MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE COLORED HOME.

THE Thirty-Eighth Annual Meeting of the contributors to the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons, 44th and Girard Ave., was held at the Home, Sixth month 12th, 1902. In the absence of the President, S. J. M. Brock was called to the chair. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. C. M. Crosby, of Philadelphia.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.

The annual report of the Board of Managers was read and approved and directed to be forwarded to the incoming Board of Managers for publication.

The chairman appointed a committee as follows: Lydia E. Pennock, Lindley Bedell, Mary A. Campbell, and Sarah L. Taylor, to nominate persons to serve as officers and also a Board of Managers and a co-operative committee to serve for the ensuing year. The Committee retired for conference.

The Treasurer read his report of receipts and expenditures for the past year. The report was accepted and referred to the incoming Board of Managers for publication.

The Nominating Committee returned and reported: For President, Hon. Edward M. Paxson; Vice-President, Samuel Emlen; Treasurer, Walter Penn Shipley; Secretary, Thomas H. McCollin; and the following as Board of Managers and Co-operative Committee. (See page 3.)

The meeting was addressed by the following: Rev. Dr. Kerr Boyce Tupper, Dr. P. Moort, Mrs. Fanny J. Coppin, Dr. Alex. G. McGuire. Miss Ida Chestnut sang a solo, much to the pleasure of those present. The old folks sang a number of appropriate hymns, led by Calvin Mitchell.

Miss Colier also entertained the company by singing some beautiful selections.

Rev. Dr. Reeves, Geo. A. Latimer, and others, addressed the meeting interestingly, a benediction was pronounced and the meeting adjourned.

ANNUAL REPORT.

The Board of Managers of the Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons present this their Annual Report—the 38th—with a feeling of gratitude that the year's work has been crowned by satisfactory results.

Our family at our last report numbered 138, of whom 25 have since died, 17 have been admitted,—3 men and 14 women ;—making the present number

Many of our very aged and infirm inmates who a year ago stood on the border of "The Unknown," have one after another passed over, making our death list seem an unusually large one.

Ann Washington, long a conspicuous figure in the Home and a typical representative of the days of slavery, passed away 12th month 15th, aged 94. Her funeral occurred on the 24th anniversary of her entrance into the Home.

Susan Moses died 4th month 14th, aged 99 years. She was, so far as known, without a living relative in the world. Three others whose death is recorded had long passed the 90th milestone.

Mary McDonald—familiarly known in the house and without, as "grandmother,"—whose extraordinarily prolonged sojourn in this life ever makes her a claimant upon our deepest sympathy and interest, is now nearing her 132nd birthday.

The new Infirmary has proven a blessing to the sick as well as to those who have to attend upon them. The one great need it makes apparent is a larger endowment fund to assist in meeting the increased expense its proper maintenance has involved. We trust in the near future our hopes in this direction may know a fulfillment.

During the prevalence of the epidemic of smallpox in our city the past winter, it became necessary to place restrictions upon visiting from and receiving visitors to the Home. The old people, with few exceptions, accepted the situation very cheerfully and

aided us much by the manner in which they submitted to the enforced confinement, in maintaining the so-called quarantine. We were very thankful that we were spared a visitation of this dreaded malady.

Religious services, both on the Sabbath and mid-weekly, have without interruption been observed.

The holiday occasions in their turn have been made seasons of gladness to all. The kind friends who have contributed to the successful observances of these would feel amply compensated did they hear the pleased and grateful expressions of our old people as they look back to some rare treat they have enjoyed. We wish herein to record their and our sincere thanks.

Joseph M. Truman, Jr. one of the founders of the institution, and always its willing helper, passed to the higher life since our last report. We are reminded of the truth and significance of the Scripture text, "Here ye have no continuing city," as we sorrowfully note the vacancy made in our Board by the death of one and another of our friends and co-workers.

Dr. Samuel P. Henzey, after many years of faithful service as physician to the Home, on account of increasing physical disabilities, tendered his resignation to take effect at the end of our fiscal year. It was with regret accepted on the part of the Board of Managers and of the old people, to whom he stood not only as a physician but as a kind sympathetic friend.

