

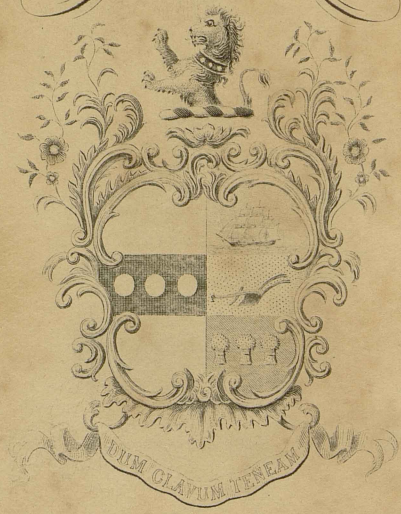

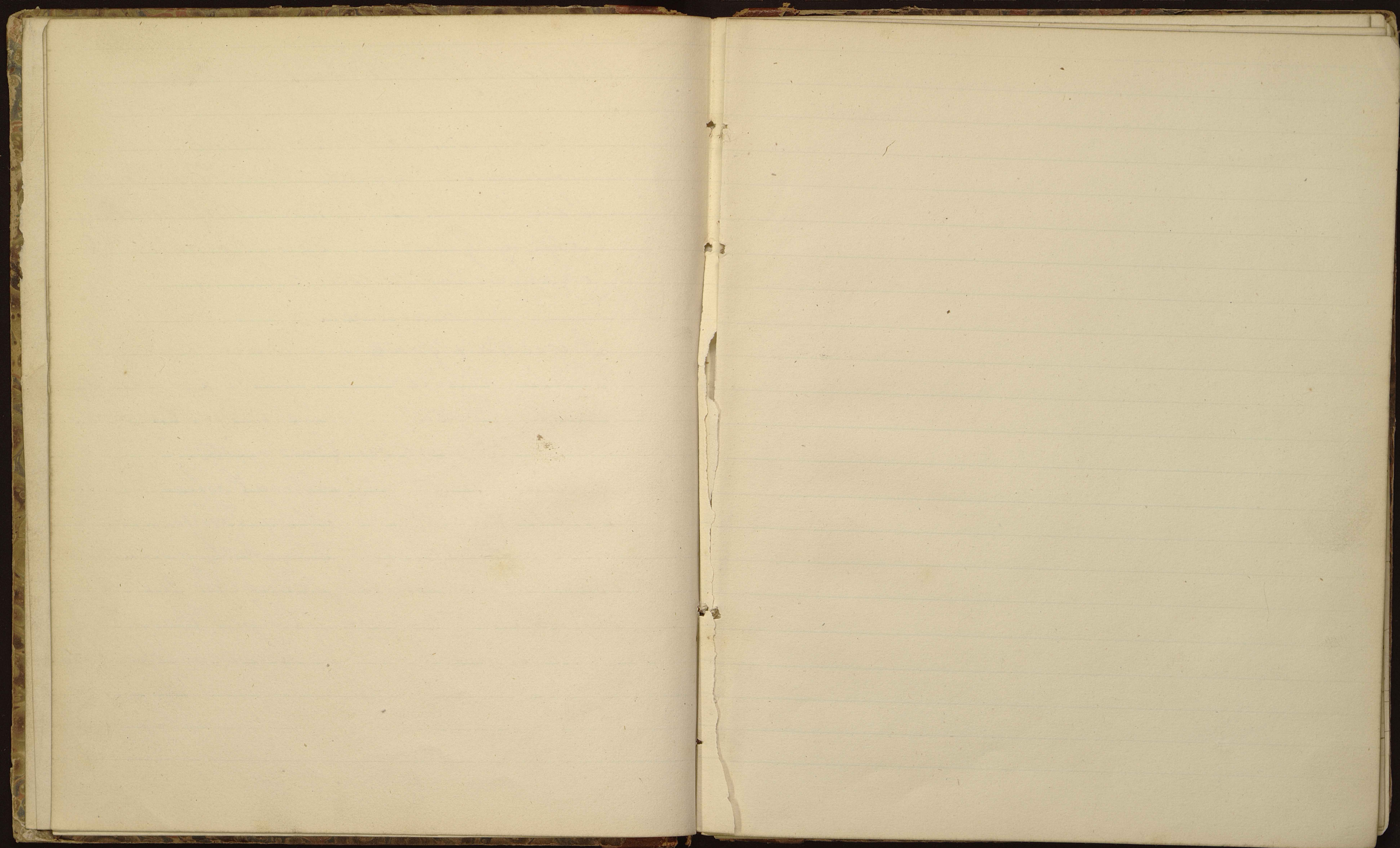

At a stated meeting of the Female Anti-Slavery Society held Feb 8th 1838, the President in the chair, the minutes of the last meeting and of the Board of Managers were read and adopted.

