full of silver as especially worthy of admiration first Louise's arts + crafts apron, then Olga's Sheffield tray. Olga was with me, and we both thought I showed great discretion. I had not known what either she or Louise had given to Margie.

The house is a perfect bower downstairs. Palms in all possible places, and masses of forsythia and other blossoming sprays. I sent a lot of daffodils from Dover - ordered 500, but do not think my woman was able to get more than 300. They are in a pail of water now recovering from the journey. The house looks lovely.

Shippen has just telephoned that Esther is not quite so well today, so that he will not be down. I am hoping for Louise to appear every minute. I think she will go to Washington with me tomorrow.

I sent my car back to Dover, to be ready for me when I go back May 3. I am having it gone over by a man in Dover whom they say is very good, and not so expensive as some. Our resolution comes up May 5 and 6th for victory or defeat. Dr Neil has been telling me that he has talked with many Delawarians in the train as he goes back + forth from the Eastern Shore, + they all tell him there is no chance at all of its passing.