We feel that we are but doing justice to our employees and discharging an obligation of our own in making mention of our appreciation of their faithful and unwearied endeavors to discharge the unusually trying duties that have devolved upon them. This was due in a great degree to the number of rare cases of distressing illness with which some of our family were afflicted in the past winter.

The Home is ever becoming more comfortable and commodious, thus offering increased attractions to those whose declining years demand greater comforts and solace. Our "waiting list" is quite large and new applicants are coming forward almost monthly. In this connection we would like to emphasize the thought that comes to us of the sacredness of the obligation which children owe to their parents and they should not too readily shift this obligation, when age and infirmity overtake them, upon an

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

Consequent upon the increase of mortality incident to the late winter and early spring months, especially with those of advanced years, our death rate has reached its maximum.

Thirteen inmates of the Home have succumbed since the first of the year; the youngest of whom was sixty-six, the eldest was reputed to be over 100, four were over 90, and eight were more than 80.

The causes of death were various. One had valvular disease of the heart for a long time, another of physical exhaustion, superinduced by one of the forms of cutaneous disease, two of influenza, three of chronic brain trouble who had previously given evidences of mental weakness, two of apoplexy, two of old age and one of spinal disease and paralysis.

At the present time the health of the family is very satisfactory. The new infirmary has already proved its usefulness as a place where the sick can be more efficiently nursed and enjoy the benefits of quiet isolation.

MEMORIAL.

We have frequently found the duty devolving upon us of placing upon record the loss we have sustained in the removal by death of one and another of our valued and beloved co-workers in this charity, and none, perhaps, has more closely appealed to our sense of its fitness than in the case of our friend Joseph M. Truman, Jr.

He was one of the pioneers in this work of befriending the aged and enfeebled ones and was ever ready to the extent of his ability to give it his encouragement and support. He was a member of the Board of Managers at its organization, 1867, and, for some time thereafter, was its efficient secretary. His life long devotion to the cause of freedom, as applied to those, who, by the laws of our land, were held in bondage, entitled him to rank among the foremost friends of an oppressed people. He exemplified, in his daily living, a combination of the qualities that mark the upright man. The spirit of helpfulness distinguished his character in no common degree. The aim of his life was to brighten and uplift and assist other human lives.

The old people in the Home have expressed to us their appreciation of his kindness, and of what the loss of such a friend has been to them. He was largely instrumental in bringing the collection of anti-slavery relics, now the property of the Home, to its present completeness.

To those of his many friends who know him well and loved his uncompromising fidelity to truth, as it was revealed to him, his memory remains a fragrant offering, dropped by the wayside on the journey of life. We reverently believe that his devoted and exemplary living insured for him the reward of "well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

IN THE COURT OF COMMON PLEAS IN AND FOR THE
COUNTY OF PHILADELPHIA.

*In the matter of the Incorporation of "The Home for Aged
and Infirm Colored Persons."*

And now, this second day of December, A. D. 1867, the Articles of Incorporation of "The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons" having been heretofore, to wit, on the thirteenth day of November, A. D. 1867, filed in the office of the Prothonotary of said Court, and due notice having been inserted in a newspaper printed in said County, in due conformance to law; on motion of Edward Hopper, it is declared and decreed that the persons so associated under such articles shall, according to the articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in law.

And it is further ordered and directed that the said Charter of Incorporation shall be recorded in the Office for the Recording of Deeds in and for the said County of Philadelphia. And on the said instrument being so recorded, the persons so associated or meaning to associate, shall according to the objects, articles and conditions in said instrument set forth and contained, become and be a Corporation or body politic in law and in fact, to have continuance by the name, style, and title in said instrument provided and declared.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the seal of the said Court, this thirteenth day of December, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.

The managers shall meet on the second Fourth-day in every month, at such time as may be agreed upon.

ARTICLE II.

Special meetings may be called by the chairman, or at the request of any three members.

ARTICLE III.

All reports of committees shall be made to the Board in writing.

ARTICLE IV.

The meetings of the Board shall be conducted according to the Rules of Order usual in similar bodies.