The committee appointed to attend to the publishing of the Annual Report, reported that 1000 copies had been printed. On motion resolved that the copies of the Liberator subscribed for by this Society, be sent, with one exception, in to neighbourhoods where that invaluable paper is not at present received. A committee ~~of ten~~ was appointed to make arrangements for our Convention, the following persons were nominated, Susan Haddock. Susan Grew. Lydia White Sidney Ann Lewis. Lucretia Matt. Elizabeth Heall. Sarah Dorsey. Mary Grew Theresia Kimber. Hannah Marton.

Resolved

that the Circular to Female Anti Slavery Societies informing them of the time of meeting and requesting them to appoint delegates to this Convention be adopted.

The meeting directed that books explaining the views and principles of Abolitionists be sent to Jacob Erbe at the expence of the Society, and that the sum to be expended for them shall not exceed 10 Dollars. Sarah Pugh & S Lewis appointed to attend to that business.

It was also directed that each member be furnished with 4 copies of the Annual Report, and 200 copies left at the Anti Slavery Office for distribution.

Sarah G Reich joined the Society.
My adjourned.

At a stated meeting of the Female Anti Slavery Society held 3mo 8th 1838. The President in the chair
The minutes of the last meeting and of the Board of Managers were read and adopted.

The Board of Managers informed that the school now under the care of Sarah M Douglass does not yield a sufficient income to continue it, as she would wish—

The following resolution was read and referred to our next

meeting - Resolved - That the presents momentous crisis of our
cause, demands that increased efforts should be made, and
more strenuous exertions used for its advancement, and that
in order to carry it on with more vigor, we agree to tax ourselves
100 per cent upon our annual subscriptions.

A note of thanks was received from the Executive Committee of
the State Anti-Slavery Society for the sum pledged them by this
Society.

Extracts of a letter from our friend M^r Sumner's new reads - which

Secretary of this society to the New York
Ladies' Anti-Slavery Society. meeting
adjourned.

At a stated meeting of the Phil^{ad}
Female Anti-Slavery Society held
June 14th at Sandiford Hall, the
President in the chair. The minutes
of the last meeting and of the Board
of Managers were read and adopted.

The Delegates to the Eastern
District Convention reported that they
attended the meetings that were held.

The Delegates appointed
to attend the Free Produce Convention
reported that they attended the only one
that could be held at the time appoin-
ted, as the place of their meeting was de-
stroyed by a mob. A committee was
appointed to call another meeting
as soon as a convenient place could
be obtained for that purpose.

Sarah Lewis on
behalf of the Delegates appointed to attend
the Convention to form a County Soci-

ety reported that the Convention, met at
Frankford in a school house which
was well filled, that the Executive Com-
mittee were in great need of funds, and
that they wished our Society to pledge as
large an amount as we can afford, also
that a Manager should be appointed by
our Society as one of the managers of the
County Society.

Resolved that Sarah Lewis
be appointed a manager of the County
Society with liberty to pledge 150 Dollars
this year. Lucretia Matt on behalf
of the Delegates appointed to attend the
"Anti-Slavery Convention of American
Women", said that a verbal report seem-
ed inadequate to convey the deep interest
felt in that Convention and though they
were assailed by a driven from place to
place by a furious mob yet they were en-
abled through God's help to finish their
business satisfactorily. The proceedings

of the Convention will be published.

The Committee for collecting funds for the School were requested to pay the amount collected by them to the Treasurer before the next meeting of the Board. Resolved that the plan pursued, respecting petitions last year be adopted this, and that the same form of petitions be used. To take charge of circulating petitions in the Counties that have not County Societies, the following persons were appointed.

The following Preamble and resolutions were adopted and directed to be presented to the Editor of the Pennsylvania Freeman for publication.

It was also directed that they be offered to the Editors of Daily Papers.

