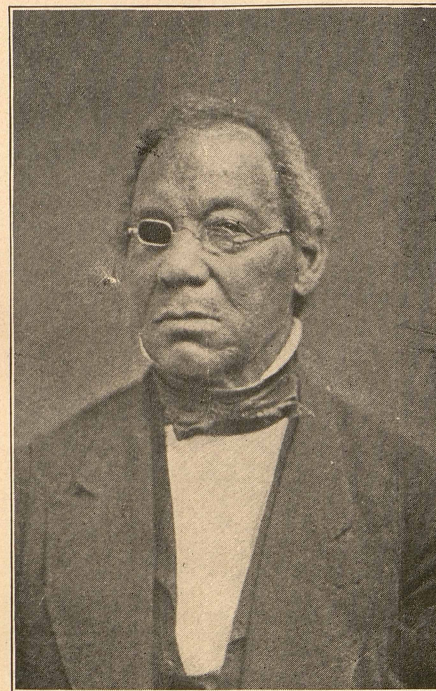

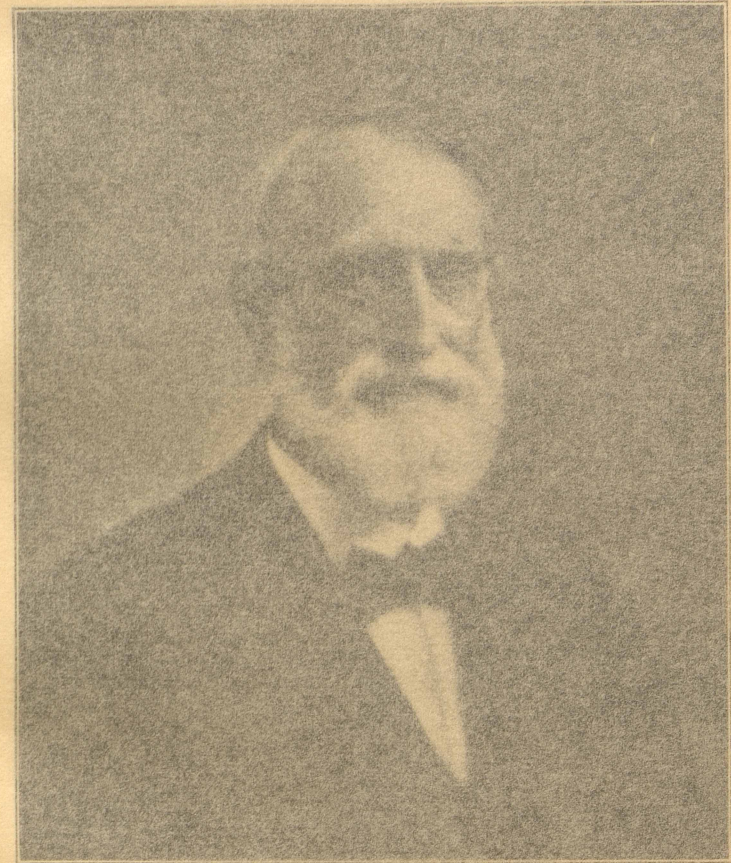

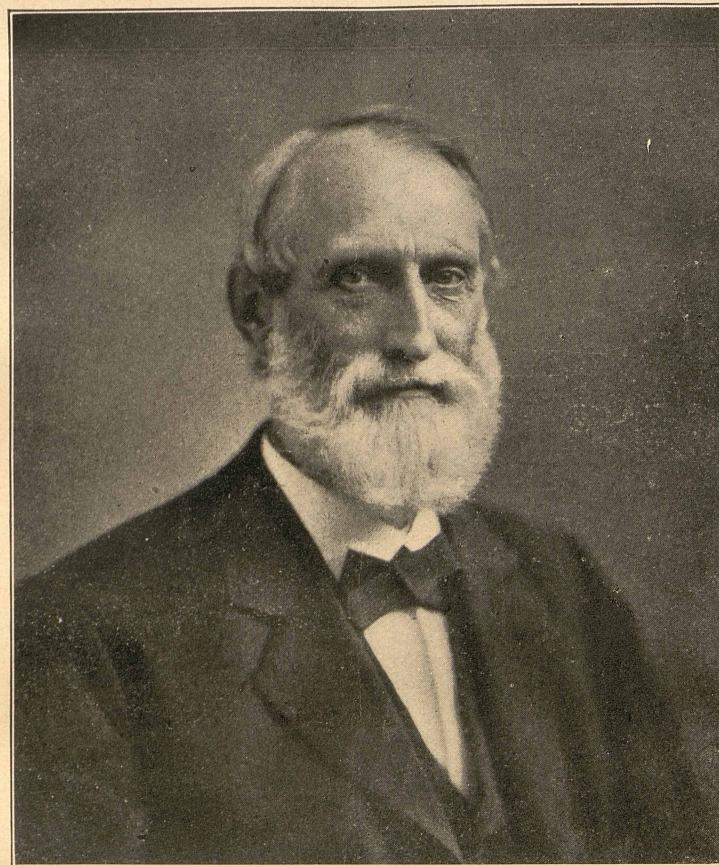

**REPORT OF THE MANAGERS OF THE HOME FOR  
AGED AND INFIRM COLORED PERSONS**

For the Year Ending May 22, 1924

The Home for Aged and Infirm Colored Persons came into being nearly sixty years ago, on September 28, 1864. It began modestly at 340 South Front Street and continued