#### REPORT

THE Board of Managers of the Indigent Widows and Single Women's Society, in presenting their Annual Report to the subscribers, feel assured they will continue to be interested in the success of an Institution, whose existence is owing to the liberality they have heretofore manifested.

During a season of almost unexampled pecuniary distress, when the pressure of the times has been universally felt, the generous patrons of this Society have not forgotten that "the poor they have always with them," nor that at such a season their assistance was peculiarly essential. They have been actuated by the pure spirit of benevolence to relieve the necessities of the aged and friendless, and the Managers are happy to state that their kind efforts have not been unavailing.

The Managers have found it impracticable to comply with all the applications that have been made for admission into the Asylum; during the last year but two persons have been received, two have left the house, and there have been six deaths; this is a greater number than has occurred in any former year, but a greater proportion of deaths may be reasonably expected in consequence of their increasing years and infirmities. There are at present, twenty-seven belonging to the family, and these are blessed with as great a degree of health as is usual for persons at their advanced period of life. The members of the household have been willing to contribute by their industry to the maintenance of the Institution; and whenever work could be procured, they have been diligently employed; there has not however, this year been the usual demand for articles made in the house, nor has such constant occupation been afforded them as during the preceding years, but still they have been enabled to furnish some addition to the funds of the Society.

It is truly gratifying to observe the order and harmony which reign in the Asylum; the members of the establishment generally regarding the superintendant as a kind and judicious friend, whilst she is attentive to their wants, and neglects nothing that can contribute to their comfort, the order of the house, or the interests of the Society.

A large and commodious building has been erected as an Asylum, on a lot adjoining that on which the Orphan House is situated, and it is expected will be in readiness for the reception of the family in the course of the present month; it contains every desirable accommodation, and the hope is indulged, that when established in it, a feeling of gratitude and happiness will pervade every heart. By a reference to the reports of the building committee accompanying this it will be seen what have been the expenses incurred on the Asylum, and the Treasurer's account will show the present state of the funds, which, from recent collections, exhibits a balance in favour of the Society, although debts exist to a greater amount which must be discharged. The Board of Managers are happy to express the gratitude they feel for several valuable legacies and donations; of the former, 2,000 dollars, in six per cent stock of the United States, have been received from the estate of Joshua Byron, Esq. deceased, and 100 dollars from the estate of Miss Sarah Pemberton, deceased, and a second donation of 100 dollars, from Robert Barclay, Esq. London, per Dr. Parke: particularly they tender their acknowledgments to the proprietor of the house, at present occupied as an Asylum, for the liberal terms on which he has accommodated them; they also request the Building Committee to accept their sincere thanks for the services they have so kindly tendered.

The Board of Managers cannot conclude without respectfully soliciting the continued kindness and attention of their patrons to this Institution; in extending the hand of charity to those, who, devoid of the attractions of infancy, can perhaps claim but little from mere sensibility, they will have the satisfaction arising from the performance of that important duty, "to visit the widows in their affliction," nor can they want any other incentive to a perseverance in their kind exertions than a knowledge that they "smooth the pillow of declining age," and a recollection that "blessed are the merciful."

#### ABSTRACT

#### OF THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.

SECT. I. All such persons of the female sex, as were subscribers at the date of the law, or subsequently becoming so, incorporated into a Society, by the title of "The Indigent Widows and Single Women's Society of Philadelphia." The annual value of Society's estate not to exceed 8,000 dollars, nor to be applied to any other purposes than those for which the Society is formed. Society to establish bye laws for their regulation and for the preservation and application of their funds.

SECT. II. Every female subscribing to the constitution and paying three dollars annually, to be a member; members neglecting to pay annual contribution, liable to be removed. The payment of thirty dollars to constitute a member for life.

SECT. III. Society to meet on the second Thursday of January in every year. Thirteen members competent to transact business. At each yearly meeting, twenty-four managers to be chosen, who shall manage, direct and dispose of all concerns of the Society. Board of managers may supply vacancies in their own body.

SECT. IV. Managers to meet within three days after their election, upon notice from the officiating secretary of the Society—shall choose from their number, a first directress, a second directress, a secretary and a treasurer. Five managers requisite to transact business—may make bye-laws for their government, and shall annually report their proceedings and the state of the funds to the Society—must give two weeks previous notice of meetings of the Society.

SECT. V. Corporation shall not be dissolved by annual election of managers not being made on the stated day; but the managers and officers shall continue in office till a new election, to be held after such notice as the managers shall prescribe.

SECT. VI. Lot of ground, and buildings thereon erected, for the use of the Society, exempted from tax.

