must wait until I return from N.E. to have our meeting + really start things. She says we can [have?] the meeting at her home. [Mother?] says it is a nice one. In the meantime I'll keep my [women?] supplied + the books can be [illegible] in to the prison for a beginning.

Marvey + Aunt J. were dear last night. Percy too. I am really fond of him, + he cooked me such delicious corn. A little "under done" (on purpose) + so nice + corny. Aunt J. has [thought?] out the real thing of the Caillaux trial. She says these letters the [Miss?] C. Labori is a very clever man. I think she's right + she's very clever too.

Marvey said she had written to beg you to [meet?] her at L. port the

end of next week, + Mother says she has written for Belair. I told her M. only free to L. port for week ends, + that I thought you'd prob. go there on Saturday + come to her when you returned + I'll find you here if you do that. It will be [underlined] perfect [/underlined] to have you back on the 7th + we'll have [salted?] ice cream + do by Esther to have a party with her that night + I'll by Robert + we can plan N.E. + have a beautiful time. Let me know. Don't forget. I can hardly wait to see you as I write about it. I made a plan the next day to meet you at T[illegible?] + then remembered you weren't returning alone as you want. I'm so glad you + E. will be together. Good bye [honey?] I have [lots?] of things to write. I'll

dictate some tomorrow. Only I hate that. [illegible] Dr. Shaw lunched with me on Wed[nesday?] on B. St. at 12.30 to 3.40, + I had to tell her I had to go! We talked over C.U. [illegible]. I very peaceful, she not. it reminded me of Breeton + [Cassiner?]. Sort of st[ong?] + then peaceful. Only she did feel dreadful about the C.U. This sort of thing I can't of course dictate. Miss P. would be too interested.

I am sending you large lots of love, + to H.A.K., E. + all.
