* ANNUAL MEETING. *

HOME for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, corner Belmont and Girard avenues, Philadelphia.

The Twenty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Contributors to the above named institution was held at the Home, Sixth month 14th, 1888, William Still, presiding. The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. C. T. Schaffer, after which the Rev. J. W. Becket sang the hymn, "All the way my Saviour leads."

The Secretary then read the Report of the Board of Managers, at the conclusion of which a motion was made by Samuel P. Godwin that the report be accepted and referred to the incoming Board for Publication. Also, a memorial of Aunt Hannah Todd, which was referred to the incoming Board for publication. The old folks then sang the hymn, "Rock of Ages cleft for me," in which many of the company present joined.

The Treasurer read his Report, showing a balance in the treasury, at this date, of \$285.05; on motion the report was accepted and referred to the incoming Board for publication.

On motion the Chair appointed the following named contributors as committee to nominate officers to serve for the ensuing year, viz: Lydia E. Pennock, Samuel P. Godwin, Mrs. H. S. Duterte, Mrs. Bell and Hannah S. Marot, who, after consideration, offered the following names, who were duly appointed to serve this Institution for the ensuing year, viz: (See page 3.)

The Rev. Dr. M'Cook, of this city, addressed the meeting in a very interesting manner, stating that it was only in the highly civilized communities that grey hairs were venerated, and the aged and infirm poor cared for in their declining days. He pictured the voyage of life as a boat emerging out of darkness, gliding over the streams with a little babe nestling near the bow, with the guardian angel at the helm, carefully guiding its way.

Next we see the youth, the stream, the boat just the same, but the babe is no longer there, the guardian angel still hovers near. Next we see the strong man, with *his* hands at the helm guiding the bark, the same guardian angel in the distance looking sad at his errors. Then comes the last scenes,—the old and white haired man again entering that dark, mysterious future, the boat shattered by the long voyage, and the guardian angel once more at the helm to care for its occupant, now aged and feeble, as in the beginning he cared for the infant. Blessed is this Charity. I believe that God is blessing it. Because you are caring for the aged and feeble you are entitled to the sympathy and support of all good persons. I am rejoiced to understand that you take aged couples, being unwilling to part the old couples in their declining days, until their final separation by that hand that joined them in their youth. He then quoted the beautiful Scotch lines, "John Anderson my Joe." He referred to the colored people being like the Israelites of old, they have been freed from bondage and are now being prepared for a higher condition in life, as it were, by forty years discipline in the wilderness to further fulfill the work of God. The Negroes of America have always been the people of Christ, I have never known a disbeliever among them.

H. Garrigues lead the old folks in singing the hymn, "Help just a little," and "It is well with my soul."

Dr. J. Wheaton Smith, who has been a life long friend of the colored people, and at a time when it was a great sacrifice to speak for them, was introduced. He made a few interesting remarks and closed by relating an incident which came under his notice some time during the war, during the early days of that great struggle of the nation. There were a great many fugitives from the South coming to this city, and much suffering followed by so many uneducated laborers flocking to a strange city; and, while passing through one of our by-streets, he overheard a little woolly headed child earnestly praying thus, "O Lord, give me some bread, I have had nothing to eat since yesterday." He stated that it was hardly necessary to add that the simple little prayer was indeed answered right speedily.

Frances E. W. Harper added a few remarks to those already made,

and stated the colored people were working to elevate themselves, and not to be merely imitators, she believed they were being prepared to fill an important mission in the Christian world, she believed their mission was not so much to civilize as to Christianize the world, like the Saviour they had been despised, they have suffered ignominy, "the foxes have holes and the birds have nests," but, like Him, they had not where to lay their heads, they were mocked and poor, but through all were being purified and prepared for a grand work in God's creation, they are a young race and are looking earnestly forward to the future, we may sometimes look back to the sad remembrance of the past. There is a work for the Negro to do as well as for the white. We are doubling in numbers and are we not to do our part to Christianize the Colored of all the world?

Mrs. L. Haas beautifully and touchingly sang, "Cast thy bread upon the waters."