#### REPORT

### OF THE BUILDING COMMITTEE.

The undersigned beg leave to represent to the Managers of the Indigent Widows and Single Women's Society,—

That, by a statement of the funds of the society, dated the 4th of January, 1819, there appeared to be thirty-nine shares of the capital stock, of the Commercial Bank, which cost 2015 dollars 50 cents, and 756 dollars 71 cents, of six per cent stock, which cost 749 dollars 15 cents, belonging to the general funds, or applicable to the support of the family. And that for the purpose of erecting an Asylum, there was thirty-three shares of Commercial Bank stock, which cost 1774 dollars 12 cents, and 2250 dollars 40 cents, of six per cent stock, which cost 2261 dollars 79 cents. That for meeting the instalments, as they become due on the building, the latter sum of 2250 dollars 40 cents, of six per cent stock, of the funds belonging to the building, and 756 dollars 71 cents, of the six per cent stock, belonging to the general funds, have been disposed of; the last to be reimbursed out of the sales of the Bank stock belonging to the funds of the building, the sale of which, it was considered adviseable to delay, for a better market, as the price was at that time, and continues to be under par. To supply the deficiency of funds, whilst the Bank stock was held for a better price, it became necessary, to raise money, through the medium of the Bank of the United States, on the individual responsibility of the undersigned; viz. one note dated the 30th day of July, 1819, for 2500 dollars; and one note dated the 31st of August, for 1500; by which means the whole of the instalments, as they became due, have been discharged; amounting to the sum of 7500 dollars. Two other instalments, of 1500 dollars each remain to be met by the time the building is finished, and, to provide for which, there are no other means, but to dispose of the Bank stock, or, to obtain a further sum on loan at the Bank of the United States. This latter expedient the undersigned are willing to adopt, in the hope that the Bank stock will appreciate, and be of more value. It is, however, necessary, in the opinion of the undersigned, that the Managers of the Society should not only sanction the disposal of the 756 dollars 71 cents of the six per cent stock, belonging to the general funds, and the obtaining of loans from the bank; but also authorize the disposal of the whole of the Bank stock, when it shall appear advantageous so to do. This measure will be considered justifiable, from the necessity of the case, and from the circumstance that the rent of the present Asylum will cease, when the new building will be occupied. The income of the stock of the general fund, amounts to 162 dollars 36 cents per annum, and the rent which will be saved, to 300 dollars per annum.

Independent of the cash instalments, to be paid to the time of finishing the house, there will be two others of 2000 dollars each, payable in six and twelve months, after the key is delivered, and also the further sum of 250 dollars, in addition to the contract price of the building, which it was subsequently agreed to pay, for a better finish of the dome, and sky light on the roof.\* A building for cow stable, &c. will be indispensable, and which may cost from two to three hundred dollars.

The plastering is considered to be more than half completed, and the prospect is, that the whole building will be finished, and fit for use before the expiration of the year. This information is given, that the Managers may adopt preparatory measures, for a removal of the family, before the winter, if they should think proper.

#### SECOND REPORT

#### OF THE BUILDING COMMITTEE.

The Building Committee, beg leave to report to the Managers of the Indigent Widows and Single Women's Society,—

That since the date of their last report which was on the 4th day of October, 1819, a further loan of fifteen hundred dollars, has been obtained from the Bank of the United States, making the whole sum borrowed from that Institution, to be 5500 dollars. This has been sufficient to meet the instalments regularly, as they became due, under the contract, and has prevented the necessity of the sale of any of the Commercial Bank stock, until the first day of the present month, when, to be prepared for the ninth Instalment, which occurs on the finishing of the Asylum, a sale of thirty six shares was made, at the rate of 42 dollars per share, by which this last of the cash payments

due on the building, will be discharged. There remains unsold an equal number of Bank shares, and subscriptions, to be collected, to the amount of 1060 dollars, which, as converted into money, will be applied towards the reimbursement of the loans obtained at the Bank of the United States. obtained at the Bank of the United States.

The two instalments, which will remain to be provided for, are 2000 dollars, payable in six months after delivering the key, and 2000 dollars, payable in twelve months from the same

The key of the Asylum, has not yet been delivered, by the contractor, but, the finishing is so nearly completed, as to in-

contractor, but, the missing is so nearly completed, as to induce a belief that the building will be tenantable, in a few days.

The erection of a stable, which was in contemplation at the former report, has been accomplished, and it is with great pleasure the committee inform the Managers, will be attended, with comparatively a small expense to the Society. The materials having very generally been obtained, by donations from benevolent individuals, and in some instances the workmanship also.

### FORM OF A LEGACY.

"I hereby give and bequeath unto 'The Indigent Widows 'and Single Women's Society of Philadelphia,' and their successors, for ever, (if real estate) all that, &c. (if personal) the sum of, &c."
