ANNUAL MEETING

HE Twenty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Contributors to the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons was held at the Home, corner of Belmont and Girard Avenues, Philadelphia, 6th mo. 9th, 1892. William Still, Presiding.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Mr. Phillips and the singing of the hymn "Rock of Ages".

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.

The annual report submitted by the board of managers, was read by Anna C. Collins, which was accepted and referred to the incoming board of managers for publication.

On motion, the President appointed the following named contributors to bring forward the names of persons to serve as officers and managers for the ensuing year, viz: Lydia E. Pennock, Ruth K. Smedley, Henry H. Phillips, Hans Schadd, Sarah Bell, who reported the following named persons (see page 3,) who were duly elected to serve as officers and managers for the ensuing year.

The Treasurer's report was read, which on motion was referred to the incoming Board of Managers for publication.

The Physician Dr. Sam'l C. Henszey's report was read, which was also referred to the incoming Board.

The Rev. Dr. Wayland, Editor of the "National Baptist" was introduced by the President, and addressed the meeting in his usual interesting manner.

Dr. Johnson, late of Arkansas, was called upon and spoke encouragingly to all connected to continue in the good work and faint not, for "As ye do it unto the least of these my Brethern, ye do it unto me." He said there was no such Home out in his native state, indeed he knew of nothing to equal this Home anywhere and

suggested singing, "Praise God from Whom all Blessings Flow."

Mrs. Fanny M. Coppin moved the following, which was carried: Resolved:-That this meeting records with deep regret, the declination of Israel H. Johnson, for re-election as Treasurer, who for 17 years, has faithfully and efficiently administered its financial affairs, during which time it must have been a labor of no little magnitude to attend to the legal transfer of the many bequests, large and small made to the Home and to the collection of the revenue arising therefrom. To his sterling character the Home is doubtless indebted for thousands of dollars, because people prefer to give money when they know that it will be honestly applied to the purpose it was given. He retires from his responsible office followed by the heart-felt gratitude of the Board of Managers and enriched with the blessing of the poor, the lowly and the oppressed of God's people, who, after many years of toil and hardship in this life, find their last days brightened by the comforts of this beautiful, Christian Home.

"And thou shall be blessed; for they cannot recompense thee: for thou shalt be recompensed at the resurrection of the just."

Mrs. Coppin, then addressed the meeting as follows:—We stand to-day in the light of the fulfilled promise of our Heavenly Father and it is our loving duty to bear testimony to His faithfulness in providing for the physical as well as the spiritual comforts of the least of His little ones. It will revive our faith to refer for a moment to the small beginning from which sprang this commodious and comfortable Home.

A poor colored woman, for want of a better home, finding that the Almshouse was the only refuge for the declining years of one whose active life had been spent in faithfully serving others, a lady interested herself in promoting the establishment of a Home for Aged Colored Persons. The first contribution was 50 cents followed by 10 cents from a poor servant girl.

To mention this circumstance, does not detract from the one hundred thousand dollars with which Stephen Smith founded the present Home building nor from the thousands of dollars since contributed by other benevolent friends; but it goes to show that however weak and unprotected we may appear to be, there is a Divine Providence above us that watches with equal tenderness over all His children. The most feeble efforts put forth in their behalf, become mighty through His blessing, and as surely as this Home has grown from so insignificant a beginning, just so surely will the iniquity of caste, cruelty and mob violence, be put down in this land, and we shall yet see righteous judgment executed between man and his brother man.

The annual Report of the Home, was never more interesting, how hopeful it is to hear that before long, there will be an addition made in the form of a large building which will accommodate many more aged and infirm persons. Dr. Wayland has referred to the work going on in the schools in the south, and it reminds me of the very interesting report which I heard not long since, of the work of Martha Schofield and the Laing School.

The educational work among the colored youth, represents those powerful, silent forces, which are slowly lifting to a higher level, thinking and living, in the south.

Miss Ida B. Wells, Editress of the paper called "Free Speech" published at Memphis, Tenn., addressed the meeting and gave a sad account of the lynching of her people in the south, and of her own exile from her native state, on account of the publishing of the outrages in her paper.

Frances E. W. Harper, made a few very interesting remarks and was followed by her daughter, Mary, who recited beautifully, a poem written for this occasion.

Thomas Walter, then addressed the meeting in his usual humorous style. After singing the hymn, "Jesus loves me", the meeting closed.

ANNUAL REPORT.

