

-ANNUAL MEETING-

Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, 4400 Girard Avenue.

THE Thirty-Second Annual Meeting of the Contributors of the above named Institution was held in the Chapel, at the Home, Sixth month, 11th, 1896.

Dr. Cornelius T. Shaffer, Chairman of the old Board of Managers, presided in place of William Still, the President of the Association, who, though present, was too ill to preside.

Rev. I. P. Sampson opened the meeting with prayer.

The minutes of the last meeting held Sixth month, 1895, were read and approved.

The Treasurer's report was read and on motion was referred to the incoming Board of Managers for publication.

The Chairman appointed the following named contributors a committee to nominate officers to serve for the ensuing year, viz: Lydia E. Pennock, Samuel Emlen, Ruth K. Smedley, Levi Cromwell, Theodore Gould, Thomas Murray; they reported the following named persons, who were elected to serve for the ensuing year. (See page 4.)

Letters of regret at their inability to attend were read from Judges Paxson and Sulzberger.

Addresses were delivered by Rev. Thomas Gould of Zion Chapel, Bishop Grant of the first district of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, including Alabama and Georgia, Rev. C. Richards, D. D., of the Congregational Church, and a stirring address by Mrs. Fanny M. Coppin, who implored the people of the colored race to look with pride and honor on the people of Philadelphia for the great benefits they had lavished on her down-trodden people.

After the singing of a hymn by the old folks, the benediction was pronounced by Rev. I. B. Reed, D. D.

- ANNUAL REPORT -

THE Managers of the "Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons" present their Thirty-second Annual Report, as follows:

Number of inmates at the present time, 140—29 men, 111 women. Admissions during the year, 22—7 men, 15 women. Number of deaths, 14—7 men and 7 women. One woman left the Home from choice, and one man was expelled for persistent disorderly conduct.

The sanitary condition of the Institution during the year has been highly satisfactory; and while there are always many needing medical attention, the general health of the inmates has been quite as good as can be expected. Indeed it is remarkable how in many cases those who come to us in a weak and wretched condition improve under the care and attention they receive.

We believe the various officers of the Institution and the committees on management in their frequent visits to the Home and to the old people, are conscientiously concerned to discharge their numerous duties in such a manner as will contribute to the best welfare of the inmates. Believing with Dr. Chalmers, "These are duties all men owe to distress, and that such tender mercies are twice blessed."

It is encouraging to the Managers to hear testimonies from many of the "old people" of the thankful appreciation of their comfortable surroundings, and the kind care they receive from the matron and housekeeper.

Calvin Mitchel, our engineer, after fourteen years of continued service, was granted a much needed absence of two weeks during the autumn, returning from which he resumed his manifold duties with renewed energy and interest.

To meet any possible contingency that might arise to prevent our long tried and faithful physician from attending to his duties, the Board thought it expedient to have an assistant. Dr. Wm. Evans being willing to render such services without compensation, he was appointed to the position.

The bake-oven, mentioned in our last report, continues to give

much satisfaction. The Doctor's laboratory, in the new building, and the diet kitchen have both been fitted up and are in use; but we still need some appliances for a workshop for the men.

Finding our plant for heating inadequate to the increased demand made on it by the addition of the Parker Building, a large new boiler was introduced in the autumn to supply the deficiency.

Religious meetings are held each Sabbath, with many mid-week services, all of which the inmates are encouraged to attend. When a fifth Sabbath occurs in the month, it is called Friends' Day, and members of that religious society are expected to take charge of the meeting held at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

The Rev. Dr. Auter, of Virginia, and Prof. S. G. Atkins, of Hampton College, have each visited the Home during the year, and preached acceptably to the inmates. A service of praise, conducted by the King's Sons and Daughters of Bethel M. E. Church, also one by members of the Christian Endeavor Society of Emanuel Presbyterian Church, led by Mrs. Jessie Black; and a service by the Parent Mite Society of Bethel Church, Elder Gould presiding, were each very much enjoyed by the old people.

Other occasions of special interest during the year have been: The observance of Independence Day, which consisted in the decoration of the building with the National colors, and a meeting in the chapel, addressed by Rev. W. C. Brown, of West Chester, and Rev. J. M. Palmer, after which an abundance of ice cream and cake was served. A visit to the Zoo by the matron and thirty inmates. Singing for the entertainment of the old people by Daisy and Elvira Alexander. A lecture with views of the progress made by Afro-Americans since their freedom from slavery, by Mr. G. F. Richings. An entertainment by the King's Daughters of Central Presbyterian Church, after which they treated the inmates to ice cream and cake. Also an entertainment of reading, singing and recitations by the King's Daughters, led by Miss Montier.