Many Barle and Many Needles were appointed to attend to their publication.

Whereas the events of the past month have been calculated to try the foundations of our faith and to produce "deep searchings of heart" in those who have professed themselves the friends of the down-trodden & despised of our land, therefore

Resolved, that in our again being assembled "with one accord in one place" for the purpose of carrying on the work to which we are pledged, we feel assured that the good seed has

not fallen on stony ground to be withered by the scorching rays of persecution, but that out of the honest and true heart it will yet "bring forth fruit, some forty some sixty, and some an hundred fold."

Resolved. That the state of public feeling, as manifested by the burning of the Pennsylvania Hall by a mob, countenanced by a large number of citizens and unopposed by the civil authorities, because the principles of the "Declaration of Independence" were there advocated and maintained, call upon us for redoubled efforts to awaken the public mind to a sense of the ruin in which the enslavement of a part of our countrymen threatens to involve the liberties of all.

Resolved. That in the denunciations and obloquy so liberally heaped upon us, we find new calls upon our fortitude.

tude to endure, our firmness to withstand, and our energy to subdue the persecution opposition and violence with which we are assailed.

Resolved that we endeavour to meet the increasing exigencies of the times by more confident faith, more untiring perseverance, and by a spirit of greater self-denial that we may be able to furnish the means necessary for carrying forward the great work of Human Freedom.

At the request of Mrs. Matt the preamble to our Constitution was read, upon which she commented with much feeling, thereby strengthening the hands and cheering the hearts of some who were well-nigh fainting.

Deborah Coates and Mary Carl joined the Society. Meeting adjourned.

At a stated meeting of the Phila Female Anti-Slavery Society held July 13th. The President in the chair the minutes of the last meeting and of the Board of Managers were read and adopted. The Minutes of the last meeting &
of the Board of Managers were read and
adopted.

On motion resolved that the re
mainder of the 150 Dollars due to the
County Society be paid by our Treasurer.
Some misunderstanding on the subject
of this pledge - whether it was made for
the this present year, or for a year from
^{May} June last - produced some discussion,
a vote being taken it was decided to
consider the \$150.00 as due this year. 1838.

Lewis Gunn requested this Society to ap
point a Committee to furnish him a
list of the members of this and the wards
in which they reside. Sarah Pugh and
Phebe Hussy were appointed.

On motion of Anna M. Hopper
the vote passed last month, to publish
the letter received from the Concord Fe

Female Anti-Slavery Society was reconsidered and rescinded.

The Committee to purchase Anti-Slavery Almanacks, reported that they had been purchased.

Mary Grew Huldah Justice Mary C. Pennock Elizabeth J. Neal Mary Townsend Phebe Hussey Anna M. Hopper & Sarah Pugh. were appointed from this Society to assist in dividing the city into districts for the purpose of circulating petitions, and to apportion that labor among our members.

The Corresponding Secretary was requested to address a letter to the Massillon Stark County, Ohio. Anti-Slavery Society.

The Treasurer was directed to pay for the room hired by the Society for Sarah M. Grimké's public lectures. Mg. adj.

The second Thursday in the month October 11th, being ~~every~~ ^{every} ~~it~~ ^{it} ~~was~~ ^{was} ~~not~~ ^{not} held.

At a special meeting of the Female Anti-Slavery Society, held Oct. 19th. 1838. the secretary being absent, Mary Grew was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The minutes of the last meeting, and of the board of managers, were read and adopted.

The committee on petitions reported, that the city had been divided into sections, and apportioned among our members, very few of whom had declined performing their ^{share} of the work appointed them by the committee.

The committees for circulating petitions in the counties, reported respecting the progress of their work.

At a stated meeting of the Phil^a Female Anti Slavery Society held November 8th 1838 finding our usual place of meeting closed against us, we adjourned to the ~~Mr Douglass~~ school room, of S^r Douglass who informed that there had been some dispute among the members of the Phoenix House company about letting us have the use of their room, which induced the committee who had charge of renting the Hall to resign. J Jackson was requested to enquire if we could have the Hall for future meetings, and if not to procure some other room.

The minutes of the last meeting and of the Board of Managers ^{were} read and adopted. Teresa Kimber reported that a large number of the Delegates attended the meeting of the State Society at Coatesville.

