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your Mother's letter to read, I enjoyed it very much, and found the verses peculiarity beautiful and touching, particularly so as I didn't understand more than two words- of all of them- and I don't believe you did either. I wonder what you will do with your holiday to-day little boy- don't spend it in writing up those old cases for the Weekly Notes or in eating chocolate or in going to see the Chief Justice, they all seem to me equally bad. Mother wants me to go down street

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with her so I must say Good bye. Don't forget to study your collect to-morrow for I intend to hear you say it sometime. Good bye dear.