On the morning of Thanksgiving Day, the pupils from the Institute for Colored Youths entertained the family with singing, and Chief Justice Paxson, Fanny Coppin and Dr. Johnson made short addresses. In the afternoon Mrs. Haas, Mrs. Haviland and Mrs. Harper entertained them with humorous recitations, singing and reading.

Christmas Day was observed by a service in the morning, led by Samuel Jones, and a talk by Thomas Walters in the afternoon.

Many of the old people received presents from outside friends, which greatly delighted them.

The Board greatly regrets the long continued illness of our most valuable and efficient manager, Henry M. Laing. He has stood for years as a father to the Institution, willing to spend and be spent for the comfort and happiness of its inmates, who show their reverence for him by their earnest solicitude for his health, and the almost pathetic inquiries as to when they shall see him amongst them again.

Margaret A. Boling, wife of Thos. H. Boling, for several years a member of the Board, died 4th month, 13th. In the death of this good woman we feel we have sustained a serious loss. Her clear and impartial judgment and executive ability, coupled with a cheerful and sympathetic nature, made her a valuable helper. Through a long and suffering illness, she maintained her interest in the Home, and had her life been spared, would have been one of its most earnest supporters.

We also record with much sorrow the death of her husband, Thos. H. Boling, which occurred 5th month, 5th. In the removal of these two valuable managers in the short space of three weeks, we are forcibly reminded of the passage, "In the midst of life we are in death." And while keenly feeling our own loss, we are filled with sympathy for the family of the deceased.

The managers take this opportunity of extending their thanks to all those who have so kindly and generously aided them in their work, either by furnishing entertainment for the inmates, or by substantial aid for the support of the Home.

The patient endurance of many of these aged and afflicted ones is oftentimes most touching. We seldom hear a murmur or word of impatience on account of bodily suffering or infirmities. But they rather look forward joyfully and hopefully to the time when they shall lay all earthly burdens down.

Notwithstanding our finance committee is composed of able and experienced men, through the stringency of the times and the inability to realize on investments, our income, as may be seen by the summary of accounts, falls much below our expenditures. And we earnestly hope those who may be seeking desirable channels for the disposition of their means shall remember this Institution, wherein are gathered a class of needy ones, who should especially appeal to the generous and affluent of the community.

The late Rev. Philips Brooks tells us "No man has come to

Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons.

true greatness who has not felt in some degree that his life belongs to his race, and that what God has given him He has given him for mankind."

CHARTER OF INCORPORATION.

WHEREAS, the undersigned citizens of this Commonwealth have, together with other citizens, associated for the purpose of establishing in the City of Philadelphia a Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, and are desirous of being Incorporated agreeably to the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act to Confer on Certain Associations of the Citizens of this Commonwealth the Powers and Immunities of Corporation, or bodies politic in law." They therefore declare the following to be the objects, articles, and conditions of their said association, agreeably to which they desire to be incorporated, viz:

TITLE.

1st. This Association shall be called "The Home for Aged And Infirm Colored Persons."

OBJECT.

2d. The objects of this Association shall be the relief of that worthy class of colored persons who have endeavored through life to maintain themselves, but from various causes are dependent upon the charity of others.

ARTICLES AND CONDITIONS.

3d. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall perform the duties usual to those positions, and a Board of Managers, twenty-four in number, who will make all needful rules and regulations, subject to the approval of the Association at its annual meeting, to which they shall submit a report of the proceedings. The officers shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board.

4th. A quorum of the Association shall be fifteen, and of the Managers, ten. The Managers shall meet at least once in each month. 5th. At each annual meeting, two auditors shall be appointed to examine the Treasurer's account previous to its presentation at the next annual meeting, and report as to its correctness.

6th. Respectable colored persons may be admitted into the Home, or boarded therein, with the consent of the Visiting Committee, in accordance with the rules which the Managers may adopt for the Government of the Institution.

7th. The terms of membership of the Association shall be an annual contribution of two dollars. The payment of twenty-five dollars shall constitute a life membership.

8th. The Association shall meet annually, for the election of officers and other business, on the second Fifth-day (Thursday) in the sixth month (June) of each year, at such time and place as may be agreed upon, of which two weeks' notice shall be given by the Managers.*

9th. The clear yearly income of real and personal estate held by the Association shall not at any time exceed the sum of thirty thousand dollars.

Ioth. The Association shall have the power to make By-Laws, not inconsistent with this Charter nor the laws of the land, and to alter and annul the same at pleasure, and a failure to elect officers at any time shall not dissolve this Corporation.

11th. If any member shall die or resign, the vacancy may be filled by an election, at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, of one to serve in his or her stead until the next annual meeting of the Association.

