Your letter this morning was too lovely -- & [ampersand] I laughed [underline]most [/underline] appreciatively at all your witticisms -- It is the greatest pleasure, more than that, to hear from my precious daughter --

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It is cool & [ampersand] lovely now -- Change came Sat. night. B. said he pulled up a [feather thing?] in the night -- the wind swept into the front room I was over in the back wh. was comfy but a sheet was a sufficient cover --

Mrs. [Lovenbury?], Miss Dovell, Anne McCue & [ampersand] I are lunching at Sedgelly today - I think they will enjoy the water & [ampersand] we can make some C.U. plans. Its pouring tremendously & [ampersand] keeping me from my Progressive meeting -- I went 3 times to 323 & [ampersand] finally found Mother, F. & [ampersand] M. they were in the dr. room eating very uninteresting looking sandwiches from [Supeer's?] & [ampersand] drinking fernillae [sic] - Aunt M. felt the responsibility of such a frugal repast & [ampersand] was careful to explain how fine their lunches usually are, & [ampersand] that this was the first time they had ever been "caught" like this. She (M.) afterwards, after I had said good bye to the others, wanted me to go ridey ridey out with

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them, but I didn't - really [couldn't conscientiously?], for I have Hez. & [ampersand] Daisy & [ampersand] Evelyn all working, & [ampersand] while they could do the cleaning without me, there is so much sorting & [ampersand] arranging that it saves time very much if I'm on hand --