there until 1871, when it was moved to its present site at Girard and Belmont Avenues.

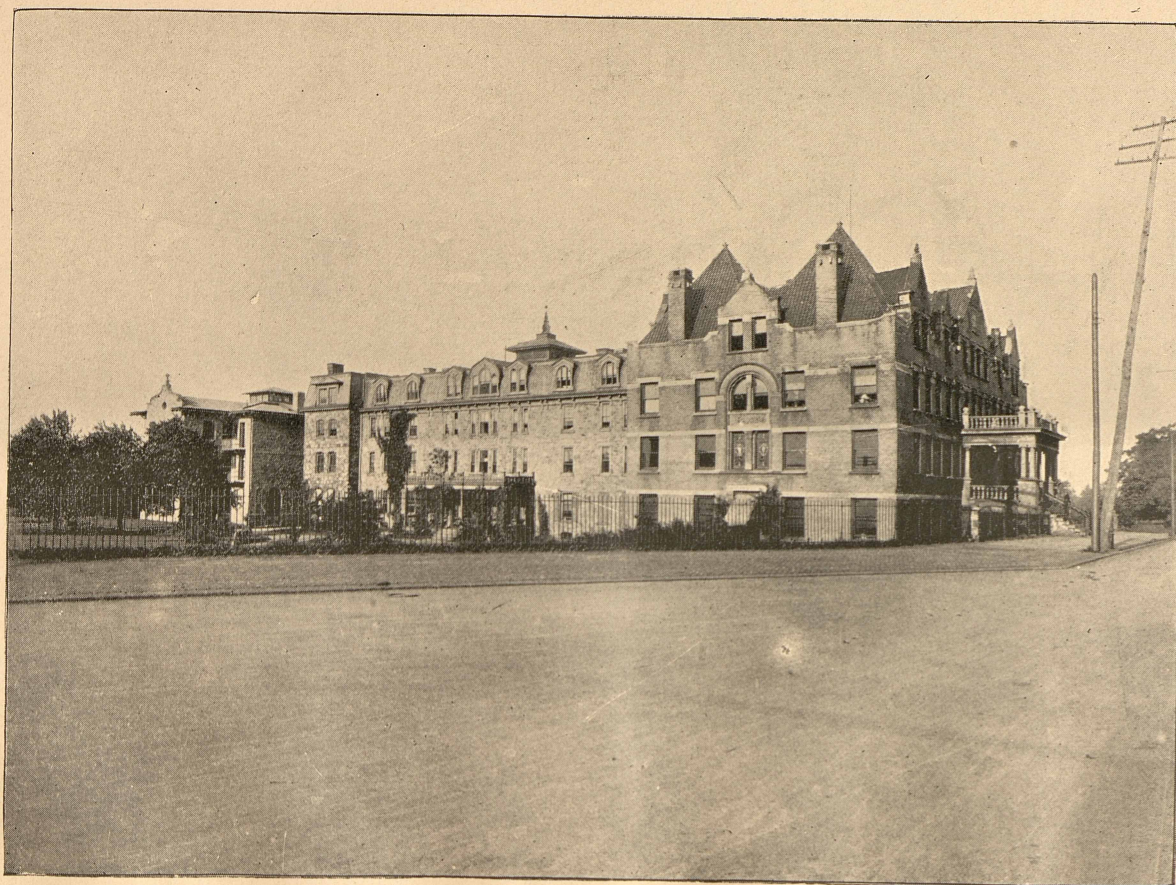
Stephen Smith, a leader among the colored people and a man of generosity and far-sightedness, gave the Home its land and later gave it a large sum of money toward the erection of its buildings. He also left a considerable trust fund, of which the income is paid to the Home.