In the matter of the Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons."

And now, this second day of December, A. D. 1867, the Articles of Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons" having been heretofore, to wit, on the thirteenth day of November, A. D. 1867, filed in the office of the Prothonotary of said Court, and due notice having been inserted in a newspaper printed in said County, in due conformance to law; on motion of Edward Hopper, it is declared and decreed that the persons so associated under such articles shall, according to the articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in law.

And it is further ordered and directed that the said Charter of Incorporation shall be recorded in the Office for the Recording of Deeds in and for the said County of Philadelphia. And on the said instrument being so recorded, the persons so associated or meaning to associate, shall according to the objects, articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in law and in fact, to have continuance by the name, style, and title in said instrument provided and declared.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

The managers shall meet on the second Fourth-day in every month, at such time as may be agreed upon.

ARTICLE II.

Special meetings may be called by the chairman, or at the request of any three members.

ARTICLE III.

All reports of committees shall be made to the Board in writing.

ARTICLE IV.

The meetings of the Board shall be conducted according to the Rules of Order usual in similar bodies.

ARTICLE V.

Standing committees on the following subjects shall be appointed by the chairman at the first meeting in each current year:

- 1st. A Committee on Management.
- 2d. A Committee on Admissions.
- 3d. A Committee on Property.
- 4th. A Committee on Supplies.
- 5th. A Committee on Religious Meetings.
- 6th. A Committee on Interments.
- 7th. A Committee on Finance.
- 8th. A Committee on Discipline.

ARTICLE VI.

The Committee on Management shall consist of the women members of the Board. They shall have a general supervision of the internal arrangements of the Home, and shall propose to the Board any regulations or measures which may be needed for its government. They shall divide themselves into the following sub-committees:

rst. A House Committee of two, to be appointed monthly in rotation; to visit the Home each week, and endeavor to be present once during meals. They shall make themselves acquainted with the situation and wants of the inmates, generally direct the concerns of the family, and report their observations in a book provided for this purpose.

2d. A Clothing Committee of four, who shall superintend the making and distribution of clothing, and give directions in regard to any industrial employment of the inmates.

ARTICLE VII.

The Committee on Property and Finance shall consist of the men members of the Board, and shall have charge of the real estate and financial affairs of the Home.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Committee on Supplies, in conjunction with the Matron, shall make all **ne**cessary purchases for the Home.

ARTICLE IX.

The Committee on Interments shall make all needful arrangements for the funerals of our inmates, and at least one of them shall be present on such occasions.

ARTICLE X.

The Board shall appoint annually one or more Physicians, to look after the health of the inmates.

RULES.

RULE 1.—The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the rules and see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and if necessary report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 P. M., and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.—No person shall be admitted to the Home but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.—Those received in the Home must be at least 60 years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will be retained no longer, but will be charged board for the time they may be residents in the Home, at the rate of two and one-half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which is to be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.—Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

RULE 5.—Colored persons over the age of sixty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide, but

shall be subjected to the same rules and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board, previous to their admission.

RULE 6.—No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.—A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Committee on Admission thereon, and any information that may be deemed important.

RULE 8.—Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death the funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 9.—None but the Physician of the institution or his substitute shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at liberty to employ such; provided the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the institution.

RULE 10.—After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be offered for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 11.—Religious meetings shall be held in the Home on the First day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12.—Any of the inmates desirous of visiting their friends (on their written invitations) must obtain permission from the Matron, nor absent themselves at any time without permission.

RULE 13.—No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home unless ordered by the Physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 14.—All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.

RULE 15.—All that is necessary for the comfortable support of the inmates of the Home will be furnished from the funds of the institution; no individual, therefore, will, on any account, be permitted to solicit assistance.

RULE 16.—All inmates are expected to render themselves generally useful, as far as their strength will permit.

RULE 17.—Smoking and the use of tobacco in any form is strictly prohibited, except in such place as designated by the Matron.

RULE 18.—The bell will be rung ten minutes before each meal, and all who are able will promptly repair to the dining-room. When seated, a suitable pause shall be observed. No inmate will be allowed to carry food from the table. The sick and infirm only will be accommodated with meals upstairs.

RULE 19.—No inmate will be permitted to interfere or find fault with Matron or assistants; but if they think they have cause for complaint they must apply to the Monthly Committee, who will receive their statement and take such action thereon as may be proper.

RULE 20.—To preserve harmony in the family the strictest attention should be paid to the rules of the Home. For the first and second offence, the Matron will admonish the offender. For the third, she will report them to the House Committee; and for the fourth, removal from the Home, if so approved by the Board of Managers.