The meeting closed with singing the Doxology, and a benediction was pronounced by Bishop J. P. Campbell.

* ANNUAL REPORT. *

IN presenting their Twenty-fourth Annual Report, the Board of Managers of the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons are thankful to be able to say, that, out of the great fountain of good, a large share has fallen to this Institution and its deserving and dependant inmates. The kindly heart of humanity in our great city has generously opened to appeals in behalf of these, both by gifts of money and merchandise, and in various other ways contributed to the enjoyment of this large household. A number of very interesting entertainments have been given to the inmates by their numerous friends, both instructive and amusing, which go far towards relieving the tedious monotony of the lives of those whose little world is compassed by four walls.

On the 4th of Seventh month an Entertainment was given at the Home, which was enlivened by music, addresses and recitations; a generous supply of ice-cream and cake was donated by George Roegner. Henry Willten, on two different occasions, took those of the inmates who were able to go to the Zoological Garden, they being under the care of the Matron and Housekeeper. Mr. Hart, proprietor of the restaurant, very generously treated them to ice-cream.

The various holiday occasions, as Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year, were marked by very interesting exercises for the entertainment of the family, which they seemed most heartily to enjoy, and their earnest expressions of appreciation left no room for doubt that the good people who contributed towards these entertainments, were blessed in the giving. A Stereoptican Exhibition was given by Rev. J. G. Bawn. Music, both instrumental and vocal, was furnished by the friends of the inmates,

addresses were made and recitations given by a number of others, and what is of no little importance on these occasions, the creature comforts were considered by a bountifully spread board.

Twelfth month, 8th was selected as Donation Day, the kind friends of the Home contributing money, stores for the larder, dry goods, etc. It was also made an opportunity to enliven the routine life of the inmates by appropriate addresses and recitations, followed by a concert in the evening. The Records show a very wide-spread feeling of kindly interest in these aged people by their friends, who have so frequently given their time and talents toward their entertainment, and which, if space allowed, we would gladly and more fully acknowledge here.

Religious meetings are regularly held on each Sabbath Day, and are often very largely attended by interested friends. The inmates take part in conducting their exercises very frequently, and we cannot estimate the great satisfaction these seasons of religious communion afford these simple and trusting souls.

At the time of our last Report, there were in the Home 114. During the year 10 men and 25 women have been admitted; 30 have been removed by death, 5 men and 25 women; one man left. This leaves the present number 118, three of whom have entered their second century.

It may seem necessary to account for the large percentage of deaths in one year, and which can be readily understood when it is taken into consideration that many of these had reached far beyond the allotted period of life, while others were admitted to the Home in a physical condition that rendered them fit subjects for Hospital treatment, and when death kindly relieved them from all suffering, it was just cause for thankfulness.

Rachel Warne, who died Twelfth month 28th, 1887, was the last survivor of the family moved from the old Home on Front street, and three of the others were the first to enter the Home after its removal to its present location.

Our domestic arrangements have been as satisfactory as we could reasonably expect in so large an establishment, composed of such elements as are to be brought into harmonious working as one family. Our valuable Matron and Housekeeper are ever watchful that the comfort of all shall, as far as possible, be secured.

“Behold there are my mother and my brethren,” is as true to day, as when the blessed Jesus, looking upon the mixed multitude of rich and poor, master and servant, uttered these words.

Another year having rolled around, with much pleasure I submit for your perusal my Annual Report, desiring that it may meet your approval.

The mortality of the house has been rather more than that of last year, owing no doubt to the fulness of the house, and there having been so many enfeebled inmates left over from the preceeding year, as well as so many being in poor health when they entered. The general sanitary condition of the house has been good, no infectious or contagious diseases having existed in the family. The causes of the mortality has been what we consider natural ones. The cleanliness and purity of the house reflects great credit upon those who have had the charge of it.

The number of deaths for the same period has been 30. I have secured, by the kindness of Wm. Weightman (Powers & Weightman), some of their preparations; also from Henry R. P. Cott, of New York, a case of Platt's Chlindes, for disinfecting purposes; also a remembrance from John Wyeth & Bro. of this city. All of which I shall respectfully acknowledge.