Edward T. Parker was another generous friend of the Home. With money bequeathed by him the Parker building was put up, and a substantial amount was left over to be added to our endowment.

We have now, thanks to the generosity of these and of many other friends, two and a half acres of land, buildings which accommodate one hundred and forty persons and a moderate endowment fund.

During the past year the Olive Cemetery, which adjoined the Home to the west, has been cleared and sold. The Board of Education is erecting a handsome school on the western half of the lot and the eastern half, near the Home, is to be the site of dwelling houses. The trustees under Stephen Smith's will owned a share in the cemetery so that the result of the sale has been to remove what had become a nuisance and at the same time to put into the hands of the trustees \$35,000 to be added to the funds which they hold in trust for the Home.

To make a happy home for the one hundred and forty old people requires physical equipment, of course, but it also requires constant thought and effort. The matron, Mrs. Mary C. Dixon, lives in the Home and is primarily responsible for the welfare of its inmates. Four members of the Board of Managers are detailed each month to give special supervision. They visit the Home once a week, except during the two summer months, and often pay additional visits. It is our practice to examine the whole building in this way, and to talk with as many of the in-

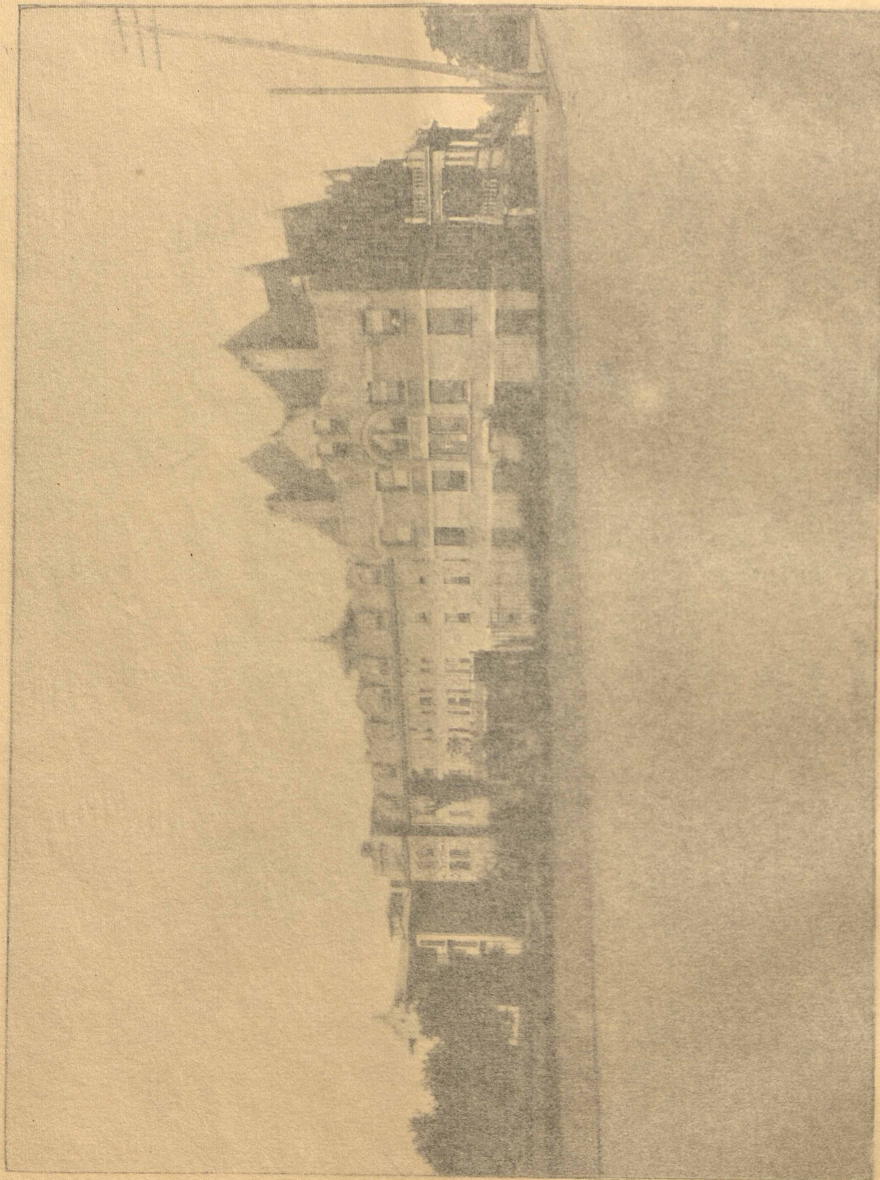

mates as possible during these visits. The monthly meetings of the managers are held at the Home, and this gives to each member of the Board an opportunity to inspect the Home and to visit the inmates.

There are now one hundred and three in the women's department, twenty-eight in the men's department, and one couple in the department set aside for married couples. Most of the rooms accommodate two, and in some cases three and four inmates. The infirmary lies in a separate wing and is under the constant care of a trained graduate nurse. Dr. William Evans visits the Home weekly and more often when he is needed.

We are most grateful to the friends who have helped us during the past year in a financial way and also to those who have brought happiness and cheer to the family by frequent visits and entertainments. Among these Miss Hodge, a teacher in the Westminster Presbyterian Sunday School, gave a talk on Mother's Day.

On Christmas about twenty members of a Community Centre came in the early morning and sang Christmas carols. Both of these entertainments were much enjoyed.

The Charles Sumner Post, No. 20, of the G. A. R., presented the Home with two flags, which are greatly prized and appreciated, one of our inmates having formerly belonged to that Post.

We call your attention to the events printed on a separate page of the Report, and thank you for the pleasure you have given these aged friends. We ask for your continued interest and help.

We record with regret the death of Dr. Thomas C. Imes, who was an efficient and interested member of the Board of Managers.

