling. He was to us indeed, a brother beloved, being singularly endowed with the qualities that make the genial friend, the trusty counsellor, the Christian gentleman, and we query with ourselves to-day, "upon whom will his mantle fall."

Lavina S. Harvey also has been of the number who have been "called from works to reward." She had been for many years an interested and active member of the Board, and we feel that we have lost in her, a beloved friend and an earnest co-worker.

And now in conclusion, we desire to express our appreciation of the gifts of money and merchandise that have been bestowed by the friends of this most deserving charity; and no less, for the sympathy and kindness the inmates have received from so many different sources, which has lent a ray of sunshine to their lives. And to these come back to-day with all the emphasis of a personal application, the Divine declaration, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, ye have done it unto Me."

We shall long miss him from our councils, and many sorrowful hearts will mourn his removal, but though we may not again be cheered by his presence here on earth, we feel assured it is well with him, and that by a like example, living close to the Divine Life, we may, when done with time, be again permitted to commune with his redeemed spirit.

RULES.

RULE 1.

The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the rules, see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M. and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person shall be admitted to the Home but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least 60 years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will be retained no longer, but will be charged board for the time they may be residents in the Home, at the rate of two and a half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which is to be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the Institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of sixty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the Institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subjected to the same rules, and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board, previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence and the report of the Committee on Admissions thereon, and any information they may deem important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death, the funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 9.

None but the Physician of the Institution, or his substitute, shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends

desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at liberty to employ such; providing the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the Institution.

RULE 10.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 11.

Religious Meetings shall be held in the Home on the First-day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12.

Any of the inmates desirous of visiting their friends (on their written invitation), must obtain permission from the Matron.

RULE 13.

No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home, unless ordered by the Physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 14.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.