The committee appointed to procure lecturers to address a public meeting

reported that there was a large meeting which was addressed by Charles Burleigh and William Chase.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the County Society informing that a meeting of the Society would be held on Tuesday evening the 20th inst at 6 1/2 o'clock and requesting this Society to send a large delegation. Female Anti-Slavery Society held in the Hall of the College of Pharmacy, Dec 13th. 1838 The President in the chair, the minutes of the last meeting and of the Board of Managers were read and adopted. Most of the members appointed to the care of petitions reported attention to them in their respective Counties and Districts. Resolved that a committee be appointed to take charge of petitions and forward them to Congress. Sarah Lewis H. Justice Hannah L. Stickney Mary Carl E. J. Keall and Anna Hopper were appointed. To nominate Officers for the ensuing year the following were chosen

prepared to pay their subscriptions
at our next meetings.

The following res-
olution from the Board was after
much discussion adopted with but
one dissenting vote. Resolved that
the future business meetings of this

Society be opened by reading from
the Scriptures or from some Anti-
Slavery publication, or by a short pe-
riod of entire silence, that the
minds of the members may have
an opportunity to become fully turn-
ed towards the subject of the mee-
ting, and prepared to remember "those
in bonds as bound with them."

A letter was read from Jacob Erb
acknowledging the receipt of some
Anti-Slavery publications sent last
Spring from this Society, cheering us
with the welcome intelligence that
the seed has been sown on good
ground. George Bradburn and C.
C. Burleigh being present they were
invited to address the meeting.

G Bradburn excused
himself on account of indisposition.
C. C. Burleigh addressed us on the

To the House of Representatives of the United States of America

The Memorial and Petition of the Female Anti Slavery Society of Philad. in the state of Pennsylvania, respectfully represents: that your memorialists have been informed that your body has erected itself into an inquisition to judge of the motives of persons petitioning for the passage of humane & salutary laws called for alike by the principles of enlightened policy, sound morality, and true religion; that it has undertaken to determine the ulterior views, not only of those who have heretofore petitioned, but also of those who may hereafter petition; that it has re

solved to reject, without reading, all petitions upon certain subjects, because it attributes motives of which it does not approve, to all past as well as to all future signers of such petitions—

Your memorialists believe that the propriety of enquiring into the objects of petitions ^{or} further than they have themselves expressed them, may well be questioned: that to decide conclusively upon the motives of all, both present and future, by the admissions of a part, is unreasonable, unjust, & oppressive; that to reject any petition, or to refuse to pass any just law, because of the motives of the petitioners even when acknowledged or clearly proved, is to act upon erroneous principles; and to refuse to listen to the arguments which petitioners may advance in support either of their propositions or their inducements to offer them, is to condemn unheard,

and to crush, in effect, the exercise of the right of petition. Your memorialists, therefore, remonstrate against all resolutions of the tenor aforesaid, and pray that they may forthwith be rescinded.

Resolved this remonstrance be forwarded to John Quincy Adams with a request that he would present it to the House of Representatives.

The following memorial was also presented and directed to be circulated for signatures. The Committee on Petitions was requested to take charge of the memorial.

The Delegates to the Antislavery Convention of American women, report - That they all attended

The Convention, which opened on the morning of the 1st. instant & closed on the evening of the 3rd. holding two meetings each day. The number in attendance was not so large as last year; but the interest manifested in the cause in which we are engaged, has not been exceeded at any former period - The various subjects claiming attention elicited an effusion of sentiment from many of the members, and although on one or two points some difference of opinion prevailed, yet your committee are happy to report, that the harmony of the Convention remained unbroken - An address was issued to the Society of Friends on the subject of Slavery, one to American Women on Prejudice against color, and a circular on Petitioning - which with the regular minutes of the Convention will soon be published - It is a satisfaction to believe, that by the concentration of our efforts in this way, we not only advance the cause of the emancipation of the slave, but that the fettered mind of woman, is fast releasing itself from the thralldom in which long existing custom has bound it and by the exercise of her talents in the cause of the oppressed - her intellectual as well as moral being is rising into new life - On behalf of the delegates

The committee of arrangement for the Convention made the following report which was adopted

The Committee of Arrangements for the Anti Slavery Convention of American Women respectfully report -

That in compliance with a resolution passed at a meeting of this Society in Gms. last, an application was made to each of the seven (no. mys. of Friends) in this city, for one of their meeting houses in which to hold our Convention, in the order of time in which they were held; the following being the form of the request presented to them severally.