## RULES

RULE 1.—The Matron shall have the general charge of the Home, and keep it in neat order, under the direction of the Committee of Management. She is to enforce the rules and see that suitable nourishment is provided for the sick. She must be respectful and kind to every one in the Home, and attentive (without partiality), as their circumstances require. She will promptly check any quarreling or other improper conduct in the inmates, and if necessary report the same to the Visiting Committee. She shall keep a record of all clothing sent to the Home, and furnish the Committee with a monthly account thereof. She will be expected to go through the house about 10 P. M., and see that all unnecessary fires and lights are extinguished.

RULE 2.—Only those persons shall be admitted to the Home who can bring satisfactory testimonials of the propriety of their conduct and respectability of their character; and where the applicant has a husband or wife living, such applicant will not be admitted unless the husband or wife is also admitted.

RULE 3.—Those received into the Home must be at least sixty-five years of age and shall pay to the Treasurer the sum of Two hundred dollars. All who are admitted will be on probation for a period of six months. During this time, if for any reason they are considered by the Home to be undesirable as inmates, they will not be retained, but will be charged board at the rate of Three dollars per week for the time they may be residents in the Home, and such board shall be deducted from the sum paid for admission, the balance to be returned to the party paying the same.

If inmates leave the Home of their own accord, no money will be refunded.

RULE 4.—Any property or personal effects which an applicant may be possessed of must be made over for the benefit of the Home, prior to admission therein; and if any inherit property whilst in the Home, and prefer remaining, the said property must likewise be transferred to the Institution; all such transfers being recorded in a book kept for that purpose.

RULE 5.—Colored persons over the age of 65, of responsible character, and furnishing satisfactory references, may be boarded in the institution upon such terms as the Managers may decide, but shall be subjected to the same rules and have no privileges different from other inmates. Satisfactory security must be given for the regular payment of the board, previous to their admission.

RULE 6.—No boarder shall be received or continued in the Home to the exclusion of those entirely dependent. Two weeks' notice, however, must be given for the removal of any boarder.

RULE 7.—A register shall be kept of the names of all applicants, the persons by whom they are recommended, their place of residence, and the report of the Committee on Admission thereon, and any information that may be deemed important.

RULE 8.—Those who are pensioners on any benevolent institution or society, it is expected, will have their pensions continued to assist in their support, and at their death the funeral expenses shall be paid by said societies.

RULE 9.—None but the Physician of the Institution or his substitute shall attend the inmates, unless he should request a consultation with another practitioner. If any of the inmates or their friends desire other than the regular Physician of the Home, they may, with the consent of the attending Physician, be at liberty to employ such; provided the same shall be without expense or any responsibility on the part of the institution.