In Memoriam.

SARAH MARSHALL.

FREQUENTLY of late have we been called upon to record the death of some one of our co-workers; but in none have the officers and inmates of the Home sustained so great a loss, as in the decease of Sarah Marshall, who was ever a generous, earnest and sympathetic friend; always ready to minister to the comfort, pleasure and happiness of the needy. The necessities of the Home seem ever to have been anticipated and met by the relief she afforded;—and the good cheer and delicacies which ever greeted the inmates on festive occasions will never be forgotten. Her life was one of devotion to others, and its close came as a rest to sufferings which were patiently and meekly borne.

In Memoriam.

AUNT HANNAH TODD.

AMONG the many who have found in this Home an asylum and resting place for their weary bodies, during their last days on earth, "Aunt Hannah Todd" was a remarkable and conspicuous character.

In common with many others, she had endured years of slavery, and had providentially found the precious boon of freedom in a strange land, among strangers. She had not upon earth any one with whom she could claim kindred. Her advent into Philadelphia from her prison house of bondage, in the State of Missouri, was in the year 1854.

Her's being an unusually interesting case, a brief record of her eventful life was made and carefully preserved, and later published with the records of the "Underground Rail Road." Only a few extracts therefrom are necessary to indicate the character of this woman, whose early life was spent in bondage, the most harrowing incidents of which must be omitted here.

Aunt Hannah could recall the names of six masters, under five of whom she had received very brutal treatment. The last, whose name was Moore, and whose name she assumed, treated her very kindly. In company with her mistress, who was traveling North, she was taken by the "Underground Rail Road Committee," and under the laws of Pennsylvania, was made free. She highly appreciated the blessing of freedom, and on every fitting occasion, expressed her gratitude to her heavenly Father, and to her kind friends for their intercession in her behalf.

The following extract is sufficient to show how on one occasion she was treated by her master: "Being afflicted with rheumatism, and not able to work, my master, fearing I was not going to be of any service to him, traded me off for a wagon." Of another, she says: "I was his only slave, he being a very poor man. He bought me when I was not quite four years old for \$100.00." His treatment of this poor little waif, who never had any recollections of father or mother, was cruel and inhuman in the extreme. To quote her own words: "I was treated by this man more as a brute than a human being, fed like a dog from a wooden trough, and slept alone in an out-house some distance from the one occupied by the family." Fifty-seven years were passed in this miserable life of slavery.

After she had attained her liberty in Philadelphia, she spent many years in the family of the Gillinghams, always faithful, obliging and honest, endearing herself to her employers, who in their turn, to their latest days, regarded her as a most trusty and loved friend. She was of a deeply religious turn of mind, and through all her bitter and varied experiences, her faith in her Heavenly Father remained unchanged.

She early connected herself with the African M. E. Bethel Church of Philadelphia, where her exemplary conduct won for her universal respect, and the same can be said of her during her long sojourn in the Home. Sobriety, earnestness and truthfulness being her marked characteristics.

At the advanced age of 104 years, she passed to a better inheritance, and of the many who stood around her open grave, there was not one to say an unkind word of

RULES.

RULE 1.

The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the rules, see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and, if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M. and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.

No person shall be admitted to the Home but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.

Those received in the Home must be at least 60 years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will be retained no longer, but will be charged board for the time they may be residents in the Home, at the rate of two and a half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which is to be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.

Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Managers for the use of the institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

RULE 5.

Colored persons, over the age of sixty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the Institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall be subjected to the same rules, and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board, previous to their admission.

RULE 6.

No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks notice, however must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.

A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence and the report of the Committee on Admissions thereon, and any information they may deem important.

RULE 8.

Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death, the funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 9.

None but the Physician of the Institution, or his substitute, shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends

desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at liberty to employ such; providing the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the Institution.

RULE 10.

After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be afforded for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 11.

Religious Meetings shall be held in the Home on the First-day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12.

Any of the inmates desirous of visiting their friends (on their written invitation), must obtain permission from the Matron.

RULE 13.

No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home, unless ordered by the Physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 14.

All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.