HE Managers of the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons present their Twenty-eighth Annual Report, with renewed feelings of gratitude to the Giver of all good gifts for His manifold blessings, and thankfulness that we have escaped the calamities, famine, fire and flood, from which so many of our fellow beings have suffered.

At the close of the last Report, there were in the Home one hundred and fourteen inmates. During the year just ended, six men and thirteen women have been received. Twenty-six have been removed by death. Hannah Benson died at the Norristown Hospital for the Insane, and was brought back to the Home for burial. At present there are in the Home one hundred and seven inmates, ranging in age from sixty to one hundred and fourteen years.

Our Home, in common with other institutions for the care of the aged and infirm, suffered during the winter from the epidemic of Influenza, seven of our inmates dying in one month. In that number is included Keziah Jackson who became an inmate of the Home in 1883, having served as nurse as long as she was physically able to perform the duties of the position. After she became an inmate she continued to assist with such work as she was able for, ministering by both word and deed to the necessities and comfort of the sick and suffering around her. Many are the grateful recollections which cluster around the name of Nurse Jackson. We wish to record our grateful appreciation of Dr. Samuel C. Henszey's watchfulness and care, and feel that to his constant attention, under the Divine blessing, is largely due the comparatively few fatal results of the disease. To Elizabeth J. Helms, our seamstress, who so willingly and satisfactorily took charge of the house when both the Matron and the Assistant were suffering with La Grippe, to the inmates who so kindly cared for them, and to our nurses who so

faithfully met each additional duty, we tender our appreciative thanks.

Bishop Jabez Pitt Campbell, for more than twenty years a highly esteemed and respected Manager of the Home, and who had ever given it his warm sympathy and unfailing interest, died 8th month, 9th, 1891, in the seventy-sixth year of his age. There seemed a particular appropriateness in his remains resting in the Chapel of this Home, surrounded by those who had so often listened to his words of exhortation and prayer and that they should be the last to look a farewell upon their friend.—"He being dead yet speaketh, encouraging all to follow him as he followed Christ."

It is with regret we report the resignation of the Treasurer, Israel H. Johnson, who has by earnest work and faithfulness in the discharge of the duties connected with the office, won the unanimous gratitude of Corporation, Board of Managers and such of the inmates as are capable of appreciating what his labors have meant to them. After seventeen years of service he asked to be released from the arduous responsibilities, but his interest in the Home remains and we continue to have the benefit of his experience and judgment in the meetings of the Board.

The domestic arrangements of the Home have continued under the care of Charlotte L. Riker as Matron and her assistant Elizaabeth M. Lloyd. Their attention to the affairs of the household and their interest in the inmates give the best proof of their efficiency. To the watchfulness of our engineer, Calvin W. Mitchell, we are indebted. In addition to his regular duties he has given much attention through the house, thereby strengthening the hands of those in authority. To these and the entire corps of workers we extend our sincere thanks, as all have contributed a useful part in carrying out the objects of their appointment.

Many times during the year have the friends of the Home given substantial evidence of their desire that we continue to carry out the provisions of the Charter of the institution, "to afford relief to that worthy class of colored persons who have endeavored through life to maintain themselves, but who are from various causes finally dependent upon the charity of others." The need of a special fund to aid those who are unable to furnish the admission fee, small as it is compared to the comforts secured by its payment, has been increasingly impressed upon us by cases requiring prompt action on our

Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons.

part or privation and suffering to the aged ones knocking at our door. This great need will, we trust, commend itself to the practical sympathy of those interested in our work, and secure for us the means with which to assist deserving applicants. "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of these my brethern, even the least, ye did it unto me."

Religious meetings have continued to be held regularly on each Sabbath and at stated times during the week, much to the comfort and satisfaction of our aged inmates. The different holidays were observed, the devotional services being conducted by ministers of various denominations. The Jubilee Singers from New Orleans, the House of Refuge Band and other interested friends entertained and delighted our old people with vocal and instrumental music, recitations and readings. To all who contributed to their pleasure we extend our thanks. A very pleasant incident New Year's Day was the presentation of portraits of the late Bishop and Mary A. Campbell. They occupy places on the Chapel wall and are acceptable reminders of their labors in behalf of the Home.

To Prof. G. H. Riching for his instructive and entertaining lectures on the South as it was and as it is, to George Roegner for liberal donations of ice cream and cake, to the friends who made the visits to the Zoological Garden so pleasant, to the Belmont Flower Mission and many others to whom we are indebted for various attentions to our family, we wish to offer our due acknowledgments.