RULE 10.—After rising in the morning, and again before retiring at night, all who are able shall be assembled in a suitable room, and a chapter from the Bible read to them, after which an opportunity shall be offered for silent or vocal worship.

RULE 11.—Religious meetings shall be held in the Home on the First day of the week, for those not desirous of attending elsewhere.

RULE 12. Any of the inmates desirous of visiting their friends must present to the House Committee on duty a written invitation from such friends. The Committee will then investigate conditions, and if satisfactory will grant the permission. No inmate will be permitted to absent himself or herself at any time without permission from the Matron.

RULE 13.—No stimulants or liquors to be used in the Home unless ordered by the Physician, and then to be administered by the Matron.

RULE 14.—All visitors shall be properly treated and shown through the Home, especially those visiting for religious purposes. Visitors will not be admitted before 10 A. M., nor after 5 P. M., except in special cases.

RULE 15. All that is necessary for the comfortable support of the inmates of the Home will be furnished from the funds of the institution; no inmate, therefore, will on any account be permitted to solicit assistance or to procure work outside of the Home.

RULE 16. All inmates are expected to render themselves generally useful in the Home, as far as their strength will permit.

RULE 17.—Smoking and the use of tobacco in any form is strictly prohibited, except in such place as designated by the Matron.

RULE 18.—The bell will be rung ten minutes before each meal and all who are able will promptly repair to the dining-room. When seated, a suitable pause shall be observed. No inmate will be allowed to carry food from the table. The sick and infirm only will be accommodated with meals upstairs.

RULE 19.—No inmate will be permitted to interfere or find fault with Matron or assistants; but if they think they have cause for complaint they must apply to the House Committee, who will receive their statement and take such action thereon as may be proper.

RULE 20.—To preserve harmony in the family the strictest attention should be paid to the rules of the Home. For the first and second offense, the Matron will admonish the offender. For the third, she will report them to the House Committee; and for the fourth, removal from the Home, if so approved by the Board of Managers.