The Committee of arrangements for the Anti Slavery Convention of American Women appointed to be held in this City in May next, respectfully request that you will grant to that body, the use of your meeting house on the 1st, 2nd, 3rd day of that month -

As other denominations of Christianity have frequently refused us the use of their houses of worship for Anti Slavery meetings, we turn to you whose testimony was so early recorded against slavery, and in the name of millions of crushed and bleeding slaves, ask that you will open your doors to the advocates of their emancipation

May New. Co. Sec. of Phil. F. A. S. "

The first meeting to which this was sent was Cherry St. The note was read & the decision soon made, that the house could not be granted for the purpose, and a committee of two persons was appointed, to return a respectful answer. The course at Green St. was the same with the exception that a large number were in favor of the house being granted to the applicants -

At the North my. the note was laid on the table of the clerk, who stated that such a note was there, & asked what order should be taken upon it - It was almost unanimously decided that it should not even be read although it was stated that it had been sent by one of their own members, and that no disrespect was intended as had been insinuated. The individual who presented it was requested to take it away -

At Orange St. the communication was handed to the clerk who read it and handed it to an elder of the my.

He then informed the my. that he had received a paper addressed to them which it would not be in order to present - that it had been read by himself and another friend who concurred with him in that opinion, but if the meeting approved, a few friends might be appointed to examine it - The meeting however expressed its satisfaction with this decision & the paper was directed to be returned

to the prison who presented it -

At Philada. Mo. My. the note was given to the clerk and at the suggestion of a member a committee of two was appointed to examine it, who reported that they had read the paper, and united in the opinion that it was not suitable to present it to the meeting. The report appeared to give satisfaction.

At 12th St. The clerk suggested that a committee should be appointed to decide upon the propriety of reading a note addressed to the meeting. - Two individuals having examined it reported its contents to the meeting, which decided that it should be returned without being read a few urging that it should be treated more respectfully.

At Spruce St. meeting, the note was handed to the clerk by one of the members of the meeting - Much opposition to it was expressed & no answer returned.

While awaiting the replies to their letter a deputation from the Committee waited on the Actuary of the Franklin Institute, by whom they were respectfully received, but the use of the building was promptly refused.

Similar requests were also made for the Hall at the corner of 8th & Chestnut Sts. the proprietor of which building refused us its occupancy, on the ground that he was friendly to the continuance of American Slavery -

For the Session Room of the musical Fund Society and for other public buildings and places of worship, all which were denied with one exception. - The trustees of the Universalist Church in Callowhill St. lent a favorable ear to the petition & promised the use of it at a moderate rent, if a guaranty for its safety could be obtained.

The Committee on receiving this answer, although fully appreciating the liberal spirit of these gentlemen, were dissatisfied with the obligations involved in the acceptance of their offer and thought proper to make one more effort to obtain a place in the city, which would place us more immediately under the protection of our Mayor and release us from the necessity of a guaranty. Two individuals then presented an application for the Universalist Church in Lombard St. which shared the fate of its predecessors & no alternative then appeared, but to comply with the terms of the Trustees of the Callowhill St. Church. Accordingly preparations were made to obtain the necessary securities, from which unpleasant tasks we were relieved by a voluntary offer from that devoted friends of the slave - Mr. R. Savender who with a kindness at once unsuspected as gratifying offered us the use of a large unfurnished building, in Filbert St. which had been used as a riding school, and which when

cleaned & fitted with coarse but comfortable provision for our accommodation, was satisfactorily & gratefully occupied by the Convention.

The following note was handed to a member of the Committee on the day in which the offer of the Riding School was made us —

"Mrs. — I am sorry to inform you that we cannot accommodate your Convention with the use of our Church as has been proposed. Our Pastor & many of our members decidedly object to having it used for that purpose. The majority of the Committee who were disposed to grant it to you, have therefore concluded to comply with the wishes of the minority, not to let you have it, as we think the interests & harmony of the Society will be best secured thereby — Yours &c. P. Evinger, Secy.

N.B. Since the application to the Lombard St Church was made by you, the disapprobation is greatly manifested.