Early in the year it became evident that better laundry facilities were very much needed. A committee was appointed to thoroughly study the needs and the best way to meet them. As a result of their labors the Laundry has been fitted up with steam appliances, and we feel the machinery is so complete that with competent help the work can be done more economically and satisfactorily. The painting of the inside walls on the first floor has been continued, adding very much to the attractiveness of the rooms. A room near the center of the building on the second floor has been arranged and furnished for the use of the physician in charge, which adds greatly to his convenience as well as to the comfort of those requiring his aid.

On hearing of the death of our beloved friend Sarah Pennock, these lines came so forcibly to mind that it seems fitting they should be the opening of this little testimony to her

"Gone before us, oh our sister, To the spirit-land, Vainly look we for another, In thy place to stand."

In her removal, the home and its inmates have lost a devoted friend and advisor. Her clear, cool and fearless judgment was never withheld when she thought it was needed. Ever true to her conviction of right, she was unfaltering in the performance of what she believed to be her duty. Her retiring, gentle and loving nature endeared her to those who were her associates and co-workers. Her wide-spread sympathy was extended to all suffering humanity, no matter what their condition in life might be, the poor were materially aided, the sick comforted and all in such a modest quiet way, exemplifying her obedience to the divine command, "Let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth." Her life was rich in all good works, and a beautiful example of love and charity to all who came within her influence, surely she in no small measure obeyed the scripture injunction, Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ."

It would not be just to the memory of our dear friend to close this little sketch without some mention of her interest in all reformatory and philanthropic work.

That which was the most unpopular seemed the more strongly to claim her interest and sympathy. The little white ribbon so constantly worn upon her breast, told of her faithfulness to the temperance cause.

"With that deep insight which detects, All great things in the small, And knows how each man's life effects, The spiritual life of all.

She walked by faith and not by sight, By love and not by law, The presence of the wrong or right, She rather felt than saw."

CHARTER OF INCORPORATION.

Whereas, the undersigned citizens of this Commonwealth have, together with other citizens, associated for the purpose of establishing in the City of Philadelphia a Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, and are desirous of being Incorporated agreeably to the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act to Confer on Certain Associations of the Citizens of this Commonwealth the Powers and Immunities of Corporations, or bodies politic in law." They therefore declare the following to be the objects, articles, and conditions of their said association, agreeably to which they desire to be incorporated, viz:

TITLE.

1st. This Association shall be called "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons."

OBJECT.

2d. The object of this Association shall be the relief of that worthy class of colored persons who have endeavored through life to maintain themselves, but from various causes are dependent upon the charity of others.

ARTICLES AND CONDITIONS.

- 3d. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer, who shall perform the duties usual to those positions, and a Board of Managers, twenty-four in number, who will make all needful rules and regulations, subject to the approval of the Association at its annual meeting, to which they shall submit a report of the proceedings. The officers shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board.
- 4th. A quorum of the Association shall be fifteen, and of the Managers, ten. The Managers shall meet at least once in each month.

- 5th. At each annual meeting, two auditors shall be appointed to examine the Treasurer's account previous to its presentation at the next annual meeting, and report as to its correctness.
- 6th. Respectable colored persons may be admitted into the Home, or board therein, with the consent of the Visiting Committee, in accordance with the rules which the Managers may adopt for the government of the Institution.
- 7th. The terms of membership of the Association shall be an annual contribution of two dollars. The payment of twenty-five dollars shall constitute a life membership.
- 8th. The Association shall meet annually, for the election of officers and other business, on the second Fifth-day (Thursday) in the Sixth month (June) of each year, at such time and place as may be agreed upon, of which two week's notice shall be given by the Managers.*
- 9th. The clear yearly income of real and personal estate held by the Association shall not at any time exceed the sum of thirty thousand dollars.
- 10th. The Association shall have the power to make By-Laws, not inconsistent with this Charter nor the laws of the land, and to alter and annul the same at pleasure, and a failure to elect officers at any time shall not dissolve this Corporation.
- 11th. If any member shall die or resign, the vacancy may be filled by an election, at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, of one to serve in his stead until the next annual meeting of the Association.

In the matter of the Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons."

And now, this second day of December, A. D. 1867, the Articles of Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons" having been heretofore, to wit, on the thirteenth day of November, A. D. 1867, filed in the office of the Prothonotary of said Court, and due notice having been inserted in a newspaper printed in said County, in due conformance to law; on motion of Edward Hooper, it is declared and decreed that the persons so associated under such articles shall, according to the articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in the law.