ARTICLE V.

Standing committees on the following subjects shall be appointed by the chairman at the first meeting in each current year :

- 1st. A Committee on Management.
- 2d. A Committee on Admissions.
- 3d. A Committee on Property.
- 4th. A Committee on Supplies.
- 5th. A Committee on Religious Meetings.
- 6th. A Committee on Interments.
- 7th. A Committee on Finance.
- 8th. A Committee on Discipline.

ARTICLE VI.

The Committee on Management shall consist of the women members of the Board. They shall have a general supervision of the internal arrangements of the Home, and shall propose to the Board any regulations or measures which may be needed for its government. They shall divide themselves into the following sub-committees :

- 1st. A House Committee of two, to be appointed monthly in rotation; to visit the Home each week, and endeavor to be present once during meals. They shall make themselves acquainted with the situation and wants of the inmates, generally direct the concerns of the family, and report their observations in a book provided for this purpose.

2d. A Clothing Committee of four, who shall superintend the making and distribution of clothing, and give directions in regard to any industrial employment of the inmates.

ARTICLE VII.

The Committee on Finance shall consist of three men members of the Board and shall have charge of the financial affairs of the Home, the Treasurer being an *ex-officio* member.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Committee on Property shall consist of five members of the Board and shall have charge of all the property and real estate of the Home.

ARTICLE IX.

The Committee on Supplies, in conjunction with the Matron, shall make all necessary purchases for the Home.

ARTICLE X.

The Committee on Interments shall make all needful arrangements for the funerals of our inmates, and at least one of them shall be present on such occasions.

ARTICLE XI.

The Discipline Committee shall consist of three or more members of the Board, whose duty it shall be to adjust differences which may arise between the inmates of the "Home" when such get beyond the control of the Matron.

ARTICLE XII.

The Board shall appoint annually one or more Physicians, to look after the health of the inmates.

ARTICLE XIII.

RULES.

RULE 1.—The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the rules and see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality) as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and if necessary report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 P. M., and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.—No person shall be admitted to the Home but such as bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and the respectability of their character.

RULE 3.—Those received in the Home must be at least 60 years of age, and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. If their conduct during that time is not satisfactory, they will be retained no longer, but will be charged board for the time they may be residents in the Home, at the rate of two and one-half dollars per week, which is to be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance of which is to be returned to the party paying the same.

RULE 4.—Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

RULE 5.—Colored persons over the age of sixty, of respectable character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide, but

shall be subjected to the same rules and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board, previous to their admission.

RULE 6.—No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.—A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Committee on Admission thereon, and any information that may be deemed important.

RULE 8.—Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death the funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 9.—None but the Physician of the institution or his substitute shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at liberty to employ such; provided the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the institution.

RULE 10.—After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be offered for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 11.—Religious meetings shall be held in the Home on the First day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12.—Any of the inmates desirous of visiting their friends (on their written invitations) must obtain permission from the Matron, nor absent themselves at any time without permission.

RULE 13.—No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home unless ordered by the Physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 14.—All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.

RULE 15.—All that is necessary for the comfortable support of the inmates of the Home will be furnished from the funds of the institution; no individual, therefore, will, on any account, be permitted to solicit assistance.

RULE 16.—All inmates are expected to render themselves generally useful, as far as their strength will permit.

RULE 17.—Smoking and the use of tobacco in any form is strictly prohibited, except in such place as designated by the Matron.

RULE 18.—The bell will be rung ten minutes before each meal, and all who are able will promptly repair to the dining-room. When seated, a suitable pause shall be observed. No inmate will be allowed to carry food from the table. The sick and infirm only will be accommodated with meals upstairs.

RULE 19.—No inmate will be permitted to interfere or find fault with Matron or assistants; but if they think they have cause for complaint they must apply to the House Committee, who will receive their statement and take such action thereon as may be proper.

RULE 20.—To preserve harmony in the family the strictest attention should be paid to the rules of the Home. For the first and second offence, the Matron will admonish the offender. For the third, she will report them to the House Committee; and for the fourth, removal from the Home, if so approved by the Board of Managers.