Invitations from different members of our Committee were extended to individuals, in different sections of our Country distinguished for talents & zeal in the Anti Slave Cause, soliciting their assistance in furnishing business for the Conventions & their personal attendance. The call was promptly responded to by some, and by others disregarded — but a particular account of the

Convention, its causes for discouragement on the one hand and its glorious triumphs over difficulties and discouragements on the other, however interesting to the Committee to give to this Society to receive is not called for at our hands — On behalf of the Committee

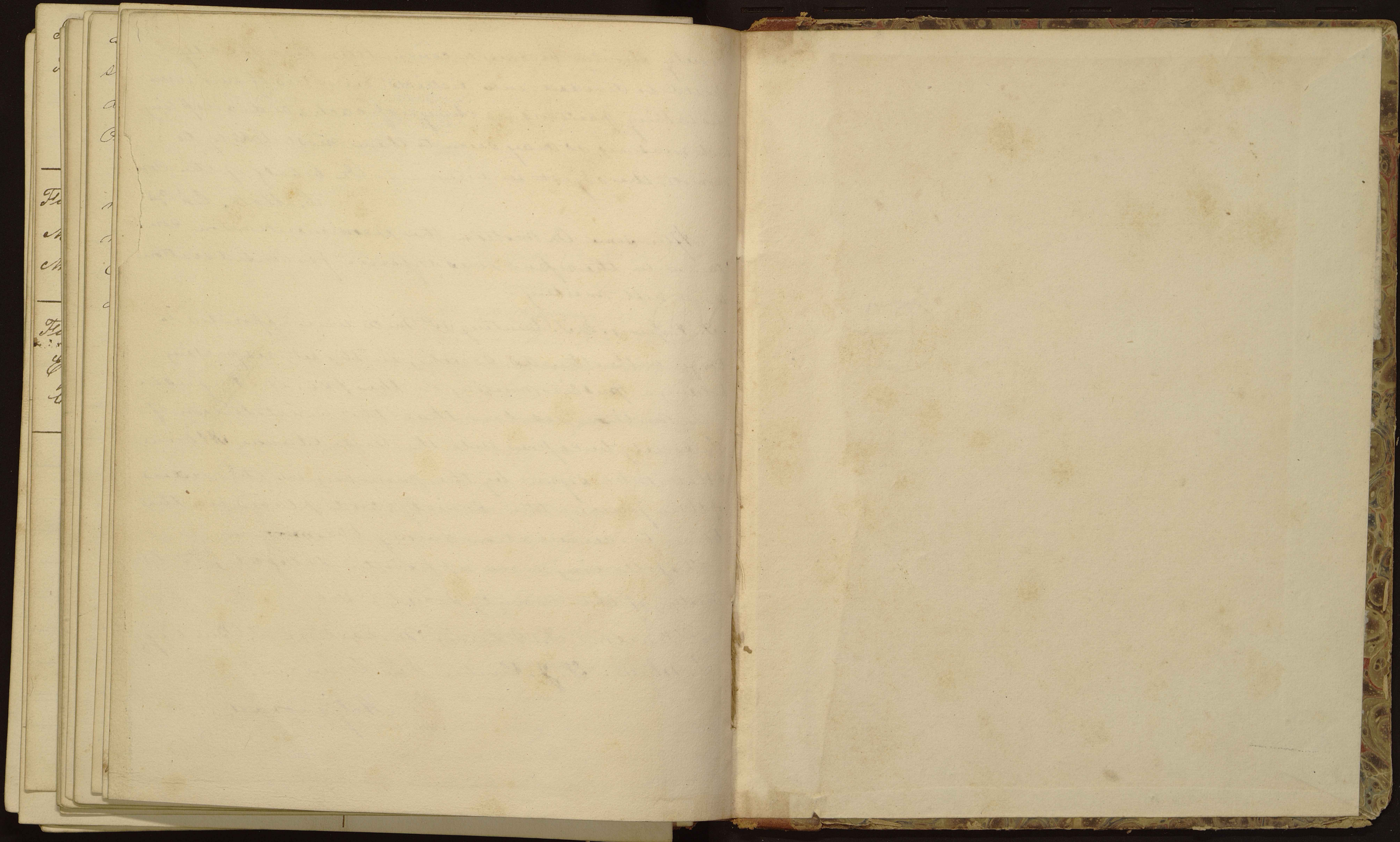