And it is further ordered and directed that the said Charter of Incorporation shall be recorded in the Office for the Recording of Deeds in and for the said County of Philadelphia. And on the said instrument being so recorded, the persons so associated or meaning to associate, shall according to the objects, articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in law and in fact, to have continuance by the name, style, and title in said instrument provided and declared.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

The Managers shall meet on the second Fourth-day in every month, at such time as may be agreed upon.

ARTICLE II.

Special Meetings may be called by the Chairman, or at the request of any three members.

ARTICLE III.

All reports of committees shall be made to the Board in writing.

ARTICLE IV.

The meetings of the Board shall be conducted according to the Rules of Order usual in similar bodies.

ARTICLE V.

Standing committees on the following subjects shall be appointed by the chairman at the first meeting in each current year:

- 1st. A Committee on Management.
- 2d. A Committee on Admissions.
- 3d. A Committee on Property.
- 4th. A Committee on Supplies.
- 5th. A Committee on Religious Meetings.
- 6th. A Committee on Interments.
- 7th. A Committee on Finance.

ARTICLE VI.

The Committee of Management shall consist of the women members of the Board. They shall have a general supervision of the internal arrangements of the Home, and shall propose to the Board any regulations or measures which may be needed for its government. They shall divide themselves into the following sub-committees:

1st. A House Committee of two, to be appointed monthly in rotation; to visit the Home each week, and endeavor to be present once during meals. They shall make themselves acquainted with the situation and wants of the inmates, generally direct the concerns of the family, and report their observations in a book provided for this purpose.

2d. A Clothing Committee of four, who shall superintend the making and distribution of clothing, and give directions in regard to any industrial employment of the inmates.

ARTICLE VII.

The Committee on Property and Finance shall consist of the men members of the Board, and shall have charge of the real estate and financial affairs of the Home.

ARTICLE IX.

The Committee on Supplies, in conjunction with the Matron, shall make all necessary purchases for the Home.

ARTICLE X.

The Committee on Interments shall make all needful arrangements for the funerals of our inmates, and at least one of them shall be present on such occasions.

ARTICLE XI.

The Board shall appoint annually one or more Physicians, to look after the health of the inmates.

ARTICLE XII.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

RULES.

RULE 1.—The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the rules, see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and if necessary, report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 o'clock P. M., and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.—No person shall be admitted to the Home but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3—Those received in the Home must be at least 60 years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will be retained no longer, but will be charged board for the time they may be residents in the Home, at the rate of two and a half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which is to be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.—Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

RULE 5.—Colored persons, over the age of sixty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide; but shall

be subjected to the same rules and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board, previous to their admission.

RULE 6.—No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two week's notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.—A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Committee on Admissions thereon, and any information they may deem important.

RULE 8.—Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death the funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 9.—None but the Physician of the institution or his substitute, shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at liberty to employ such; providing the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the institution.

Rule 10.—After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be offered for silent or vocal worship.

Rule 11.—Religious meetings shall be held in the Home on the First-day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12.—Any of the inmates desirous of visiting their friends (on their written invitation) must obtain permission from the Matron, nor absent themselves at any time without permission.

RULE 13.—No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home unless ordered by the Physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

Rule 14.—All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.

Rule 15.—All that is necessary for the comfortable support of the inmates of the Home will be furnished from the funds of the institution; no individual, therefore, will, on any account, be permitted to solicit assistance.

RULE 16.—All inmates are expected to render themselves generally useful, as far as their strength will admit.

RULE 17.—Smoking and the use of tobacco in any form is strictly prohibited, except in such place as designated by the Matron.

RULE 18.—The bell will be rung ten minutes before each meal, and all who are able will promptly repair the dining-room. When seated, a suitable pause shall be observed. No inmate will be allowed to carry food from the table. The sick and infirm only will be accommodated with meals upstairs.

RULE 19.—No inmate will be permitted to interfere or find fault with Matron or assistants; but if they think they have cause for complaint they must apply to the Monthly Committee, who will receive their statement and take such action thereon as may be proper.

RULE 20.—To preserve harmony in the family the strictest attention should be paid to the rules of the Home. For the first and second offence, the Matron will admonish the offender. For the third, she will report them to the House Committee; and for the fourth, removal from the Home, if so approved by the Board of Managers.