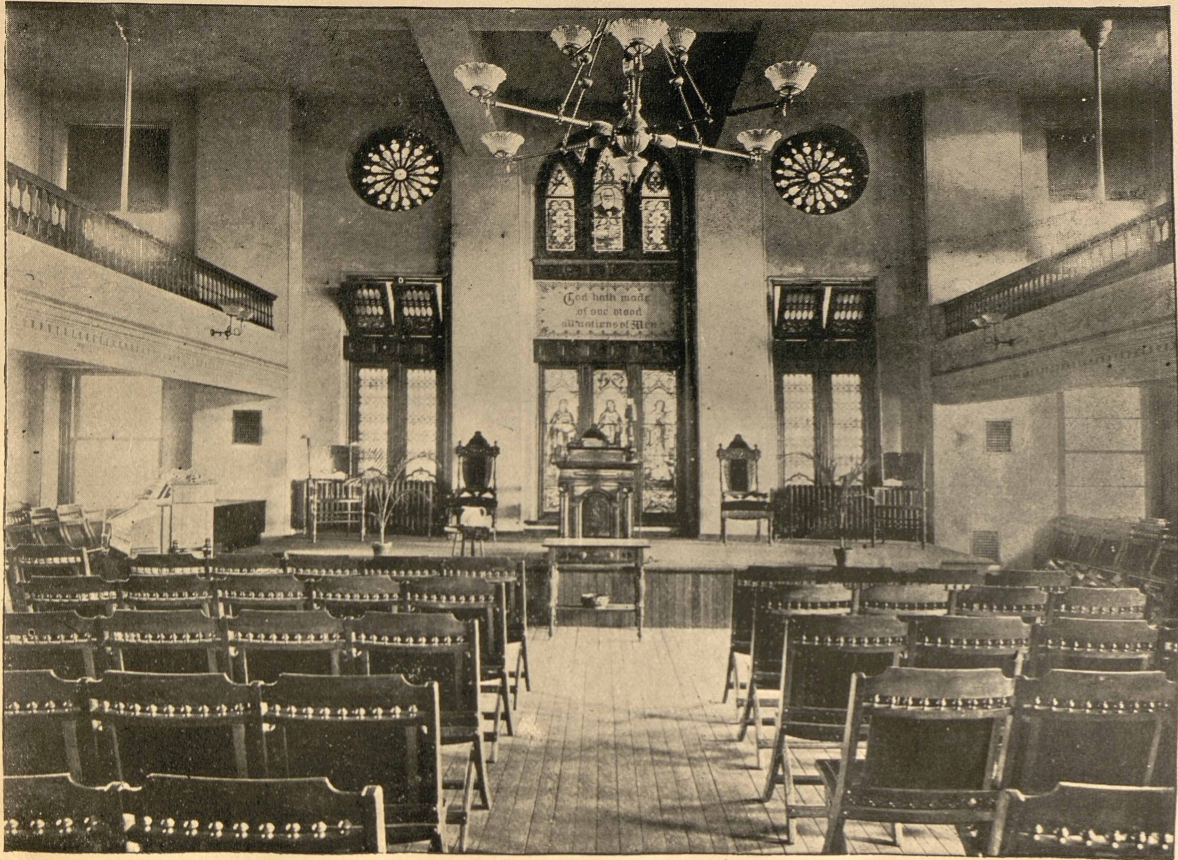

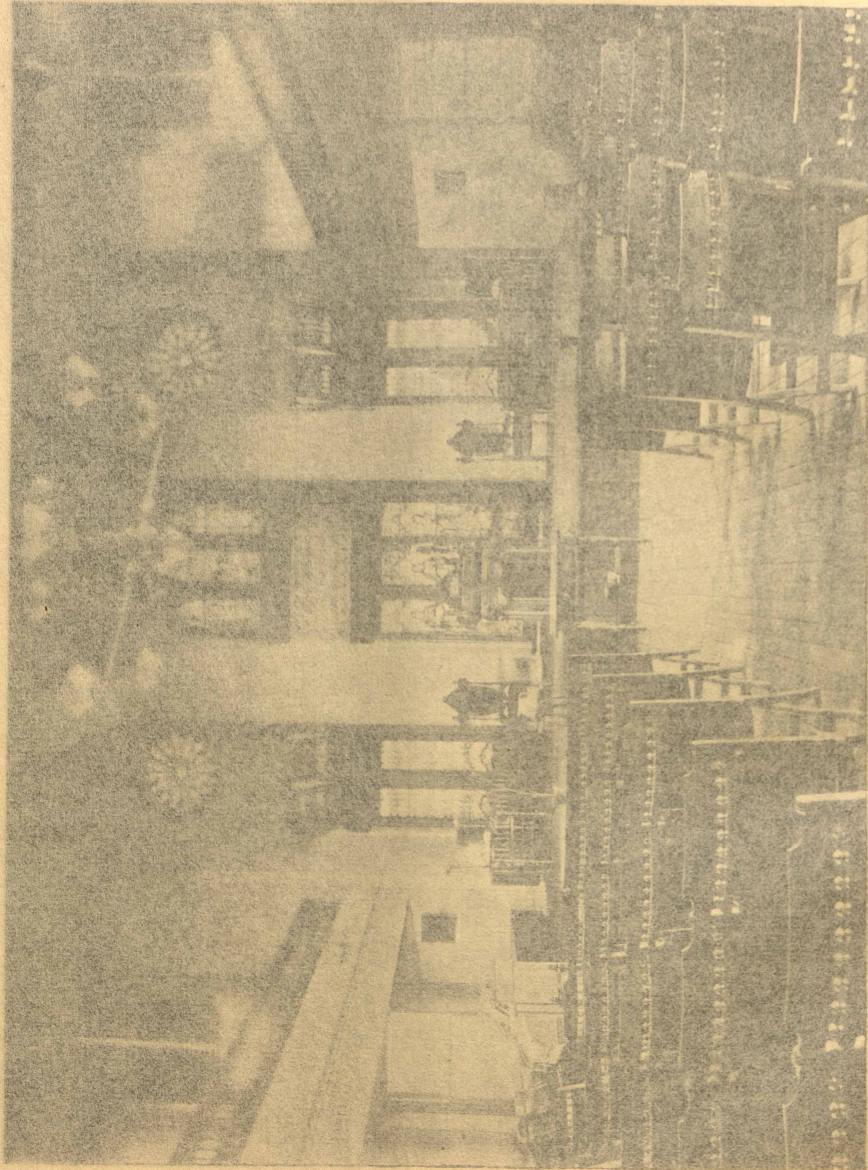
